Significant increase to value of roading assets, Annual Report adopted

Councillors have adopted the Annual Report for Hurunui District Council (HDC) for the 2021/22 year. Despite there being severe shortages of resources to undertake the auditing process for the Annual Report, the Council was fortunate to be able to retain its spot in the queue and be able to adopt the Report a full month ahead of the statutory deadline.

The report is dominated by the requirement for Council to undertake a full revaluation of its Roading Network as of 30 June 2022.

Chief Financial Officer Jason Beck said there was the expectation that the network's values would increase, given the new roading contract resulted in a 30% increase which necessitated the 10.5% in rates when the Annual Plan was adopted in June. "The increase to the value of the roading assets was 58%, pushing the value of the roading assets from \$267 million to \$421 million," Beck said.

From an operational point of view, in last year's Annual Report the Council was able to record an exceptional result for the balance books for the Hanmer Springs Thermal Pools & Spa (HSTP&S). Unfortunately, due to the period of lockdown in August 2021 and the extended period of restrictions, the HSTP&S recorded a surplus of only \$700,000. "Yet indications for the 2022/23 are promising with the results to the end of October exceeding budgets."

Overall, the operating surplus recorded for the year was \$5.5 million. Council's revenue for the year was \$61 million, some \$7.7 million above the budgeted level for the year, with Development Contributions and Vested Assets being ahead of level anticipated which reflected the increasing level of growth experienced in the Amberley area.

"The floods we experienced in the District meant Council was entitled to additional roading subsidies from Waka Kotahi/NZ Transport Agency, to help cover damages to our roading network."

Total expenditure for the year was \$56 million, some \$6.7 million ahead of the budget, with additional costs incurred in the roading area plus an additional level of depreciation for the year, a result of increased valuation of assets. The overall surplus was enhanced by the increase in value of the roading network as outlined above, which equated to a Total Comprehensive Revenue and Expense of \$160 million.

The total expenditure on assets amounted to \$22.7 million, only \$700,000 short of the budget set for the 12month period.

Beck said Council had significantly completed its capital programme it set out to achieve at the start of the year.

"As well as continuing work in the area of three waters, the Council also completed the construction of MainPower Amberley Pool in April of this year.

Despite achieving the significant capital programme, the Council's debt remained at \$38 million over the year, which was lower than the \$41.5 million that was anticipated in the budget.

Council plans to advance several projects relating to drinking water standard compliance in the 2022/2023 year, which Beck said will mean taking on more debt.

"As a Council we continually strive to deliver the highest quality of road network and water services, and unfortunately this all comes at a cost, which is not predicted to lower anytime soon."

Horsing around on the tops.

I had always been a keen tramper, dabbled a bit in mountaineering, ice and rock climbing when I was younger and have had a lasting love of botanising amongst alpine plants. However, as age has crept up I have found a way to cheat a bit. I enjoy riding my horse up onto the tops...and he enjoys it too.

The last 10 years have found us exploring around St James Conservation Area and Molesworth Station and beyond, so now, with other local riders, we are filling the bits in between that are sometimes a bit more technical from a back-country riding perspective.

The new route over Mt Dumblane from the Clarence river near to St James Station via the summit ridge to the top of Jacks Pass is one of those 'bits'.

We climb up a steep rocky ridge, beyond the wilding conifers that have been sprayed, winding around clumps of matagouri, sidling around a

couple of steep rock buttresses and eventually clamber up onto the summit ridge. The 360 degree view takes in the Hanmer Springs ski area, west to the Waiau Pass, North over Molesworth to the Rachael Range, then back to a glimpse of the Hanmer Plains nestled under the Leslie Hills.

Here we stop for a bite to eat for morning teaa breather for the horses (and a carrot and muesli bar for them) and to sit and take in the panorama. It has taken one hour since we left the homestead. This is the third foray on horseback over this route. Sean (a member of Hanmer Springs Horse Riders) recce'd the route on foot then a few of us rode over in early spring snow to try it out. Before that other club members marked a track from the Pass towards the summit.

