FLU VACCINE - ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA



Pharmac (Te Pataka Whaioranga) are pleased to announce that they are widening access to influenza vaccine from 1 April 2023

for the following two groups, for the duration of the 2023 calendar year:

- Children who are 6 months to 12 years of age;
- Māori and Pacific peoples who are 55 to 64 years of age;
- Tamariki under 9 years of age who have not previously received flu vaccine will need two doses given four weeks apart to gain full immunity for 2023;

If you call our clinic phone out of hours, your call is always answered by a registered nurse who will assess your needs, offer advice or, if required, pass the call to our oncall clinician. 

Forms available on the Council website or by emailing the administrator – maree.hare@hurunui.govt.nz

All projects must have an arts focus, begin after 20 April 2023 and be completed before 20 April 2024.





Hurunui Swimming Sports.

On Monday a team of Year 4-8 students went to the Thermal Pools to compete in the Hurunui Zone Swimming Sports. The day started off cloudy and slightly cool but then it warmed up. First we had the non-competitive freestyle, where our swimmers raced 25 metres, followed by backstroke, butterfly and breaststroke races. Our swimmers tried their best and swam their races well.

Blue Light Canterbury PCT (Physical Competency Test) Competition.

On Tuesday a team of four Y7/8 students, Amelia S, Charlie, Noah and Cooper went to Cowles Stadium for the PCT competition. First we had the briefing and the police showed us how to complete the course, then we split up into groups with the other teams. We were one of the first groups to do the obstacle course. First we had to push wheelie bins around some cones, then we ran a lap of the basketball court. Next we ran across a beam, then jumped across a mat. Afterwards we hurdled over a bar, then we jumped through a window and jumped over a wall. We then dragged a dummy and finally we climbed over a fence. This physical



test is the one that the police complete as part of their training - we found it fun and rewarding as we all worked well together.

Afterwards we did other activities like the minefield and frisbee relays. We also did CPR with St Johns and a speed test with Constable Ken. Irish Hot Lemon Pudding

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon/15 grams unsalted butter, softened
- 1 cup plus 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 3 large eggs, yolks and whites separated
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 2 large lemons, grated and juiced (about 2 tablespoons zest and 6 tablespoons juice)
- 1 cup whole milk
- Confectioners' sugar, for dusting

Softly whipped cream, for serving

PREPARATION

Step 1

Heat oven to $_{180}$ degrees and set a rack in the middle of the oven.

Step 2

Place butter in a medium mixing bowl. Gradually add sugar as you mash the mixture with a wooden spoon until it looks like damp sand.

Step 3

Mix egg yolks into sugar mixture, then beat in the flour. Add lemon zest and juice, then whisk in the milk.

Step 4

In a separate clean large bowl, beat egg whites to stiff peaks. Fold whites by hand gently into batter. Step 5

Pour mixture into a 5-cup ceramic or glass baking dish (or Pyrex pie plate). Bake in the middle of the oven for about 40 minutes, or until mixture is just set and top is golden brown. (Alternatively, bake in individual ramekins or custard cups for about 20 minutes.)

Step 6

Serve warm, dusted with confectioners' sugar, with softly whipped cream alongside.

Pasta alla Norma

This traditional Sicilian pasta dish of sautéed eggplant tossed with tomato sauce and topped with ricotta salata makes for a satisfying vegetarian dinner, and it can be thrown together in under an hour.

