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## COVID IN THE COMMUNITY UPDATE Hanmer Springs Health Centre, Sunday 22nd May 5pm

This last week has since *three times as many COVID-19 positive cases* in the community, compared to the previous week.

We encourage you to continue to keep yourself well and minimise the spread of COVID-19 by:

- Staying at home and isolating if you have tested positive for COVID-19.
- Call our reception team on 03 315 7503 if you have COVID-19 symptoms or just feeling unwell. We will be able to do an initial assessment on the phone and if COVID-19 is suspected, book you in for FREE supervised Rapid Antigen Test and short consultation.
- Wear a surgical or N95 mask when interacting with others.
- Keep up healthy habits such as washing hands, physical distancing and staying home if you are unwell..

If you **perform your own Rapid Antigen Test** (RAT) for COVID-19, you should **record your results**, **whether positive or negative**, by:

1. Going online and recording it at <u>https://my-</u> <u>covidrecord.nz</u>

OR

2. Calling 0800 222 478 and choose option 3

If you are **living with a person who has tested positive for COVID-19** you also **need to isolate** and have a **Rapid Antigen Test** (RAT) for COVID-19 on **days 3 and 7** of your isolation.

#### Pregnant & have COVID 19?

If you have self-tested at home using a RAT kit, please upload the result using your **MY COVID RECORD** account or phone 0800 222 478 & choose option 3.

The Health Centre will contact you soon after receiving your positive result. If they don't contact you, please call 03 315 7503. Contact your Lead Maternity Carer (LMC) to let them know you have COVID-19.

Unless you become very unwell, your LMC will continue to provide your pregnancy care. This may be by phone or video call.

#### What you can do to look after yourself at home.

- Soothing drinks (honey & lemon), warm tea, lemon in hot water for cough or sore throat.
- Cool showers, a fan, cool face washes for fever
- Steamy showers for a blocked nose
- Always check with your LMC/family doctor before taking any medicine when pregnant, even if you have COVID-19
- Rest as much as possible but do some gentle walking around the house every 2-4 hours during the day.
- Drink lots of fluids (water, tea, juice, soups) but not too many sugary drinks.

#### My Vaccine Pass updated

An updated My Vaccine Pass will be available from 24 May 2022 for anyone aged 12 and over who is up-to-date with their COVID-19 vaccinations, as well as for those with a temporary medical exemption.

The new My Vaccine Pass will look different from the original.

If you are using My Vaccine Pass as an entry requirement, we recommend that you:

 continue to use the original version of the My Vaccine Pass, if that pass has not expired;

People can download a new My Vaccine Pass through My Covid Record: <u>https://mycovidrecord.health.nz/</u>

If you call our clinic phone out of hours, your call is always answered by a registered nurse who will assess your needs, offer advice or, if required, pass the call to our on-call clinician. It can take several minutes to answer the phone so please be patient and hold, and follow the voice prompts carefully

### Draft Annual Plan from Council You Have Until June 6th to have your say

Every Council in New Zealand is required to prepare a Long Term Plan every three years. It is incumbent on the Council to set down what they intend to achieve in the next ten years, and how they intend to pay for it. The HDC's LTP for 2021- 2031 was adopted in June last year.

The Council is also required to adopt an Annual Plan which has the purpose of setting a budget for the next financial year and to highlight any changes from the current Long Term Plan. As such they have released a draft plan explaining the major changes from the LTP and are seeking feedback on key decisions before they finalise the Annual Plan.

If this is of interest to you and you want to have a say we suggest you get hold of the document "Sticking to the Game Plan" which is available through the library or the HDC website.

In it they explain that the next twelve months will be about sticking to their plans despite unforeseen obstacles, not the least of which is "unprecedented inflation".

After scrutinising operational and project cost, Councillors have agreed to propose an average rate increase of 10.5% for the 2022-23 year. (In the LTP this had been budgeted at 4.99%).

The Council has had to face Covid and its effects, As well inflation has been much higher than anticipated, in fact for the March quarter it was 6.9%, the highest in 30 years. They have been particularly hit by rising fuel prices, higher interest rates and payroll having to keep stride with inflation. Roading costs, the cost of building materials and a long list of other price increases means that some budgets and projects will be cut or reduced.

The Council has resolved that it will not reduce Water/ Sewer projects despite uncertainty created by the Three waters project. Also they do not wish to compromise Roading Service levels.

The document also outlines its budgeted commitment to Capital Expenditure on water supplies, sewerage, roading and footpaths, public services, the Hanmer Springs Thermal Pools & Spa, and necessary replacements in their vehicle fleet.

There was also the factor of reduced income from the Pools & Spa due to lockdowns and the red traffic light system.

