These people will be self-isolating, as well as any household contacts living with them. **Household contacts** need to have a **Rapid Antigen Test** (RAT) for COVID-19 on **days 3 and 7** of their isolation.

- 1. Going online and recording it at https://mycovidrecord.nz OR
- 2. Calling **0800 222 478** and choose **option 3** Let's remember to be kind and help others in these challenging times

Contactless drop off supplies they need, like groceries, home baking or medicines

Pick up rapid antigen tests on their behalf

Give them a call on the phone and have a chat

If you have symptoms, book a FREE supervised Rapid Antigen Test and short consultation with us. Simply call our reception team on 03 315 7503.

Getting a COVID-19 vaccine if you've had COVID-19

It's now recommended by the Ministry of Health that you wait 3 months after you test positive for COVID-19 before getting any COVIDvaccination. This 19 recommendation is for all ages and applies to all COVID-19 vaccines available in New Zealand.



Waiting for 3 months after you test positive for COVID-19 can give you better protection and an increased immune response to the vaccine dose

However, you are can still have your FLU vaccination when you have completed your COVID-19 isolation and symptom free

If you call our clinic phone out of hours, your call is always answered by a registered nurse who will assess your needs, offer advice or, if required, pass the call to our on-call clinician. It can take several minutes to answer the phone so please be patient and hold, and follow the voice prompts carefully

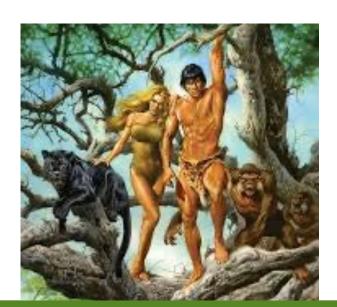

Chicken amatriciana traybake

Decent tomatoes and a bit of time are what make this dish sing. I always tend to use a chorizo on the hotter end of the spectrum for that lovely hit of spicy heat. If you can't find small new potatoes, simply cut your potatoes into largish bite-sized pieces to ensure that they cook in time. If using large tomatoes, you may wish to halve them horizontally before roasting.

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 2 cups fresh tomatoes (I used a mix of cherry tomatoes on the vine, and larger ox tomatoes)
- 6 garlic cloves, smashed
- 2 cups small new potatoes, scrubbed
- 1 fresh or cured chorizo sausage (about 125g; check gluten-free if required), casing removed, meat roughly chopped
- 500g chicken thighs (about 4 large)
- 400g can crushed tomatoes
- 1 tbsp dried thyme
- ½ cup white wine
- fresh thyme, micro basil, red basil and/or flat-leaf parsley, to garnish (optional)
- 3-4 tbsp grated pecorino or parmagiana (or to taste) Method
- 1. Preheat oven to 160C fan-forced (180C conventional).
- 2. Add the olive oil, tomatoes, garlic, potatoes and chorizo to a large baking tray and use your hands to toss and coat everything in the oil. Pop in the oven for 45 minutes or until the tomatoes are softened and jam-like, and the chorizo is crisp, and its coloured oil has oozed.
- 3. Increase the heat to 180C fan-forced (200C conventional). Add the chicken thighs to the tray, nestled in among the tomatoes and potatoes, and add a good heft of salt and pepper. While the chicken is cooking, combine the canned tomatoes, thyme and white wine in a jug and give it a quick stir with a fork. Cook the chicken for 10 minutes, then working quickly, open the oven door and pour the tomato and wine mixture into the corner of the baking dish. Cook for a further 20-30 minutes or until cooked to your liking.
- 3. To serve, top with the herbs and more salt and pepper. Add the grated pecorino and serve.

roasted lemongrass and turmeric chicken

This Vietnamese-inspired chicken dish is supremely versatile. Serve it straight from the roasting tray, with rice and shaved wombok (cabbage), and crushed salted red-skinned peanuts over the top. A little fermented chilli paste mixed with the pan juices makes a nice condiment, too. Chicken thighs are perfect for this dish – they really take on the marinade and the connective tissue makes for a succulent result. For more intense flavour, marinate overnight.

