# Seasonal produce is the hero this week.

Asparagus season is in full swing, so make it a main player with dishes like asparagus salad and asparagus vinaigrette, or just cook it and dip it into hollandaise. It's really important to buy good quality local produce – not the imported variety – and support our farmers.



# Pea risotto recipe

Ingredients 1 knob butter 1 small brown onion 300g arborio rice 250ml white wine 1L vegetable stock or whey salt and pepper 100g ricotta 100g handful peas, de-shelled 100g handful snow peas, halved 1 lemon 1 tbsp olive oil 50g parmesan 1 tbsp chopped parsley, mint and basil 40g handful rocket leaves Method

Place a pot on heat and add the butter. Dice the onion and cook it in the foaming butter. Add the rice and white wine. Gradually add the stock or whey, stirring occasionally until the rice is just cooked. If more liquid is needed to cook the rice you can add a little water. Season with salt and pepper, ricotta, some of the peas, lemon and olive oil. Pop in a bowl and top with herbs, nasturtium leaves, raw peas and mint oil



# Asparagus, pea and buttermilk quiche

Ingredients 12 asparagus spears or green beans 1 leek, sliced 150g peas 1 zucchini, sliced 6 x 55g eggs 200ml buttermilk Grated nutmeg sea salt and pepper 100g grated cheese, eg, cheddar, gruyere Pastry: 150g plain flour, sifted 75g butter, chilled and diced pinch of salt Method

1. To make the pastry, whiz the flour, butter and salt for 10 seconds until it looks like coarse crumbs. Slowly add up to 60ml of icy-cold mineral water, pulsing, until it comes together as a ball of dough. Wrap and chill for 30 minutes. 2. Heat the oven to 200C. Roll the pastry to desired thickness and use it to line a 23-centimetre-cm wide fluted tart tin. Trim the pastry, with the pastry and trim, allowing for shrinkage. Line the pastry with foil and fill with raw beans or pastry weights.3. Bake for 10 minutes then remove the foil and weights, and bake for a further five minutes. Remove from the oven.4. Cut the asparagus in half, and slice the bottom half, keeping the top half whole. Add the asparagus, leek, peas and zucchini to a big pot of simmering salted water. When it returns to the boil, cook for 30 seconds, then drain and refresh vegetables in icedcold water. Drain well.5. Turn the oven down to 190C. Beat the eggs, buttermilk, nutmeg, salt and pepper together. Toss the vegetables with cheese and arrange in pastry base. Pour the egg mixture over the top, and bake for 40 minutes or until set and golden. Serve warm.

