FLU AND COVID-19 - VACCINATION CLINICS

Many homes in New Zealand are damp, cold and unhealthy. In winter, they are on average 6°C below the World Health Organization's recommended minimum indoor temperature of 18°C. A cold and damp home can increase the risk of respiratory illnesses such as asthma and serious chest infections.

Damp, draughty and poorly insulated homes are more expensive to heat.

Top Tips for keeping a healthy home this winter:

- 1. Insulate your house
- 2. Curtains mean a world of difference
- 3. Draught-proofing windows and doors
- 4. Reducing condensation
- 5. Getting a good heater
- 6. Moving furniture to free up space for the heat to adequately reach a room.
- 7. Airing your house out
- 8. Getting rid of mould

DIARRHOEA & VOMITING BUG – GOING AROUND!!!! Effecting children & adults

Please follow the plan below to help with recovery of this nasty bug.

- Cease food, rest the bowel & stomach

Aaron from Hanmer Attractions said they will run a workshop in the coming months for local residents on the basics of CPR and AED use.



Lemon Meringue Pie

This recipe is adapted from one by Chef from Alice Waters of Chez Panisse

INGREDIENTS

Flaky pie crust, enough for a 9-inch shell

THE FILLING:

- 2 lemons
- 2 eggs
- 3 egg yolks
- 6 tablespoons sugar
- 3 tablespoons salted butter, cut in 3 pieces
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut in 3 pieces

THE MERINGUE:

- 3 egg whites, at warm room temperature
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 6 tablespoons superfine sugar
- ½ teaspoon vanilla extract

PREPARATION

Prepare the shell. Roll the pastry into a 12-inch circle, 1/8-inch thick, and fit gently into the pan. Trim the edge a half-inch beyond the rim, fold under and crimp or pinch to make a decorative edge. Prick the bottom with a fork. Freeze the shell for 20 to 30 minutes.

Prepare the filling. Grate the zest from the lemons into a small, stainless bowl. Strain in the lemon juice, then press through as much lemon pulp as possible.

In a heavy, stainless saucepan, beat the eggs, yolks and sugar until just mixed. Stir in the lemon juice and pulp, then the six tablespoons of butter.

Cook, stirring constantly, over low to medium heat, until the mixture comes together and thickens enough to coat a spoon.

Remove from heat, allow to stand five minutes, then whisk briefly to smooth. Set aside.

Preheat the oven to 190 degrees C. Line the frozen shell with aluminium foil, weight with beans or pie weights and bake for 20 minutes, or until set and dry looking. Remove the weights and foil, turn the heat down to 180 and continue baking until shell is golden brown, about 12 to 15 minutes.

Set aside and allow to cool slightly, but leave the oven on. Spread the prepared filling in the shell and bake for 10 to 15 minutes or until the filling is just set. Remove pie and turn oven to 190.

Make the meringue. Beat the egg whites until frothy, add the cream of tartar and continue beating until rounded peaks form. Beat in sugar and vanilla.

Spread the meringue over the filling, making sure it meets the edges of the crust to make a seal.

Swirl in a design with a knife or spatula and bake for about 10 minutes, or until the meringue is lightly browned.

Allow to cool completely, from one to two hours, but do not refrigerate.

One Bowl Carrot Cake

The tangy, rich cream cheese topping on this cake can travel — even on a hot day. Silky with sour cream, it bakes right over the batter and develops a caramelised flavour reminiscent of Basque cheesecake. As it cools, the deeply browned surface ripples, and the custardy cream cheese layer sets. The carrot cake beneath packs more carrots than most classic versions for a more complex natural sweetness and fine, sturdy crumb. Both batters are mixed by hand in the same bowl, making prep and clean up especially easy. INGREDIENTS

FOR THE TOPPING:

1 (8-ounce/226-gram) block cream cheese, softened

½ packed cup confectioners' sugar

1/4 teaspoon fine sea salt

1 large egg

1/2 cup/120 grams sour cream

FOR THE CAKE:

Nonstick cooking spray

2 large eggs

³/₄ cup/168 grams granulated sugar

1/2 cup/100 grams neutral oil, such as vegetable oil

1 cup/135 grams all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon any combination of ground cinnamon, cardamom, ginger or nutmeg

½ teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt

2 packed cups/260 grams coarsely grated peeled carrots (from 3 medium carrots)

PREPARATION

Heat oven to 190 degrees. Lightly coat an 8-inch square baking pan with cooking spray. Line the bottom and sides with parchment paper, and spray again.

Make the topping: Whisk the cream cheese in a large bowl until smooth. Add the confectioners' sugar and salt, and stir slowly with a whisk until no traces of sugar remain, then whisk rapidly until smooth. Add the egg and whisk until fully incorporated, then whisk in the sour cream until smooth. Using a silicone spatula, scrape the mixture into a pastry bag fitted with a 1/2-inch plain tip or a gallon-size resealable plastic bag, and set aside. Reserve the bowl, whisk and spatula without washing.

Make the cake batter: Combine the eggs and granulated sugar in the reserved bowl and beat with the whisk until evenly combined. While whisking, add the oil in a steady stream and whisk until emulsified. Add the flour, spice, baking powder, baking soda and salt, and use the spatula to fold into the wet ingredients just until the dry ingredients disappear. Add the carrots and fold until evenly distributed.

