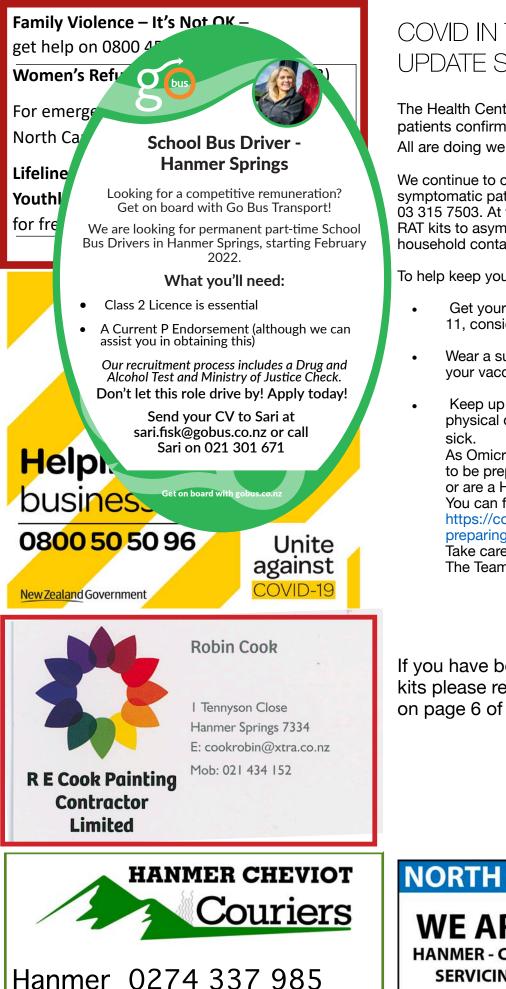
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COVID IN THE COMMUNITY UPDATE Sunday 6th March 6 pm

The Health Centre is now managing a few more patients confirmed COVID-19 positive this week. All are doing well and self-isolating at home.

We continue to offer bookings for RAT tests for symptomatic patients by calling our reception team on 03 315 7503. At this stage we are not able to offer RAT kits to asymptomatic patients, unless you are a household contact of a positive patient.

To help keep yourself well we encourage you to

- Get your booster. If you have children aged 5 to 11, consider getting them vaccinated too.
- Wear a surgical or N95 mask, scan in, and show your vaccination pass when out and about.
- Keep up healthy habits such as washing hands, physical distancing and staying home if you are sick. As Omicron cases rise in the village, we all need to be prepared to self-isolate if you get COVID-19 or are a Household Contact.

RAT TESTING - If you start to get symptoms of sore throat, cough, runny nose, fever etc, **ISOLATE**, call the Health Centre on 03 315

7503 and book a supervised Rapid Antigen Test (RAT). Then preferable testing Day 3 of onset of symptoms to avoid false negatives. After your test continue to monitor symptoms and if concerned, please phone back for a re-test. If you have a **POSITIVE RESULT**, our nurse will be in contact direct with you.





Only essential blood tests will be conducted whilst we get through the next 4-6 weeks of managing COVID in the Community. So, if you get a text from us to say you need to get a blood test then you should call us to make an appointment.

Our after-hours phone is always answered by a registered nurse who will assess your needs, offer advice or, if required, arrange immediate assistance from our on-call clinician. It can take several minutes to answer the phone so please be patient and hold, and follow the voice prompts carefully

Pasta arrabbiata

Ingredients

75g (½ cup) fatty bacon

- 2-3 red chillies
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 large onion, finely chopped

1 garlic clove, finely chopped

500g very ripe tomatoes, finely chopped (or use tinned tomatoes if short on time)

500g pasta

2 tbsp chopped Continental parsley

grated parmesan cheese or pecorino cheese, to serve

Method

1. Use a large knife to finely chop the bacon. Chop the chillies. Heat the oil in a heavy-based frying pan and add the bacon, chilli, onion and garlic. Fry for 8 minutes, stirring occasionally.

2. Add the tomato to the pan with 125ml (1/2 cup) water and season to taste. Cover and simmer for about 40 minutes, or until the sauce is thick and rich.

3. When the sauce is almost cooked, cook the pasta in a large saucepan of rapidly boiling salted water until al dente. Drain well and return to the pan to keep warm.4. Add the parsley to the sauce and toss gently through the pasta. Serve with the parmesan cheese or pecorino cheese sprinkled over the top, if desired

Pasta Night

Spaghetti alla Puttanesca

The origins and the naming of this pasta dish has many varying explanations but they all agree it roughly translates as 'in the style of a whore". It has quite a few ingredients but is very simple to make.

INGREDIENTS

- 3 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 small red onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 6 anchovy fillets, roughly chopped (good quality) pinch of chilli flakes
- 1 pinch of dried oregano
- 1 tbsp tomato paste
- $2 \ x \ 400 g$ cans tomatoes, drained and chopped
- 1 orange, grated zest of half and juice of whole
- 1 small bunch of flat-leaf parsley, chopped
- 1 pinch of sugar

freshly ground black pepper

16 to 20 black or black and green olives, pitted and roughly chopped

2 tbsp capers, drained and roughly chopped

1 x 185g can of Italian-style tuna in oil, drained 400g spaghetti, linguine or penne or spaghetti

METHOD

Put a large saucepan of water on the boil.