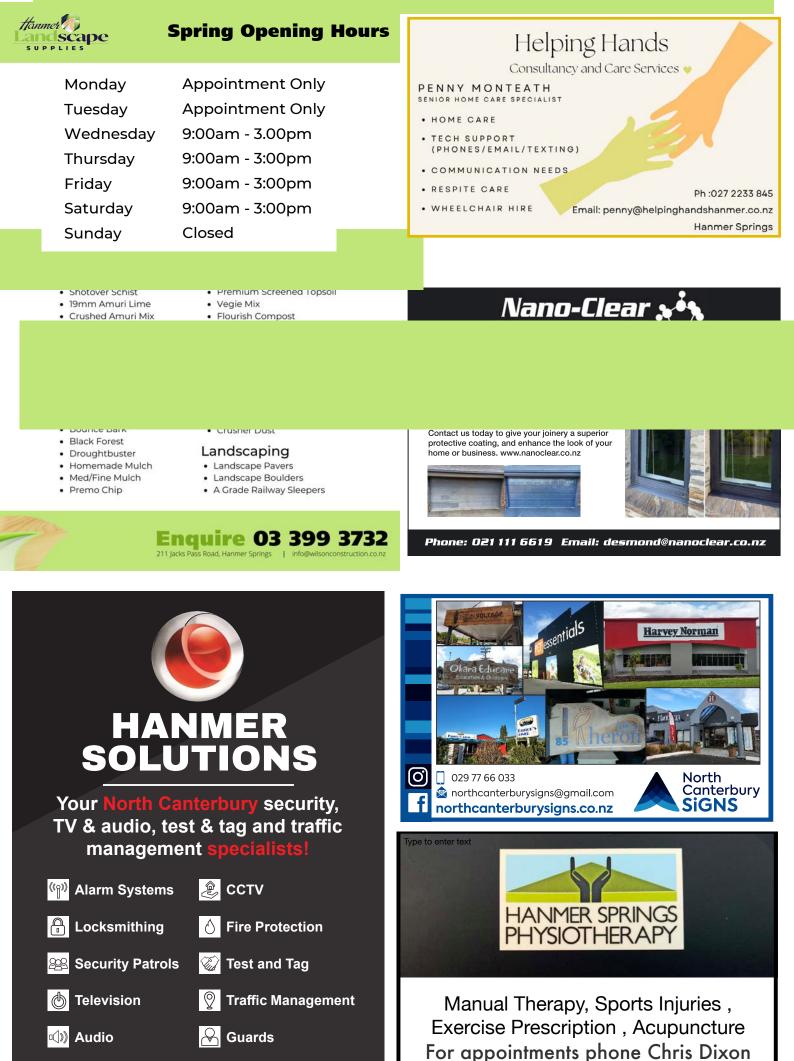

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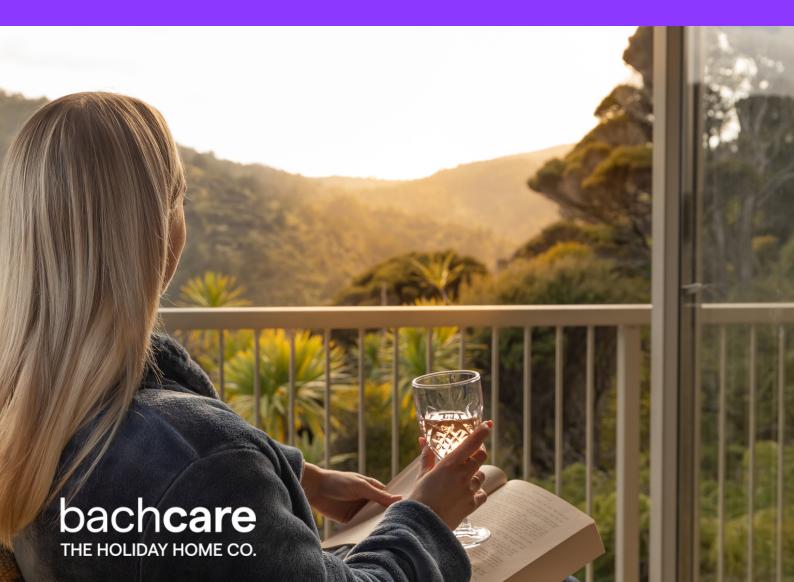

