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Some Old Faces, Some New in Post Election Council Line-up

Who sits around Hurunui District Council's table for the new triennium is just about decided, with the announcement of the progress result, (which is based upon the counting of approximately 90% of the returned votes.) Voting closed at noon, Saturday October 8th, and although there was no Mayoral election for the District this time, voting numbers throughout the District were still healthy. Marie Black retains her Mayoral chains, with her position being unopposed for this year's Local Body Election.

Based on the progress result:

Representing the South Ward will be Robbie Bruerton, Garry Jackson, Pauline White, Vanessa McPherson. Representing the East Ward will be Vincent Daly, Fiona Harris.

Representing the West Ward will be Karen Armstrong, Ross Barnes, Tom Davies, David Hislop.

Representing the Hanmer Springs Community Board will be Mary Holloway, Chris Hughey, Michael Malthus, Alice Stielow, Richard Tapper.

Black is looking forward to working with her new Councillors, some being familiar faces while there are some fresh faces too.

She is hopeful for a less turbulent three years after the global pandemic of COVID-19, and the major earthquake of November 2016 which caused significant damage to parts of the Hurunui District during which time she was Deputy Mayor.

Her two-term tenure as Deputy Mayor also included some significant drought-stricken years, when community support was paramount.

"This level of community support for crises our communities endure was forced to stop during the pandemic, so I am very much looking forward to having this aspect of community wellbeing a possibility again now."

Entering her second term as Mayor, Black remains firm with her passion for localism, and is confident this can transpire through collective minds and ideas around the Council table.

"As a democratic society, we all believe in our future, and ideas borne out of a new triennium should be an exciting time for everyone in this District."

The Official Result Declaration will be released by the Electoral Commission by Thursday October 13th. At the inaugural meeting on Tuesday November 1st the Deputy Mayor position will be appointed, as well as the representatives on the main Council Committees.

Summer makeovers for some local camping grounds.

Campgrounds around Hurunui can look forward to a facelift, thanks to a successful external tourism fund application.

In March, Hurunui District Council applied for a share of the Tourism Infrastructure Fund (TIF), to improve Councilowned campground facilities across the District. In June, \$354,023.50 was granted, which covers 50% of the District-wide campground upgrade work.

Eight campgrounds submitted, the community groups working closely with Council Officers and facility block provider Kiwicamp, to establish the requirements to enhance services and generate more revenue. Kiwicamp will be providing digital honesty boxes, solar power systems, charging stations for caravans, cars and e-bikes, boom gates and security, WIFI Pods, as well as fitted-out laundry, shower, toilet and kitchen facilities.

Chief Operations Officer Dan Harris said working closely with the local communities meant the unique style and feel of each campground will be upheld.

Aligning with the Council's Strategy for the District's growth, the building of infrastructure in camping grounds helps to maximise economic productivity and support recreation in Hurunui. The Council's Strategy for Vibrant Communities is achieved through upgrading and delivering required infrastructure in the campgrounds, establishing needs and gaps to target customer engagement.

Harris was confident these developments in the campgrounds will encourage easier payment for visitors, thanks to the digital honesty boxes rather than the current cash honesty box system. This will mean increased revenue for the campgrounds.


"Having quality campgrounds means vibrant communities, and healthy tourism, which collectively helps achieve successful planning for the District's future," said Harris.

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Memorial Plaque Opened at Pools for Late Tim Herrick

Last Friday saw the unveiling of a memorial plaque for the late Tim Herrick at the Hanmer Springs Thermal Pools & Spa offices. Tim was the Chairman of the Hanmer Springs Pools and Spa Management Committee from 1992 until 2005. He had an enduring love of Hanmer Springs and owned a house here for many years. His impressive input into both the concept and management of the pools complex is responsible for much that exists today.

It was obvious from Graeme Abbot's speech that the two had enjoyed a great rapport.

As Graeme said, "Tim was a very special man and we were remembering and recognising someone who was dear to all of us who knew and worked with him."

The unveiling was attended by Tim's family, daughter Belinda with her husband Phil and their sons, as well as son, Michael with wife Kim and their three children.

Graeme said, "People often ask me why I think the pools are successful and typically my response talks about our location, our staff, our Christchurch market, and our water. But I typically end on two points.

"First of all, the vision that was shown in the early 90s to see that a complex (that at that point in time consisted of three Hex pools and a freshwater pool) could become something very special and world class. I'm not sure they saw it exactly as you see it today, but they believed it had potential and how right they were.

"The other key point was structuring the management committee in a way that still had it firmly part of HDC but with two independent directors who had considerable influence. Tim was the key driver in sorting out that structure and it still holds us in good stead today.


"Tim loved the fact that we were successful and that we won all sorts of awards. He attended a number of those functions and was very proud of the Pools being recognised and would always have a comment that went along the lines of "and so we should bloody-well win them, we are damn good."

Speed limit decision making for local roads changes hands.

Hurunui District Council's Bylaw that has set the speed limits on Hurunui District roads since 2020, is now history.

Waka Kotahi/NZ Transport Agency (NZTA) will now govern the speeds on all roads throughout New Zealand, subsequently replacing the Council's current Speed Limits Bylaw 2020.

The decision to revoke the Council's Bylaw was unanimously agreed to by Councillors at the September 29th Council meeting.

Previous to September 29, HDC as a road controlling authority has been legally required to have a bylaw to set speed limits on all roads within the jurisdiction of the Council other than State Highways, which are controlled by Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency.

The legislative changes do not automatically revoke the Speed Limits Bylaw 2020, it is up to each Council to do so.

Council's Chief Operations Officer Dan Harris said the advantage of revoking the Council's own Bylaw is that it ensures there is only one authoritative source of law on speed limits.