Ingredients

8 chicken thighs, skin on

For the marinade

- 2 lemongrass stalks, finely sliced on an angle
- 20g fresh turmeric, finely grated
- 2 red bullet chillies, split lengthways
- 2 heaped tbsp brown sugar
- 1 heaped tbsp vegetable stock powder
- 2 tsp ground white pepper
- 2½ tbsp fish sauce (preferably Vietnamese; check gluten-free if required)
- 2 tbsp rice wine vinegar

Method

- 1. Turn a chicken thigh skin-side down and run a knife along both edges of the bone, cutting along and around it until you can gently pull it away from the flesh. Repeat for each thigh.
- 2. Combine the marinade ingredients in a bowl. Pour half the mixture into the bottom of a shallow dish or storage container, spreading it evenly. Place the thighs in the dish, then spread the remaining marinade over the chicken. It's best refrigerated overnight, but not imperative: a few hours' marinating will still be worthwhile.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 220C (200C fan-forced).
- 4. Place thighs in a roasting tray and cook for 40 minutes, basting halfway through.
- 5. Remove from the oven, turn thighs in the cooking juices and serve straight away with rice and condiments.



Sticking to the game plan

The next 12 months will be all about sticking to the project delivery game plan for Hurunui District Council, despite the unprecedented inflation.

Council carefully scrutinised operational and project costs before agreeing to propose an average rates increase of 10.5% for the 2022-23 year.

This rates increase is greater than the 4.99% figure indicated in the Long Term Plan 2021-2031 (LTP), which Mayor Marie Black said was not a decision made lightly, but was necessary to ensure service delivery was maintained.

She said the current economic climate has significantly superseded the inflation rates Council had allowed for in the LTP, that being a 2.82% increase for Operating Expenditure and 3.01% for Capital Expenditure.

"But financial trends like this make up part of the picture of the Current Consumer Price Index of 6.9%, and cannot be absorbed in the account books."

Council has recently renewed its roading contract, and after a period of seven years since the last contract was entered into, there has been an allowed budget increase of 30%.

"This is an economic trend Council predicts will be long term, so it is unattainable to cut roading services from the 2022-23 budget."

Mayor Black added that roading is an essential part of Council service delivery, and it remains vitally important for Councillors and Council officers to continue the investment in this area. "We want to meet the community expectations of safe roads for everyone."

The LTP budgets were prepared on a range of assumptions, particularly relating to inflation and interest rates, both of which did have a level of uncertainty.

Mayor Black said inflation is reflected in many forms, from the cost of fuel and groceries to the cost of materials for water supplies and infrastructure, and the operating costs of key services such as public toilets.

"Staffing costs and interest costs have also increased."

Council has also faced a difficult trading year for Hanmer Springs Thermal Pool & Spa due to the full lockdown in August 2021 and the continual restrictions until the country moved out of the Red Traffic Light setting early in April 2022.

"The forecast for the current year has been pulled back to reflect this."

Mayor Black said they are challenges everyone is facing. "Despite this, we ensure we will be carrying on as usual with the high level of service delivery."

There will be opportunities for ratepayers of Hurunui District to provide their feedback on the proposed rates increase. Further detail on the Draft Annual Plan and Community Engagement opportunities will be announced from next Monday.

All comments should arrive no later than 5:00pm on Monday 6 June.

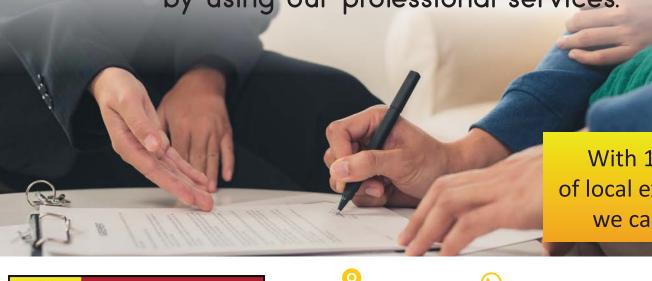

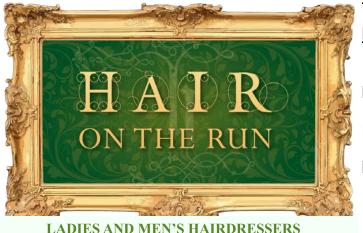

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THE NEXT 12 MONTHS IN NEW ZEALAND LOOKS AS THOUGH WE WILL ALL NEED TO TIGHTEN UP SOMEWHAT - A FEW THOUGHTS, COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS TOWARDS THIS END