INGREDIENTS

750 grams eggplant Olive oil as needed (at least ½ cup) Salt and pepper

1 tablespoon chopped garlic

3 or 4 dried chiles

750 grams tomatoes, chopped (canned are fine; about 1 can)

1 teaspoon good dried oregano, or 1 tablespoon fresh 450 grams long pasta

½ cup chopped parsley or basil

½ cup grated ricotta (or in a pinch, pecorino Romano)

PREPARATION

Step 1

Slice the eggplant about ½ inch thick. Cook in abundant olive oil, without crowding, sprinkling with salt and adding more oil as needed. You will undoubtedly have to cook in batches; take your time and cook until the eggplant is nicely browned and soft. Remove to a plate; do not drain on paper towels. Meanwhile, put a large pot of water to boil and salt it. Step 2

At the end of the cooking the eggplant, the pan will ideally have a couple of tablespoons of oil left. If there's more or less, drain some off or add a bit. Turn the heat to medium, add the garlic and chiles, and cook until the garlic colors a little bit. Add the tomatoes and oregano, along with some salt and pepper; cook until saucy but not too dry, stirring occasionally.

Step 3

Cook the pasta until tender but not mushy. While it's cooking, cut the eggplant into strips and reheat for a minute in the tomato sauce. Drain the pasta and toss it with the tomato sauce and the eggplant. Taste and adjust the seasoning, then top with the parsley or basil and grated cheese and serve.





An Inability To Deliver on Promises

And what goes for the U.S. goes for the rest of the world. China is currently the world's biggest emitter on an annual basis. It has said that it will reach net zero by 2060. In the early months of 2022, Beijing approved five enormous new coal-fired generating plants. In August, when a punishing drought cut into hydropower production along the Yangtze River, the country hit a new record for daily coal consumption. Climate Action Tracker, an independent research group based in Berlin, rates China's climate policies as "highly insufficient" and notes that the country has recently "reneged" on promises to shift away from coal.

India, which is now the world's third-biggest emitter—one rung behind the U.S.—has declared that it will reach net zero by 2070. Meanwhile, its emissions are rising fast. This past spring, when India was hit with a devastating heat wave and power use surged, its Coal Ministry announced plans to reopen a hundred mines that had been closed as unprofitable.

Russia is the world's fourth-largest emitter. It is aiming, on paper at least, to reach net zero by 2060. But it has taken almost no action to rein in its emissions, and this seems unlikely to change anytime soon. In 2003, President Vladimir Putin joked that warming would enable Russians to "spend less on fur coats"; more recently, he has blamed climate change on "some invisible shifts in the galaxy."

The European Union's pledge to hit net-zero emissions by 2050 is written into E.U. law. But, after Russia cut gas deliveries to the bloc, several countries, including Germany and the Netherlands, announced plans to fire up old coal plants or extend the lives of plants that had been slated to close. "The war in Ukraine is putting climate action on the back burner," the U.N. Secretary-General, António Guterres, lamented last month. A recent study by a consortium of research institutes in Europe and the U.S. concluded that only five per cent of

the hundred and twenty-eight countries that have set the goal of reaching net zero have taken the requisite first steps. It found an "alarming lack of credibility" to most of the commitments.

The broken promises extend in all directions. At last year's cop, held in Glasgow, a hundred and forty countries vowed to put a stop to "forest loss," another major source of greenhouse-gas emissions. (A single full-grown tree can store as much as seven tons of carbon.) Among the signatories of the declaration was Brazil; in the six months following the conference, deforestation rates in the country soared to new highs.

The Democratic Republic of the Congo also signed the forest pledge. In July, the D.R.C. announced that it was opening thirty huge tracts, encompassing an estimated twenty-five million acres of rain forest and two million acres of peatlands, to oil and gas exploration. (Some of the tracts overlap Virunga National Park, a refuge for critically endangered mountain gorillas.)

Then there are the pledges of financial support. The hundred billion dollars a year promised in Copenhagen to developing nations have yet to materialise. By some estimates, the shortfall runs to twenty billion dollars a year; by others, it's four times that amount.

"To be charitable, this is a manifestation of the inability of the developed countries to deliver," Saleemul Huq, the director of the International Centre for Climate Change and Development, in Dhaka, Bangladesh, told us. "To be uncharitable, they just don't give a damn. Unfortunately, the uncharitable interpretation seems to be more valid."