Throughout New Zealand, all councils will migrate their speeds over to the National Speed Limit Register (NSLR), which will now form the legal instrument for setting new speed limits.

It is an online register with a geospatial map providing speed limits on New Zealand's roads. "All existing speed limits will continue in force, as they are recorded in the NSLR," said Harris.

Future infrastructure investment decisions and speed management decisions will be made through a speed management planning process, aligned with the regional land transport planning process and the three-year cycle of the National Land Transport Programme. One key future requirement under the new structure will be for reduction of speed limits around all schools by 31 December 2027, with an interim target of 40% of schools by 30 June 2024.

"The environment for the speed outside each school must be right," said Harris, identifying that Hurunui District has a mix of rural and urban schools, on roads which vary in speed limits.

The changes to legislation also mean that the community will not need to be consulted for future speed changes. A Council Officer will be given delegated authority by the Chief Executive Officer to make speed limit submissions to NSLR. This will likely be tied into the Long Term Plan and the Activity Management Plan.


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It's a pool pass so great you'll want to guard it with your life...

According to historians, the first dressing shed was built in Hanmer Springs in 1871 by Mr John Fry. He built the shed and put in steps to the hot springs so his customers of the Jollies Pass Hotel could benefit from the thermal pools.

The site became a public establishment in 1883 when the Crown fenced it off for the paying public, and a jubilee of the pools in 1933 was celebrated with a parade through the village streets.

Graeme says the pools have certainly come a long way since the single dressing shed sat on a very exposed site in the Hanmer basin. The original hot spring is believed to be located next to the historic gasometer, near the current entrance of Hanmer Springs Thermal Pools and Spa. Early Māori were the first to discover the thermal springs while travelling through the region. While they

never settled in Hanmer Springs, the discovery of ancient native umu (ovens) indicated travellers' camps or signs that people had stopped.

Years later, in 1859, an announcement in The Lyttelton Times heralded the discovery of "hot water springs" by Mr William Jones. Mr John Fry built the first dressing shed 12 years later, in 1871.




"This anniversary is in recognition of the support we've enjoyed all these years, we want to celebrate the epic memories that hundreds of thousands of visitors have made at our place."

Korean Cheeseburgers With Sesame-Cucumber Pickles

Ingredients

- 2 teaspoons white wine vinegar
- salt and black pepper
- 2 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon turbinado sugar
- 2 large Persian cucumbers, sliced 1/8-inch-thick
- 1/4 cup low-sodium soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons chopped scallions
- 2 teaspoons minced garlic
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 21/2 teaspoons roasted sesame oil
- 1½ pounds ground beef
- 4 slices cheese
- 4hamburger buns
- Butter lettuce, sliced onions and sliced tomatoes, for serving

Preparation

In a medium bowl, combine vinegar, 1 teaspoon salt and 1 teaspoon sugar, stirring to dissolve the sugar. Add cucumbers and toss to coat, then let stand at room temperature. Heat griller to high and set oven rack 20 cm from heat. In a small bowl, combine soy sauce, scallions, garlic, ½ teaspoon pepper and remaining 2 tablespoons sugar. Mix well, stirring until the sugar is dissolved. Transfer 1 tablespoon of the marinade to a small bowl and stir in mayonnaise and ½ teaspoon sesame oil. Set aside.

In a medium bowl, combine beef and 3 tablespoons of the scallion marinade. Gently mix to incorporate. Form into 8 thin patties (each about 10 cm wide) and arrange in a single layer on a rimmed baking sheet. Brush tops with half of the marinade. Flip and brush with the remaining marinade. Broil until golden and caramelized on top, about 4 minutes. Arrange cheese on 4 patties, top with the remaining patties and let stand until cheese melts, about 1 minute.

Pour off all the liquid from the cucumbers and stir in the remaining 2 teaspoons sesame oil.

Smear the cut side of the buns with some of the seasoned mayonnaise. Arrange bottom buns on plates. Layer with lettuce, onion, tomato, double-stack burgers, pickles and top bun. Serve with extra pickles on the side.

Spiced Lamb Burgers

Because lamb is the most full-flavoured of the everyday meats, it makes a more delicious plain burger than beef. Cooked with nothing but salt, it's fantastic. Cooked with a variety of spices, as it is here, it's a game-changer. Ingredients

750 grams boneless lamb shoulder, cut into chunks

1 medium (or ½ large) onion, peeled and cut into chunks
1 fresh chilli, preferably jalapeño, seeded and minced
1 teaspoon ground coriander
1 teaspoon ground cumin
½ teaspoon turmeric
Salt
freshly ground black pepper to taste
Diced mango to garnish (optional)
green and red pepper to garnish (optional)
red onion to garnish (optional)
scallion to garnish (optional)
shredded carrot to garnish (optional)
shredded lettuce, to garnish (optional)

Preparation

If grilling or broiling, heat should be medium-high and rack about 15cm from fire. Put lamb and onion into a food processor (in batches if your machine is small) and pulse until coarsely ground. Put in a bowl with chilli, coriander, cumin and turmeric, and sprinkle with salt and pepper.

Mix, handling the meat as little as possible, until combined. Taste and adjust seasonings. Handling meat as lightly as possible to avoid compressing it, shape it into 4 or more burgers.

To broil or grill, cook about 3 minutes on each side for rare and another minute per side for each increasing stage of doneness. For stovetop, heat a large skillet over medium heat for 2 or 3 minutes, then add patties; cook, undisturbed, for about 2 minutes, then rotate them so they brown evenly. Turn once and cook for a total of about 6 minutes for rare. Garnish with diced mango, green and red pepper, red onion and scallion, and with shredded carrot and lettuce.
