Everyone agrees that there has been a greater concentration of wasps than normal this year.

The subject was raised at the recent Community Board meeting and they have asked the Pinkie to help to publicise the issue.

Everyone should be vigilant and report wasps' nests to either the Council (if the nest is on Council land you can use the Snap, Send, Solve app or report it directly to the Council) or to LJ at Hanmer Holiday Homes if the nest is on private land. It would be best for people to contact L.J. at Hanmer Holiday Homes directly on

New Zealand has some of the highest densities of common and German wasps ('social' wasps') in the world. This is because their natural predators are not present here, there is an abundance of food sources, and our winters are mild. Large densities have been observed in beech forests containing honey dew. These wasps

- Pose a danger to people working outdoors or who are allergic to their sting
- Reduce honeybees' productivity by raiding beehives and diminishing their food supply
- Have been known to kill newly hatched birds in their nest
- Eat native insects and honey dew, which are important food sources for many native species including kaka, tui and gecko

From 1 March, a new Pfizer COVID-19 bivalent vaccine will be available to eligible New Zealanders as a booster dose.

• This will replace the existing Pfizer booster and is considered likely to be more effective against Omicron subvariants than earlier vaccines.

From 1 April, an additional booster dose will be made available to:

- anyone aged 30 and over who has completed a primary course, as long as it's been at least 6 months since their last COVID-19 booster or positive COVID-19 test
- anyone at increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19 who has completed a primary course, as long as it's been at least 6 months since their last COVID-19 booster or positive COVID-19 test.

1 April is also the start of flu vaccination for 2023. We encourage everyone who is eligible to get their COVID-19 booster and flu vaccination to ensure that they are protected ahead of winter

If you call our clinic phone out of hours, your call is always answered by a registered nurse who will assess your needs, offer advice or, if required, pass the call to our on-call clinician. It can take several minutes to answer the phone so please be patient and hold, and follow the voice prompts carefully.



FlyWire Environment Court Hearing

The group calling themselves FOCH (Friends of Conical Hill) appealed the decision to grant consent to the Hanmer Springs Pools & Spa's proposed Flywire, a gravity based recreational activity.

The hearing is due to start on Monday 27th and could last five days. The Council gave the green light to the project after an independent commissioner said the majority of "actual and potential effects" on the environment would be minor and adequately addressed by consent conditions. FOCH claims that his decision was "flawed" and failed to

Reviewing the Shape of Local Government's future.

At the end of the month submissions close for the review into the Future For Local Government. Hurunui District's Mayor Marie Black says this review serves as an opportunity to rebuild the trust and confidence in what local councils deliver, and creates a clear and positive pathway for communities for the future.

Promoting decision making at local level, creating and maintaining the sense of belonging in local communities, and seeking secure and equitable funding are all key points discussed by the Mayor and councillors at a recent workshop at Hurunui District Council.

Mayor Black says building a stronger and more resilient relationship between local government and central government is vital, which will continue to strengthen the stance for local government to champion the wellbeing of its community.

For example, tapping into some government funding to build affordable houses supports the growth of communities as employment opportunities exist and communities are welcoming.

"Housing stock is the issue, therefore allowing local government to initiate this would help sustain our rural communities."

Mayor Black says the future sits around the idea of subsidiarity, decisions being made at community level.

"The focus needs to be around citizen-led democracy. In Hurunui we have had the long held belief and advocacy for community decision making, and would support this to continue beyond the reform. We have learned through local disasters that local-led will always bring the best outcomes.

For this reason, Mayor Black and her fellow councillors are opposed to one of the proposals in the draft review.

"Communities must be able to retain their identity and sense of belonging."

In the submission to government, Mayor Black and her councillors are requesting a pause on the Three Waters Reform proposal, until the review for Future For Local Government is complete and local councils can redesign their future first.

"How can we get excited about this massive opportunity to design our future, when for a district like ours, we are very focussed on retaining the opportunity to deliver to the community the services they deserve, like good water?"

Community-led democracy and being on the ground to serve its own people will remain the focus for Hurunui District Council. In addition, a strong relationship with a government creates confidence in funding streams and will certainly help.

"We have always managed and we always will, but I'm sure we could do things better if we had greater equity of funding to do that.



Hanmer Springs School Pinkie Report Week 4, 2023

Conservation visitors.

Last week Keegan and Marcia came in to talk about conservation. We first did a little bit of a 'guess the bird' competition. If we got the bird right we got a chocolate egg. Then we learnt about the black fronted terns that we have in the area. The terns that nest along the Clarence River and the Waiau River are nationally endangered, their nests blend in with rocks and driftwood. Only 28% of terns successfully hatch without being attacked by predators or flooded while in the egg. The eggs are white with brown specks. The conservation group that Keegan and Marcia work for are making diversions in the river so the predators can't get to the place where the terns are nesting. They also made little wooden places where the terns can go when it gets too hot. With all the efforts made by the group, the terns had 75% successful hatching, which is much better than previous years. Thank you to Keegan and Marcia for coming in and teaching us about the terns. It was great to learn about local birds which we see flying around whilst swimming at the Clarence River.

Art trip to Hanmer Animal Park.

On Thursday, we started our Amuri Show artwork. Kārearea are working on farm themed paintings so what better place to go than the Animal Park? It was raining so Constable Ken, who was visiting, and Mr McBride drove us down. We sat down and started to sketch out some of the animals. We sketched out the Texas longhorns, rabbits, ponies, goats and guinea pigs. Kirsty also brought over Rosie's dog, Penny. It was an amazing experience and a great place to practise our sketching skills! Thank you to Kirsty for supporting our school with this and we hope you all enjoy seeing our paintings at the Amuri A&P Show.