Now the route is well marked. The hardest part is a steep clamber across the east face - part of which can be ridden (see photo) but the steepest part must be on foot. Horses must learn to stay behind and not to jump forward on top of the person leading. However the best horses learn to walk slowly in front so that the rider can hold onto the tail and be towed!

So this last ride was with two riders from up North who rode into Hanmer Springs and stayed. There just isn't access to riding like this up North they say. The route will be well used by visiting Canterbury and Nelson riders over the summer as a challenging way to get back to Hanmer Springs without going on the road.

Then I guess we will look to the next horizon!

Blah blah blah continued

It was **thirty years ago** that the world's "so-called leaders" gathered in Rio de Janeiro for the so-called Earth Summit. Everyone agreed that radical change was needed. To avert disaster, global CO₂ emissions, which were then running at around **twenty-two billion metric tons** a year, would have to be reduced, eventually almost to zero. How this would happen, no one really knew. Still, the goal of preventing "dangerous" warming was enshrined in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, which President George H. W. Bush cheerfully signed.

"Some find the challenges ahead overwhelming," Bush said. "I believe that their pessimism is unfounded."

A follow-up conference of the parties, or cop, took place in Kyoto in **1997**. By then, annual global emissions had risen to **twenty-four billion tons**. After much back-andforth, it was agreed that something had to be done. The Kyoto Protocol, an addendum to the Framework Convention, laid out specific emissionsreduction targets for countries to meet.

"I am both determined and optimistic that we can succeed," Vice- President Al Gore told the diplomats gathered in Japan.

After Kyoto, global emissions kept on rising, only faster. By **2009**, they'd climbed to **thirty-two billion** tons a year. That autumn, President Barack Obama flew to Copenhagen for yet another conference of the parties cop15.

"I believe that we can act boldly, and decisively, in the face of this common threat," he declared.

By 2015, emissions had increased to **thirty-five billion** tons a year. At that year's cop—No. 21—held in Paris, it was decided that, at last, really and truly, it was time to get serious. "The decisions you make here will reverberate down through the ages," the United Nations Secretary-General, Ban Ki-moon, told the delegates. Nevertheless, emissions continued to rise. In the past thirty years, humans have added as much CO to the atmosphere as they did in the previous thirty thousand. At some point during all the "blah, blah, blah"-ing—it's hard to say when, exactly—climate change ceased to be a prospective problem and became a clear and present one. **Since Rio, the Arctic ice cap has shrunk by twofifths. Greenland has shed some four trillion metric tons of ice, and mountain glaciers have lost six trillion tons.** In the past thirty years, humans have added as much CO₂ to the atmosphere as they did in the previous thirty thousand.

Heat waves are now hotter, droughts deeper, and storms more intense. In some parts of the world, the wildfire season never ends. One conclusion to draw from this pattern is that the world isn't going to avoid "dangerous" warming. Global leaders will continue to gather at cops —this year's, in Sharm el-Sheikh, just concluded—and to speak loftily about "net zero" and "a low-carbon economy." But nothing will change, and, as a result,

> everything will change. There will be large-scale crop failures. The Greenland ice sheet will start to collapse—it may already be collapsing—and, owing to sea-level rise in some places and desertification in others, large swathes of the globe will become uninhabitable.

> This conclusion is not, however, the one that Thunberg chose to draw

when she spoke at the Youth4Climate conference. "Right now we are still very much speeding in the wrong direction," she told the crowd in Milan. "But, of course, we can still turn this around—it is entirely possible.

"The leaders like to say, 'We can do this,' " she went on. "They obviously don't mean it, but we do—we can do this. I'm absolutely convinced that we can."

Or, as Thunberg might put it, Blah, blah, blah.





Council accepts Better Off Fund

An injection of funds may soon be available to Council as a result of the government's proposed Three Waters Reform.

At yesterday's monthly Council meeting, it was unanimously agreed to apply to the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA) for Tranche 1 of Better Off Funding.

The application will be for \$2.67 million. Despite this application, Council remains firmly opposed to the Reform as it currently stands. Chief Executive Officer Hamish Dobbie will submit the application, at which time he will make it clear to the DIA that Hurunui District Council remains strongly opposed to the current Three Waters Reform proposal, yet acknowledges that accepting Tranche 1 funding will enable the betterment of the District with funds being made available for various projects.