Scrape the cake batter into the prepared pan and spread evenly. If using a plastic bag, snip a 1/2-inch hole in a lower corner. Pipe the topping gently and evenly over the batter to completely cover it. It's OK if it looks bumpy; it will even out in the oven.

Bake until the top is golden brown and a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out with bits of the topping but no cake batter, 50 to 60 minutes. (If your cream cheese layer doesn't take on very much colour by the time the cake has finished cooking, you can broil it until the top is browned in spots, 1 to 2 minutes.)

Cool completely in the pan on a wire rack. Cut directly in the pan to serve, or slide out of the pan using the parchment paper to cut into squares. The cake can be refrigerated in an airtight container for up to 5 days. Bring to room temperature before serving.



Recent build cost estimates for the stadium are looking like they will cause a major divide for Christchurch ratepayers. Let's see if we can put together some sort of rational picture and history:

- (a) Lancaster Park comprises approximately 6 ha.
- (b) It was opened in 1881 and closed in 2011.
- (c) Ownership was transferred from the Victorian Park Trust at no cost to the Christchurch City Council in 2008.
- (d) The name Lancaster came from the first owner of the land in 1850.
- (e) The park was called Jade Stadium from 1998 to 2007 and AMI Stadium from 2007 to 2011.
- (f) It was a potato farm in 1945.
- (g) In 1986 "Dire Straits" played there to a record crowd of 64,000.
- (h) How much has the Council spent so far on the potential rebuild: Approximately \$40,000,000.

Now, let's try and look forward:

- 1. Let's say the final cost ends up being 10% higher than the most recent estimate of \$683,000,000 that is a final cost of \$750,000,000.
- 2. The planned completion date is 1 April 2026 let's push that forward to 1 April 2027 this will mean Christchurch has had no permanent stadium for 16 years (2011 to 2027).
- 3. What did the Forsyth Barr Stadium in Dunedin cost on 5 August 2011 it took two years and three months to build it's final cost (excluding land) was \$224,400,000, with a capacity of 30,748 seats and an enclosed roof reasonably similar to what is proposed for the Christchurch Stadium.
- 4. COVID has affected the Forsyth Barr Stadium returns with the gross annual revenue being of the order of \$11,000,000/year and with its overall expenses being similar. Since 2011 it has some \$8,500,000 of accumulated losses

 Around the world these big stadiums have struggled to stand alone financially.
- Consequently, there appears to be two key questions: (a)How could the Christchurch Stadium be financed satisfactorily from the outset?
 (a) How could the Christchurch Stadium be(b)
 Once it is up and running can it stand on its own feet financially and cash wise?

6. Possible initial financing:

Total Estimated Cost (\$683,000,000 plus 10% by 1 April 2027) Financed perhaps from:

Insurance Proceeds Received	\$50,000,000
Government Contribution	\$220,000,000
Other Councils (say two)	\$10,000,000
Sale of Orangetheory Stadium (say)	\$35,000,000
Naming Rights (say)	\$2,000,000
Bank Term Loan	\$100,000,000
Various Other Contributions (say)	\$5,000,000
Special Rates Levy (see PS at end)	\$115,000,000
Shortfall: Christchurch City Council	\$213,000,000
	\$750,000,000

- 7. What might the annual revenue be, say, for the year to end 31 March 2028 (first operational year) based on no "Black Swan" type event (that is no Covid type issues) this is a very real question which the Council will have to estimate for the public but let's say:
 - (a) 33 major events per year.
 - (b) Average of 20,000 people per event.
 - (c) Average cost of \$25 per person (\$100 for a family of four).

This equation comes out at: $20,000 \times 33 \times $25 = $16,500,000$ (GST exclusive).

8. Based on points 6 and 7, what might the first full year's Financial Statements on end 31 March 2028 look like:

a profit and loss basis for the year to \$16,500,000

- 9. Suggested Summary:
- (a) These estimated initial financing and the estimated income and expenses are a complete guess. The Council will need to commit their estimates to paper for the Christchurc ratepayers.
- (b) The Council may well find other assets it can sell as well as the Orangetheory Stadium.
- (c) Government, in an election year, may find another \$50,000,000, but it may not also.
- (d) Technically, there will be an annual depreciation claim for Income Tax purposes of perhaps \$5,000,000/year, which is not included in our point 8 simply because it is a non-cash cost the bottom line here is that the venture will pay little or no Income Tax probably forever.
- (e) It is hard to see how the Council will repay the \$100,000,000 bank term loan we have allowed for except via another special rates levy.
- (f) Worldwide most of these big stadiums really struggle to balance their annual cashflow and it will not matter how good the accounting is and how good the management is with the Christchurch Stadium, the Council may well end up picking up losses over the years the key will be in limiting those losses, that would seem to be much more important in this case than maximising profits.
- g) The benefits to the community will be enormous and ongoing, particularly as the Christchurch and the surrounding area gets up to a population of perhaps 500,000. This is a very difficult benefit to measure, but a very real one.

10. Suggested Conclusion:

- (a) Work on a final cost as at 1 April 2027 of \$750,000,000.
- (b) The Christchurch City Council must commit to paper how they see the initial financing could work and how the annual Profit and Loss Account will work. They will be guessing in some areas, but they are the ones with "real skin" in this exercise and have the best data to date.
- c) How the initial financing is structured will also very much determine the annual profit and loss estimates.