- Don't keep looking at your KiwiSaver or share market investments: They will almost certainly turn up again in time as has happened a number of times over a number of years.
- 2. Make sure any new borrowing has a real reason that stands up.
- 3. Have your Income Tax Return/Financial Statements prepared early why, because:
 - (a) You may have a refund due and the sooner you get it the better.
 - (b) If you have tax to pay you are much better to know how much and to know six months before the due payment date.
- 4. If you are a regular coffee drinker at a regular haven, why not negotiate a 10% discount this makes sense for both parties.
- 5. Where will most of the financial pressure be probably with New Zealand single income families parents and grandparents need to keep a close watch on this potential family situation.
- 6. If you can't afford it, then you can't afford it don't make a fool of yourself in this area.
- 7. A good boarder can work well, a bad boarder can be a disaster do the homework first, not later. The boarder payments will vary, but \$125-\$150 week depending upon several issues is common.
- The medical/health premiums are getting more and more significant - providing a couple are both not accident prone, then paying the first, say, \$2,000 of any medical event from personal finances can reduce the annual premium by 25%-30%.
- 9. One credit card is almost one too many.
- 10. Significant short term debt is a killer if it is a good debt then spread it over time.
- 11. There is nothing wrong with a reverse mortgage, but borrow it as late on as possible and borrow as little as possible remember the mortgage will double in value around every ten years.
- 12. Every time you turn your car engine on, then on average you are about to spend another \$20 there needs to be a sign or message on your car key ring reminding you of this.

- 13. Keep your children and grandchildren off the open road on motorbikes - rattle the piggy banks and lend them enough to purchase a small car preferably with air bags and disc brakes - this includes husbands with iron disease.
- 14. The New Zealand Reserve Bank is between a rock and a hard place it needs to increase the interest rates to dampen down inflation but higher interest rates will cause other issues don't pin your hope on our Reserve Bank you are on your own.
- 15. At present the price increases we are all facing are around 7% there will be quite a time lag before Government and our Reserve Bank can get this back to 2%-3% a drop in price is possible, but much of the inflation increase is in wages and you will not be able to drop this cost.
- 16. If you are going through a very tight spot then ask your bank for 12 months of no loan principal repayments.
- 17. Don't spend precious cash on Student Loan repayments, these loans will be automatically reduced by 12% a year once the loan borrowers' earnings get over \$21,268 in any one year.
- 18. If you cannot live within your income then don't just turn the light off focus on minimising the cash loss.
- 19. Benjamin Franklin said "Wise men don't need advice and fools won't take it" seek advice top advice can be really valuable when you are going through a low patch there is though no halfway house for top advice.
- 20. Blessed are the young for they will inherit the national debt we are loading up our children but a couple who will own a debt free house at 70 years of age, with, say, two children, will probably leave those children \$300,000 each when their children are in their 70s you may have no cash but words and promises can be just about as good.
- 21. Nothing is set in concrete if all New Zealand economists were laid end to end they probably would not reach a conclusion the best decision is one you can run with and cope with and live from to fight another day.
- 22. Do not sweat the little stuff but dig in on the heavy stuff.
- 23. Make sure your bathroom floor is very non-slip.

Money often costs too much - anyone over about 15 years can relate to this.

There are really three kinds of people:

- The "haves"
- The "have nots"
- And the "have not paid for what they have".
 You know which group here to head for.

The "rule of 72" tells you how long your return on some investment will take to double, that is at 6% it will take 12 years - this rule is the core of many financial developments - forget this rule though for the next 12 months.

Remember it is better to have bread with water than cake with trouble.

- 25. If you are in a bad situation, don't worry, dig in and it will change if you are in a good situation then don't worry as it will change also.

- 27. A reasonably good vegetable garden will really pay its way in these times but it needs to be planted.
- 28. You reap what you sow in this world of ours you don't need to plan for losses as losses manage themselves, but you do need to plan to live within your income.