The DIA has stated Tranche 2 funding of \$8.01m will be available to the District for further works, in July 2024.

Dobbie suggested given the General Election between now and then, accepting Tranche 1 immediately de-risks the potential loss of funding if a change of government occurs.

"We are better to take the money now, rather than roll the dice and see if it's still available in 2024," said Dobbie.

Around the table, Councillors raised the issue of the risk of public perception that accepting the Fund equates to accepting the Reform, thereby neglecting its own people.

Dobbie responded by assuring Councillors that within the application, it will be clearly stated Council will concurrently continue to undertake all acts and responsibilities under the Local Government Act, which is to serve the community as best it can.

FARMING IN THE NETHERLANDS - MAYBE A LESSON FOR NEW ZEALAND By Pita Alexander On 17 December, 2021 the Dutch Government introduced a plan to reduce the country's livestock number by about 33% by 2030. What's the background?

- Netherlands land area 41,543 km² (NZ: 268,021 km² 6.45 times larger).
- 2. Netherlands population 17,222,213 (NZ: 5,124,100).
- Netherlands exports approximately \$107 billion (NZ\$).
- 4. Netherlands livestock numbers:
 11.4 million pigs
 100 million poultry
 3.8 million cattle (1.65 million dairy cows)
 482,000 goat dairy herd.
- 5. Netherlands livestock intensity Easily the highest in the EU four times higher than UK or France.
- 6. Is Netherlands a member of the 27 EU countries Yes.
- 7. Netherlands average farm size 41.7 ha.
- Number of farms: Arable (approximately 11,000) Pig farms (approximately 3,400) Dairy farms (approximately 16,000).
- How much is the special subsidy fund The Netherlands Government has created to help Dutch farmers exit their farms - \$36 billion (NZ\$) in terms of the 17 December 2021 announcement.
- 10. Netherlands Government debt to GDP ratio Approximately 50% (NZ: 33%).
- 11. The real issue with the special subsidy scheme is pollution.
- 12. Netherlands currency is the Euro since 1 January 1999.
- 13. One Euro as at 5 November 2022 is worth \$1.68 (NZ\$).
- 14. The Netherlands is second only to the USA as regards the overall value of agricultural exports to the world.
- 15. Government's real aim is to reduce nitrogen emissions by 50% by 2030.
- 16. The Netherlands Government estimates that 11,200 farmers will exit and 17,600 farmers will have to significantly reduce their livestock numbers.

What, perhaps, can NZ learn from all this:

- (a) NZ sheep numbers have come down from 70 million to 25 million over the last 40 years.
- (b) NZ does not have the extent of livestock waste manure problem that The Netherlands has.
- (c) Our NZ farm current size is a lot bigger at 240-250 ha - an advantage re spreading manure.
- (d) The NZ Government is now talking about an on-farm cost for emissions with these early Government suggestions looking marginal, if not unworkable.
- (e) Dutch farmers are protesting vigorously in all sorts of ways.

(f) The whole question of asking passionate farmers to reduce their livestock numbers, reduce their net income, reduce their job satisfaction, reduce their farm scale change, scale down their careers and change their lifestyle, is messy to say the least. The financial implications will be enormous, not only for the farming couple but for local communities and local business. For many farming couples any financial compensation will only be half the answer or less.

- (g) Through all of this, the world experts are also saying that by 2050 the world will:
 - 1. Require a lot more food to be produced.
 - 2. Require top quality food and less waste.
 - 3. Less irrigation water is to be used.
 - 4. Less chemical is to be used.
 - 5. Less land will be available.
 - 6. Less synthetic fertiliser is to be applied.
- 18. The whole equation here is going to require enormous ability to put in place - urban voters who comprise probably 80% of total voters will probably push all this through.
- Any lessons for NZ here may be less severe but NZ agriculture as a whole is not profitable enough to withstand these never-ending restrictive type regulations - the operation may be successful but the patient may die.