Heat the olive oil in a saute pan on moderate heat. Add the onion and fry for five minutes, until soft. Then, add the garlic, anchovies, chilli, oregano and tomato paste (if using) and cook for a minute. Now add the tomatoes, orange zest and juice, a little parsley, sugar and pepper and simmer, partly covered, for about 15 minutes, until it becomes a thickish sauce. The oil will separate when it is ready. Add the olives and capers and cook for a few more minutes, then add the tuna to heat through.

Meanwhile salt the boiling water, throw in the pasta and stir. Cook for the time suggested on the packet, until al dente. Lift the pasta out and add straight to the sauce in the pan and mix through. Dish up into warmed bowls and sprinkle each serving with chopped parsley. Enjoy with garden salad.

- set up a My Health Account if you don't already have one and you're over 12 - you will need your own email address and a valid form of ID - if you already have a My Health Account, log in
- scroll to "Self-report a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) result,"
- click "Report test result" and follow the instructions



You can do it over the phone by calling 0800 222 478 - select option 3

- call any time between 8am and 8pm, 7 days a week
- use this to report RAT results for those under 12

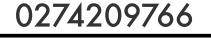

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Close Contact Exemption Scheme



During the Omicron response, workers at registered critical services who are identified as Household Contacts may continue to work if they meet the following criteria:

- be deemed critical by their employer
 - work in a critical service. Critical services include:
 - ✓ food production and its supply chain
 - ✓ key public services like health and emergency services
 - ✓ lifeline utilities such as power and water supplies
 - ✓ transport
 - ✓ critical financial services
 - ✓ news media
 - ✓ social welfare
 - ✓ human and animal health and welfare.

Businesses and organisations can self-assess and sign up to the scheme on https://business.govt.nz

- be fully vaccinated
- be asymptomatic

•

- return a negative rapid antigen test unsupervised before each day/shift they work during their isolation period
- follow specific health protocols
- only go to work they cannot go anywhere else.

Workers should talk to their employer if they think they meet the criteria to be part of the Close Contact Exemption Scheme.

These changes mean that:

- Cases will be identified via a positive PCR or Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) and will need to isolate for 10 days.
- Household contacts of cases will immediately self-isolate for 10 days at the same time the positive household case is confirmed. They need to get a RAT on day 3 and 10.
- Close Contacts are no longer required to self-isolate but do need to monitor for symptoms for 10 days and get tested if they become symptomatic.

BOUNTIFUL BRASSICA

There is so much going for the brassica family They are easy to sow from seed, grow well in cooler temperatures and can produce food crops during the leaner months of winter.

These hardy vegetables offer the main thrust of a cool season harvest – they pack a punch both in flavour and in nutrients, just when there are fewer harvesting options through the colder months.

When growing brassica, you have plenty of choice – you can grow cauliflower and cabbage in many shapes, sizes and colours, leafy kale, sprouting broccoli or Brussels Sprouts. All can be grown through the lean winter months. They're easy to germinate and only a deep, fertile, nitrogen-rich bed (or pot), plenty of moisture and space to grow. Seeds can be sown from now on and throughout the autumn months. Winter brassica like to start off in warm soils and to grow in cool weather.

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The Fowlers of Stanleyvale

first in a series of articles about the Fowler family and their tenure at Stanleyvale

Trying to make some sense of the history and family tree of the Fowler family is something of a minefield. The first of them to arrive in New Zealand was a William Longney Fowler who was born in 1830 as the son of Thomas Fowler and Nancy Longney Fowler (nee Longney).

After a private school education, William married Eliza Thomas in 1851 and in 1858, along with their three children they sailed to New Zealand on the barque 'Chieftan'. They arrived in Nelson accompanied by William's sister Ellen and brother Edward.

Eliza had one more child but died in 1864 and not long after William obtained a licence to farm sheep on 8000 hectares (20,000 acres) of remote mountainous country in the Amuri. At the same he bought four hectares of flat land for a homestead and called in Stanleyvale. The only way to access this valley was on horseback via the Clarence Valley and what is now called Fowlers Pass. Two years later he married his housekeeper, Louisa Parson and together they had thirteen more children. The children had a governess, Louisa's sister, Elizabeth. William also sired an illegitimate son with Elizabeth, bringing the number of his children to 18. At the time scab disease was rife in New Zealand. Sheep scab was the most serious stock health problem in the early years of large-scale sheep farming. The disease is caused by a mange mite which lives in the skin of sheep. Infected animals lose their wool and

condition. This coupled with heavy snowfalls, poor markets and being overrun with rabbits ruined Stanleyvale and meant that in 1887, William, Louisa and most of the family moved to Kaiapoi and subsequently to Aylesbury (between Rolleston and Kirwee) where they lived until Louisa died in 1918 and William a year later at the age of 88.