The Feedback process involves writing down your feedback and submitting it through the Library or through being emailed to <u>feedback@hurunui.govt.nz</u> or you can go to the Council website <u>www.hurunui.govt.nz</u> and follow the link under Consultations on the home page. Do it before the 6th of June

## slow-roasted lamb shoulder

The combined flavours of lamb with rosemary and lemon offer a reminder of dining in Mediterranean countries. Add garlic if you like.

#### INGREDIENTS

4 brown onions

- 2kg lamb shoulder, bone-in
- salt and pepper, to season

 $^{1\!\!/_{\!2}}$  cup white wine

- 2 tbsp finely chopped rosemary
- 1/4 cup red wine vinegar

1 tsp sugar

juice and grated zest of 1 lemon, plus extra lemons to serve rocket leaves, to serve

#### METHOD

Heat your oven to 175C fan-forced (195C conventional). Peel and quarter the onions and place in the base of a lidded roasting tray.

- Season the lamb well with salt and pepper and place on top of the onions. Add the white wine to the base of the pan and cover with a lid.
- Roast the lamb covered for 3 hours, then turn up the heat as high as the oven will go and roast for a further 15-30 minutes until the juices at the base of the pan thicken and the lamb is well browned.

Remove the lamb and rest. Combine the rosemary, vinegar, sugar and lemon juice and zest. Spoon in a little of the lamb juices to loosen the mixture. Serve with the lamb, rocket leaves and extra lemon.

## Crispy pork belly and grapefruit salad Ingredients

- 1.5kg piece of pork belly, skin scored
- 4 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1/2 tsp white pepper
- 2 tbsp salt
- 1 grapefruit, peeled and segmented, no pith
- 1 carrot, julienned
- 1 Lebanese cucumber, julienned
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 red onion, thinly shaved
- 1 cup coriander leaves
- 1 cup mint leaves
- 2 large red chilli, finely sliced
- juice of 2 limes
- 2 tbsp palm sugar
- 2 tbsp fish sauce
- 1/4 cup fried Asian shallots

#### Method

Rub the meat side of the pork with the garlic and pepper and place on a tray. Scatter the salt over the skin side of the pork and leave uncovered in the fridge overnight.

Heat your oven to 200C fan-forced (220C conventional). Brush off the excess salt and roast the pork for 45 minutes. Switch your oven to an overhead grill and grill for 10-15 minutes until the skin resembles crisp crackling. Allow to rest for 15 minutes, then turn the pork skin-side down on a chopping board and cut into large cubes with a heavy knife.

Combine the grapefruit, carrot, cucumber, tomatoes, red onion, coriander, mint and chilli in a large bowl. Mix together the lime juice, palm sugar and fish sauce. The dressing should taste sweet, as the grape-fruit will provide additional sourness. Toss the pork belly and dressing through the salad ingredients, then transfer to a serving plate. Scatter with the shallots to serve.

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#### May 2022

Kia ora Hanmer Springs Community,

On behalf of the Hanmer Springs School Board of Trustees I would like to update you on some of the exciting things that have been happening at Hanmer Springs School lately.

#### Goals for the year

The school produced a robust and thorough Strategic Plan for 2021 - 2023 and from this we are fortunate to see comprehensive Annual Plans develop. The board and staff are committed to achieving the well-rounded annual plans, which put our students' learning, achievement and wellbeing at the forefront.

#### **Staffing:**

In Term 1 we welcomed Rebecca Hay to the school. Rebecca is teaching the Year 6,7,8 class, she is also the Staff Representative on the Board and holds the Sport Management Portfolio.

Sharon Brown commenced with us at the start of Term 2 teaching our Year 2,3 tamariki. Sharon comes to us from Kaipara Flats School but is originally from Christchurch.

The school's new principal, John McBride, and his family will arrive in Hanmer Springs early July, ready to commence at the start of Term 3. The board is very excited about John's arrival, moving the school forward with our strategic plan, direction, cementing a strong school culture and bringing his own style to our school. The work our Acting Principal, Bob Norrish has achieved during his time with us is setting the school up very well for John's arrival and we are extremely grateful to have had Bob's knowledge, experience and steady leadership during this period.

The school currently has a role of 93 with another 5 students to start by the end of term 2.

The makeup of our staff includes 4 permanent teaching staff, 5 Teacher Aides, 3 Relief Teachers, a Learning Support Co-ordinator, an ORS Teacher, Administrator, Maintenance Person and Principal.

#### **Property Projects**

The school has seen some major property work being undertaken this year, creating flexible learning spaces in our senior and junior teaching spaces and the refurbishment of our oldest classroom which is now fully double glazed, Autex sound reducing wall coverings, new carpet tiles, and a wet zone for art and crafts. We've also created a Learning Support Space that will be hugely beneficial providing a designated quiet space to work with students.

