Climate change

Maths

Carbon dioxide hangs around in the atmosphere for a long time. How long, exactly, is complicated; what matters in terms of the math, though, is not annual but aggregate emissions. This is where the notion of a carbon budget comes from: for every increment of warming, there's a certain amount of CO₂, in total, that can be emitted.

The budget for warming of 1.5 degrees Celsius—almost three degrees Fahrenheit—has, for all intents and purposes, been spent; at current emissions rates, it will run out entirely by 2030. Even the budget for two degrees Celsius—more than 3.5 degrees Fahrenheit— is going fast. It could easily be exhausted within the next few decades.

The U.S., with less than a twentieth of the globe's population, accounts for a quarter of aggregate emissions. Europe, with about six per cent of the world's population, is responsible for another fifth. At this point, there's no way to shove all that CO₂, back underground so no way—or at least no safe way—for the rest of the world to catch up. This ethical challenge is as big as, or perhaps even bigger than, the technical challenge posed by climate change. But let's try to stay positive.

The North grew wealthy by burning fossil fuels. It should use that wealth to help other nations leapfrog to renewables. In 2009, at cop15, in Copenhagen, the world's richest countries took a first step in this direction. They pledged to create a fund to finance clean energy and climate adaptation in countries such as India, Uganda, and Somalia. The fund would grow steadily until, by 2020, it was disbursing a hundred billion dollars a year. Hillary Clinton, who was then the Secretary of State, said in Copenhagen that the U.S. recognised the need for "generous financial and technological support," particularly for the "poorest and most vulnerable."

Narratives

Narratives are socially constructed 'stories' that make sense of events," thereby lending "direction to human action." So observes a paper published recently in the journal Climatic Change by a team of European researchers. Climate-change narratives, the team notes, typically foreground "doom and gloom." Often they emphasize risk. If they're not retailing the latest warmingrelated disasters (fires, "floods, food shortages), they're predicting a future filled with even grimmer warmingrelated disasters (bigger fires, more severe "flooding, famines that threaten entire regions).

This approach, the researchers argue, can be counterproductive: "Narratives of fear can become self-fulfilling prophecies." If people believe that things will only get worse, they feel overwhelmed. If they feel overwhelmed, they're apt to throw up their hands, thus guaranteeing that things will only get worse. A diet of bad news leads to paralysis, which yields yet more bad news.

What's needed instead, the paper goes on, are narratives that "empower people to act." Such narratives tell a "positive and engaging "empower people to act." Such narratives tell a "positive and engaging story." They "articulate a vision of 'where we want to go'" and outline steps that could be taken to arrive at this metaphorical destination. Positive stories can also become self-fulfilling.

People who believe in a brighter future are more likely to put in the effort required to achieve it. When they put in that effort, they make discoveries that hasten progress. Along the way, they build communities that make positive change possible.

Particularly compelling, by the researchers' account, are "win-win" narratives. Some winwin narratives demonstrate how people can re-

duce emissions and, in the process, make money. Others centre on more intangible goals, such as creating a better world. In a 2008 speech pressing for a "global green new deal," Achim Steiner, then the administrator of the U.N.'s Environment Programme, described the "enormous economic, social, and environmental benefits likely to arise from combatting climate change." One of the key proponents of the Green New Deal in the U.S., Representative Alexandria Ocasio- Cortez, of New York, has argued that a crucial step toward building a more just, more environmentally sustainable future is imagining what this future would look like. "We can be whatever we have the courage to see," she has said.

"Optimism is a choice," notes Christiana Figueres, the Costa Rican diplomat who led the effort to get the Paris climate accord approved.

"Do you know of any challenge that mankind has had in the history of humankind that was actually successful in its achievement that started out with pessimism, that started out with defeatism?" Figueres asked at a conference a few years ago. "There isn't one," she said, answering her own question.



Recycling and Bottle Bins

Several people have asked us what we know about the removal of the recycling and bottle bins that were placed by the library.

We asked the question to the Hurunui Council who explained that there were several reasons they are not there now.

Firstly the Council has had a difficult job filling a staff vacancy with the departure of Rob van Kuelen from the transfer station and the emptying of these and other garbage receptacles in the village was a part of his duties. Secondly, there has been a high incidence of local businesses illegally disposing of their bottles in that bin.

Also over the Christmas and New Year the recycling bin was constantly filled with garbage including dirty nappies and other rotting household rubbish.

The Council have been seconding staff from other areas to look after the transfer station and emptying rubbish bins, but when we spoke to the CEO, he said they were not prepared to ask their staff to sort human faeces out of what was supposedly only recycling.

A decision on whether the bins will be replaced is yet to be made.