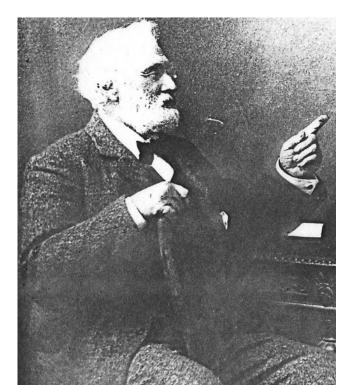
William had apparently spent much of his time writing to the Government with various grievances and was taken to court on more than one occasion. According to their daughter Mary, William had a very loud voice and was rather blasphemous, something which was wont to upset the ladies. Everybody, even his children, were reluctant to annoy him as he had "hands the size of frying pans".

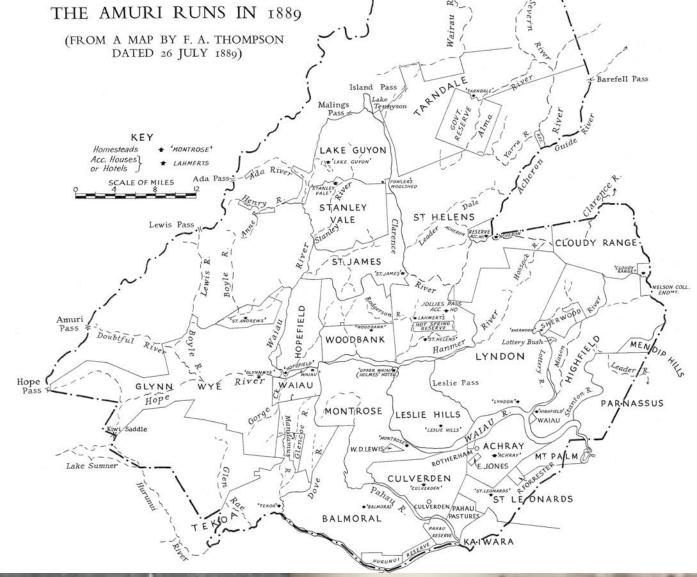
The William Fowler (Bill) that is best known in Hanmner Springs was a son, also called William Longney Fowler and he was born at Stanleyvale in September 1872. Searching on genealogical sites it becomes difficult to trace as some appear to have confused the father and son. Some say that Bill never married and another quotes his 'grandson'. Another says that he served in the British Army during World War I. More of Bill later.

During the family's time at Stanleyvale, father William Longley never shirked a fight or a court case for that matter and he seemed to have been constantly at loggerheads with not only his neighbours but with other members of his family.

In 1870 he accused William Newcombe, the manager of the adjacent Lake Guyon Station, with the theft of 316 sheep valued at £158. Fowler is said to have purchased 1000 ewes from the McRae brother of the Glens of Tekoa which he then drove to Stanleyvale. During the case there was much discussion over ear marks on the sheep because both had used similar ear marks, one having registered their mark in Nelson the other in Canterbury and the similarity of the marks and the intermingling of sheep between neighbouring farms. The proceedings created great interest in the district. The lawyer for the accused, one Mr Joynt urged that the judges not commit Mt Newcombe for trial but they should consider that he might have mistaken the sheep for his own.

The Bench was strongly critical of the fact that the evidence had demonstrated an intensely bad feeling which existed between the prosecutor and the accused and advised them to maintain more amicable relations in the future. The case was then dismissed, but this was by no means the end of William Fowler and the courts. More next week...

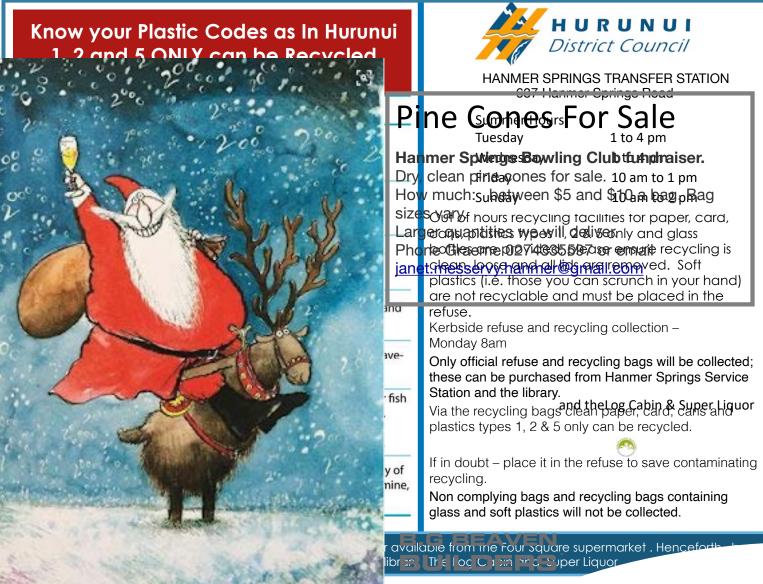