Planning has already commenced on our next large property projects and we look forward to updating the community with more information about these in due course.

The Multipurpose Court has been completed and is proving a valuable space for sports and activities on a year-round surface. The official opening of the court will be incorporated with the 125<sup>th</sup> Celebrations.

#### **Finances:**

The school is facing a tough financial year ahead with a large, budgeted deficit. This is due to many factors outside of the board's control; the 2022 budget is a 'bare bones' budget and there is no extravagance. The board works hard to manage its budget constraints and to minimise any financial deficits. The deficit this financial year is due to a number of factors: mainly additional funding for Teacher Aides, rising operational, insurance and compliance costs.

The Board has invested significant funds into teacher aide hours over the last four years. Our teacher aides enhance every students' learning across the year levels, assisting teachers by taking either individuals or small break out groups so teachers can provide the necessary learning opportunities. Our teacher aides are increasingly helping with our innovative Literacy programmes in classes, as well as enabling teachers to undertake imperative student testing and being a constant support person. Our teacher aides are essential to all our students' learning as well as working with students with special needs who require one-to-one support. Because of our size and the distribution of children throughout the age levels this year, we have mixed level classes and so our teacher aides are invaluable to ensuring that all children have their learning needs met.

Our teacher aides are provided relevant professional development training and we are fortunate to have such dedicated and able teacher aides. The funding provided by the Ministry of Education and other agencies we work with does not cover the full cost of our teacher aides, and so we invest significant board funds in this area.

#### THANK YOU!

We are extremely grateful to our Home & School Association for the work they do to enhance our school environment, providing fun activities for the students and the various fundraisers they coordinate to raise invaluable funds for our school. From apples, posters, t-towels, firewood and catering to bake sales and the STARS production!

To our incredible local businesses and community, thank you for your generous support of the school throughout the years. Without you we could not achieve what we do for our students and school. Your continued support, however you can assist, will be greatly appreciated so the board can maintain the additional teacher aide funding that it requires to ensure our tamariki get the necessary support and learning opportunities they need at school.

## Council Update

From Cr Mary Holloway

### 3 Waters Reform update

Hurunui District Council opposes the 3 waters reform model as proposed by this Government, mainly because we believe our water will end up costing more, because assets paid for by us over generations will be in effect confiscated, and because we believe that our ratepayers want to be able to have a say in their water delivery. To this end, our Mayor and executive have been working tirelessly with those of other councils (C4LD- Communities for local democracy)- firstly to prevent the reform from happening but also to come up with a better model to assist those councils who need help to update infrastructure without removing those assets from local ownership.

Next week, 3 Councils will take a case to the High Court to have a decision made on what exactly the 'ownership' of water infrastructure means as Central Government insists that although they will control the water assets, they wont have to pay for them because we will still own the assets!

As users of water, it will pay for you to stay informed on this topic if you don't want this necessary-for-life resource to fall into the powerful hands of a few, and ultimately risk privatisation sometime in the future.

## Budget adjustments

Like any business in the country Hurunui District Council is affected by shortages of materials and the ensuing price rises, labour cost rises etc. On top of this, the roading team have had to fund the damage caused by the December 2021 rain event and that of ex cyclone Dovi in February of this year. These adjustments are presented to you the ratepayers in our Annual Plan, (a mini Log term Plan). Last Monday evening the Council executive and 6 Councillors came to Hanmer Library to explain where we are at to ONE interested ratepayer- needless to say, that person made the most of the time to represent their concerns.

23	HDPE	High-density polyethylene - Milk and washing-up liquid bottles
ß	PVC	Polyvinyl chloride - Food trays, cling film, bottles for squash, mineral water and shampoo.
23	LDPE	Low density polyethylene - Carrier bags and bin liners.
£3	PP	Polypropylene - Margarine tubs, microwave- able meal trays.
B	PS	Polystyrene - Yoghurt pots, foam meat or fish trays, hamburger boxes and egg cartons, vending cups, plastic cutlery, protective packaging for electronic goods and toys.

Do I really need a booster? Getting your booster makes it less likely you'll get really sick with COVID-19, or pass it on. It is the best thing you can do to protect you and your whānau.

How old do I need to be? 16 and 17 year olds are now eligible for boosters too. For you, it needs to be at least 6 months since your second dose.

I've had COVID-19. Do I need to get boosted? Yup, because you can get COVID-19 again! Boosters help protect you from future infections.

#### I'm vaccinated. Why do I need a booster too?

After a while, your protection against the COVID-19 virus starts to drop away. The booster dose gives you added protection against Omicron.

#### When do I need to have my booster?

If you are 18 or over and had your second dose at least 3 months ago, it's time to get your free booster vaccine.

How long after infection should Iwait? You'll usually need to wait 3 months before getting any COVID-19 vaccination or

booster.



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