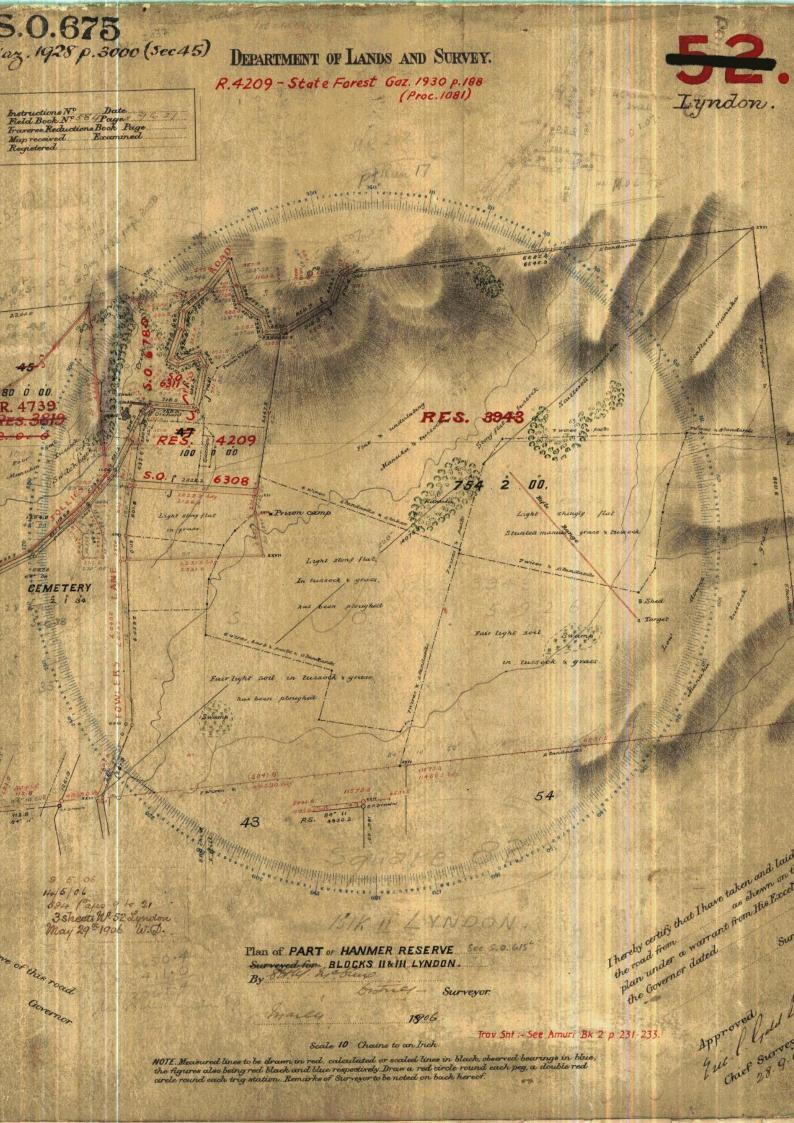














# Tom Davies Reflections

I was inaugurated as a Councillor on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> October at the Council Offices in Amberley. My wife Lorna, my son Joe, and newly elected ECan Councillor and his partner Lovisa were there to support me. It was a powerful and moving ceremony.

My role started the very next day meeting Wang Xiaolong, Ambassador of the Peoples Republic of China and He Ying, Consul General of the PRC at the celebration of Riwi Alley's 125 anniversary of his birth. Rewi was born in Springfield and went to school in Amberley. He moved to China and became a hero and huge personality in China, befriending Mao Tse Tung and other leaders. He is known throughout China as a Teacher, Innovator, and creator of many Apprenticeship schemes. He is in the top 10 list of foreigners who contributed to the development of China. He has millions of supporters and admirers.

I am also pleased to see that Charlotte Baldwin has been inspired to paint an electricity substation too. This is part of a Chorus competition and I wish her all the best of luck. I hope we can have more murals and beautification of our fantastic village and area.

I also look out for instances of great service and contribution to our community. These are based upon my observations and experiences and are purely my opinions. I am happy to shout out other examples that you see. I would like to give a big hand to Hanmer Springs Hotel. This is a great hotel and Cesare Stella is a great Chef. # **Boyle River**

On Wednesday the 19th of October, the year 5&6's went to Boyle River Camp. Before we left we had to load our bags into the cars, go over the expectations, and do the roll. Once that was complete, we left Hanmer Springs and headed to Boyle.

When we got there, we were told the safety rules and then we got split into groups 1, and group 2. Our first activity was just some getting-to-know-each-other games, my group played a game where we all stood in a circle. Then 1 person would be in the middle, say their name, and say 1 thing they enjoy! If we liked what was called out, we would have to switch places. We had 2-3 turns flying up and down and we could do a different pose every time. We could run up, we could swing, or we could lie down.

# Know your Plastic Codes as In Hurunui 1, 2 and 5 ONLY can be Recycled

Symbol	Acronym	Full name and uses
A	PET	Polyethylene terephthalate - Fizzy drink bottles and frozen ready meal packages.
23	HDPE	High-density polyethylene - Milk and washing-up liquid bottles
හ	PVC	Polyvinyl chloride - Food trays, cling film, bottles for squash, mineral water and shampoo.
23	LDPE	Low density polyethylene - Carrier bags and bin liners.
B	PP	Polypropylene - Margarine tubs, microwave- able meal trays.
B	PS	Polystyrene - Yoghurt pots, foam meat or fish trays, hamburger boxes and egg cartons, vending cups, plastic cutlery, protective packaging for electronic goods and toys.
æ	Other	Any other plastics that do not fall into any of the above categories. For example melamine, often used in plastic plates and cups.

Out of hours recycling facilities for paper, card, cans, plastics types 1, 2 & 5 only and glass bottles are provided; please ensure recycling is clean, loose and all lids are removed. Soft plastics (i.e. those you can scrunch in your hand) are not recyclable and must be placed in the refuse.

Kerbside refuse and recycling collection – Monday 8am

Only official refuse and recycling bags will be collected; these can be purchased from Hanmer Springs Service Station and the library.

Via the recycling bags clean paper, card, cans and plastics types 1, 2 & 5 only can be recycled.

If in doubt – place it in the refuse to save contaminating recycling.

Non complying bags and recycling bags containing glass and soft plastics will not be collected.

Please Note that HDC garbage & recycling bags are no longer available from the Four Square supermarket . Henceforth, bags will only be available from Hanmer Springs Service Station, the library, The Log Cabin and Super Liquor





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