Pools go to 7 pm Closing Next Week

A statement issued by the Hanmer Springs Pools and Spa last Thursday they announced a change of closing time. "Like yourselves, we have had to change our business model this year to manage the shortage of available staff that the country finds itself in. This summer we have recruited a larger number of casual student staff than usual. As we are sure you will appreciate, this is the result of a national labour shortage and fewer international backpackers working in the area. After providing fantastic support to us this summer, many of our casual staff members will be returning to their school and university studies over the next few weeks, causing a further shortage for us.

To provide industry standard lifeguarding for our 24 pools and water slides for 11 hours per day, we require 37 Full-Time Equivalents (FTEs). Unfortunately, we currently only have 26 FTEs, meaning we do not have enough staff to safely sustain a 9pm closing time.

As a result, we are disappointed to share that our pools will be closing at 7pm from Monday 13 February.

We realise that this decision impacts on other businesses in and around Hanmer Springs. It is a decision that we do not take lightly.

We have considered several other options, such as opening later in the morning, staff overtime, or closing off certain parts of the complex. However, for health and safety reasons, these options are not viable.

We are actively hiring more staff, some of whom are currently completing lifeguard training. **We expect to be able to return to summer hours (10am – 9pm) for the Easter school holidays,** before reverting to 10am – 7pm through winter.

Further information, including the opening hours of our Spa, Cafe and iSITE are here. We know we are not the only local business struggling with staffing at the moment but please do reach out if you have any questions at all.

Notes from the Community Board Meeting 30 January

The first Community Board meeting of the year was held last Monday. All members of the board were present as well as the Mayor, Marie Black and Chief Strategy and Communications Officer, Judith Batchelor, Corporate Planner, Maria Edgar & Governance Advisor, Ann Thorp. Following is a summary of the topics which were covered.

Soldiers Block

Following numerous enquiries and a presentation from Barrie and Marguerite Clubb who are interested in finding a venue for the Hanmer branch of the Zealand Film Society, Judith Batchelor, who has been looking after progress gave those present a run-down on progress toward getting the Soldiers' Block upgraded, refurbished and operational.

Judith provided a report on her ongoing attempts to speed up this process. Much of the delay has been to do with the financing of the project and although one application for a grant had been refused a subsequent application for \$1.5 million has been approved, and soon due for receipt. Judith reported that the project was of necessity being divided into two stages, the first will be to provide the necessary earthquake strengthening and the renovation of what used to be called 'the recce room' which is the large room behind the portion where the verandah is. The second portion (the other octagonal building and surrounds) would be in Stage 2 and could possibly include Weta Workshops with an interactive display. Beyond that, all we can tell you is that things are progressing and Judith is very keen to get work underway. We would all love to see it operating as a viable community centre and there are already several parties who have expressed interest in being able to utilise the place. Unfortunately we have had to move at the pace of grant organisations and government departments but everything that can be done is being done to get the project moving faster.

We promise to keep everyone up to date as things progress toward the outcome we all want.

Naming of Right of Way

After consultation with the historian, Rosemary Ensor QM, and with the Council the Board has decided that the name for the right of way at 17 Tarndale Place will be Travers

Way. The name was selected to honour William Locke Travers who was a member of the House of Representatives, a practising lawyer and property owner in the Ada Valley and Lake Guyon as well as an early photographer and artist and the discoverer of a pass from Tarndale to Hanmer.

Reserves Management Plan Review

Maria Edgar, Corporate Planner with the HDC presented a report to the Community Board the intention of which was to have the members of the board to consider and discuss this process and provide any feedback or changes. A report of each of 27 individual reserves in Hanmer was studied. Policies and maps must now be revised and updated prior to the draft Reserves Management Plan being notified for public consultation. Community Board input included the need for consistent signage, distinguishing of boundaries, tree removal and replanting over the next 10 to 100 years, wheelchair access (particularly Conical Hill.

An act of Government requires Councils to update and review their Reserves Management Plan every 10 years.

Local Alcohol Policy Review

The board were advised that this review was being conducted this year by Council staff and other agencies. This will include a review of the current LAP as well as collecting data related to the sale and supply of alcohol. It will take into account and public concerns with regard to the sale and supply of alcohol in the Hurunui District

Elected Members Interests

New Government legislation has required that all Councillors and Board members submit an annual form about their personal finances and business interests. One or two board members thought that the information sought wanted too many personal details but they were reminded it is a Government Act and thus cannot be challenged at a Council level, although the Council will hold a register of members' interests

Other

Other matters discussed were changes to car parking at the entrance to the Heritage Forest in Jollies Pass Road. The board discussed the fact there was a long list of urgent maintenance for the Sports Pavilion. There was also a discussion on the need for a decision as to whether the Pavilion was in need of renovation or replacement. Also discussed were street lighting and footpaths along Woodbank Road.

Members of the public can attend Community Board meetings if they wish. The next meeting will be on Monday 20th February at 1 pm