Girls Maths Club.

This week the weather was cold and rainy for the GMC to meet, so we did some paper craft inside practising our times tables. We coloured and folded and made "fortune tellers" with a twist! They had different times tables in them. We practised hard and against each other. We even tested Barb and Mr McBride out! A lot of fun! In a few weeks time the whole school will be having a times tables challenge in our different year groups. This will be a great way to motivate everyone to learn their times tables, which can be tricky for some students.



Sustainability.

Each class has been completing some artwork which will go on display at the Amuri A&P Show next weekend. Here are some examples from Kereru and Tui classes.



















Adopt a Community – help councils impacted by cyclone

We've all seen the devastating scenes caused by Cyclone Gabrielle and want to help in a meaningful way.

Adopting a Community is a nationwide initiative that connects councils with some of the most devastated regions – community to community.

How it works: an unaffected council is matched with a council and community badly hit by the cyclone – 'adopting' that community. The 'adopter' council then raises money for their adopted community – by encouraging donations to that council's mayoral relief fund or another official channel.

We know from Christchurch's experience getting communities back on their feet is a marathon, not a sprint. That's especially true with a disaster at this scale. We would be looking at medium and long-term support too.

So far 31 councils have adopted areas badly effected by the hurricane. There is nothing to say that independent townships like Hanmer Springs can't get involved in partnering with a town of similar size.

Somehow, it would seem much more real if we were to partner ourselves with one of the devastated towns.

Any ideas on finding the right town to adopt?

Local Government New Zealand launched this scheme at the end of last week on a council to council level but there is nothing to stop individual towns taking up the idea, We are sure there are dozens of communities that would be desperate for any help we could offer.





Climate Change





- Over the 10.5 years, the arrivals exceeded the departures by 295,415 (average of 28,405/ year).
- Notice the enormous fall off in arrivals and departures in the year ended 30 June 2021 and the year ended 30 June 2022 (Covidrelated).
- The average tourist spends \$185 200/day (\$NZ) while in New Zealand - average days in New Zealand around 16 - average overall spend \$3,000-\$3,300 per head.

So you have the background here. What are the key issues for us for the 2023 New Zealand Election?

- (a) Improve the individual Income Tax brackets as from 1 April 2024 to be perhaps:
- First \$3,000 of income to be tax free.
- Income from \$3,000 \$20,000 taxed at 12 cents in the dollar.
- Income from \$20,000 \$48,000 taxed at 15 cents in the dollar.
- Income from \$48,000 \$70,000 taxed at 25 cents in the dollar.
- Income from \$70,000 \$125,000 taxed at 28 cents in the dollar.
- Income over \$125,000 taxed at 35 cents in the dollar
- (b) The immigration data is complicated, but if a maximum permanent residency figure each year is, say, 15,000, this would suggest another 5,500 houses are needed each year. This, plus the net births less deaths figure of 24,804, would represent an annual increase of 39,804, which is an increase in the overall population of 0.76%. This would suggest a New Zealand population increase in 10 years' time of just on 400,000 perhaps this is any amount fast enough New Zealand infrastructure is struggling already with its present population.
- (c) Perhaps an increase in the National Superannuation eligibility to, say, 67 years of age, but not for another 30 years.

- (d) Perhaps any New Zealand individual earning more than (say) \$125,000 in any one year is not eligible for National Superannuation, again in 30 years' time.
- (e) Welfare benefits on the first of April each year to be the average of the last five years New Zealand inflation rate.
- (f) The writer has read the Green Party Manifesto. There are some good points and long-term plans, but long-term sustainable agriculture is not one of them.
- (g) The present government accommodation subsidy is presently costing around \$2.3 - \$2.5 billion a year - that is around \$6.5 million per day, every day. As at 28 September 2022, there are 279,283 households receiving the Accommodation Supplement, as it is called. This supplement is almost certain to double over the next 5-7 years, the way things are going. (h) At present, just over 630,000 New Zealand people (excluding National Superannuation) are receiving some form of welfare payment over a year. This total is close to 20% of the New Zealand adult population. You might not like the words, but this group are living beyond their income and have been doing so for some time. In many cases it is not their fault regarding bad luck, bad health and accidents, but the bottom line is that perhaps we have gone deep enough on Wellbeing, so called. If you add in the number receiving National Superannuation of 850,000, the total welfare group is 1,480,000 New Zealand people – close to 37% of the adult New Zealand population.
- (i) We cannot afford to get too high and mighty with some of our trading partners.
- (j) If the median income for a New Zealand individual is around \$63,000, this means he or she are paying 18.92% of that net income in Income Tax this is high enough.
- (k) Yes, the New Zealand government cannot afford to do everything it would like to do just like the average New Zealand individual. Learning to prioritise the available cash is such an important issue. Most governments are weak in this area if you cannot afford something, you cannot afford it.
- (I) Stop this nonsense about everybody having the right to own their own home. About 30% of New Zealand people are poor with money and the banks know this help long term renters by providing them with more long-term security and stability this is what Germany does.
- (m) Be careful how you treat the breadwinners
 that is, agriculture and tourism/hospitality.Treat them as co-partners in the long-term scheme of things.
- (n) Cyclone Gabrielle is perhaps going to cost government \$10 billion-\$15 billion and is shaping up to have quite an effect upon the election in the sense of narrowing down both parties possible capital spend.
- (o) Listen more to that hardworking group who are employing a lot of people, paying a lot of tax, educating their children well, providing for their retirement, not involved with crime, paying for most of their own health issues this group read a lot, action a lot of things, are good thinkers and have good memories.


