From 1 April 2023 we will be able to provide additional COVID boosters, irrespective of how many prior booster doses that you have received, provided you meet the any of the following criteria:

- Anyone aged 30 years and over who has completed a primary course, as long as it has been at least six months since their last Covid-19 booster or positive Covid-19 test.
- Those at increased risk of severe illness from Covid-19 who have completed a primary course as long as it has been six months since their last Covid-19 booster or positive Covid-19 test. These high-risk groups include:
 - residents of aged care and disability care facilities
 - severely immunocompromised people
 - people aged 16 years and over who have a medical condition that increases the risk of severe breakthrough COVID-19 illness
 - people aged 16 years and over who live with disability with significant or complex health needs or multiple comorbidities.

The following high-risk groups also fall into the 30 years and over criteria:

- people aged 65 years and over
- Māori and Pacific peoples aged 50 years and over
- health, aged care, and disability workers aged 30 years and over

Census reminder letter:

From last week on, almost 1.4 million households will be mailed a second pre-census reminder letter with a new

access code with a call to action to complete census forms by Census Day 7 March. It is also a call to action to contact 0800 CENSUS (0800 236 787) to order paper forms if

preferred.

Households where census collectors have delivered census packs will also get a second letter.

This is not an error, but part of the planned process for the 2023 Census.

Households can use the new access code or the one provided in the original census pack. Both are valid and private to their address.

Note: Stats NZ introduced this second pre-census letter following the 2022 field test for the 2023 Census. **QR codes**

A4 paper form census packs contain a letter with a QR code which can be used to find out where the nearest NZ Post location is to mail back completed census forms. The QR code is not linked to your access code or needed to fill out census forms.



Broken Promises

And what goes for the U.S. goes for the rest of the world. China is currently the world's biggest emitter on an annual basis. It has said that it will reach net zero by 2060. In the early months of 2022, Beijing approved five enormous new coal-fired generating plants. In August, when a punishing drought cut into hydropower production along the Yangtze River, the country hit a new record for daily coal consumption. Climate Action Tracker, an independent research group based in Berlin, rates China's climate policies as "highly insufficient" and notes that the country has recently "reneged" on promises to shift away from coal.

India, which is now the world's third-biggest emitter one rung behind the U.S.—has declared that it will reach net zero by 2070. Meanwhile, its emissions are rising fast. This past spring, when India was hit with a devastating heat wave and power use surged, its Coal Ministry announced plans to reopen a hundred mines that had been closed as unprofitable.

Russia is the world's fourth-largest emitter. It is aiming, on paper at least, to reach net zero by 2060. But it has taken almost no action to rein in its emissions, and this seems unlikely to change anytime soon. In 2003, President Vladimir Putin joked that warming would enable Russians to "spend less on fur coats"; more recently, he has blamed climate change on "some invisible shifts in the galaxy."

The European Union's pledge to hit net-zero emissions by 2050 is written into E.U. law. But, after Russia cut gas deliveries to the bloc, several countries, including Germany and the Netherlands, announced plans to fire up old coal plants or extend the lives of plants that had been slated to close. "The war in Ukraine is putting climate action on the back burner," the U.N. Secretary-General, António Guterres, lamented last month. A recent study by a consortium of research institutes in Europe and the U.S. concluded that only five per cent of the hundred and twenty-eight countries that have set the goal of reaching net zero have taken the requisite first steps. It found an "alarming lack of credibility" to most of the commitments.

The broken promises extend in all directions. At last year's cop, held in Glasgow, a hundred and forty countries vowed to put a stop to "forest loss," another major source of greenhouse-gas emissions. (A single full-grown tree can store as much as seven tons of carbon.) Among the signatories of the declaration was Brazil; in the six months following the conference, deforestation rates in the country soared to new highs.

The Democratic Republic of the Congo also signed the forest pledge. In July, the D.R.C. announced that it was opening thirty huge tracts, encompassing an estimated twenty-five million acres of rain forest and two million acres of peatlands, to oil and gas exploration. (Some of the tracts overlap Virunga National Park, a refuge for critically endangered mountain gorillas.)

Then there are the pledges of financial support. The hundred billion dollars a year promised in Copenhagen to developing nations have yet to materialise. By some estimates, the shortfall runs to twenty billion dollars a year; by others, it's four times that amount.

"To be charitable, this is a manifestation of the inability of the developed countries to deliver," Saleemul Huq, the director of the International Centre for Climate Change and Development, in Dhaka, Bangladesh, told me. "To be uncharitable, they just don't give a damn. Unfortunately, the uncharitable interpretation seems to be more valid."



Herbed White Bean and Sausage Stew

Here's a meaty, cold-weather stew laden with white beans, sweet Italian sausage, rosemary, thyme, cumin and garlic. It is deeply flavored and complex, but quite easy to make. Pan-fry the sausages in a bit of olive oil, then sauté the vegetables with cumin and tomato paste in the drippings. Add plenty of water and the dried beans that, wait for it, you did not have to soak. Simmer until the house is fragrant and the windows fog up (about 2 hours).

INGREDIENTS

Yield: 6 to 8 servings

- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for serving 500 grams sweet Italian sausage, sliced ³/₄-inch thick
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground cumin
- 2. medium carrots, finely diced
- 2 celery stalks, finely diced
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 500 dried white beans, rinsed and picked through
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt, or to taste
- 2 thyme sprigs
- 1 large rosemary sprig
- 1bay leaf
- 2 teaspoons balsamic vinegar, plus more for serving ½teaspoon black pepper, plus more to taste

Step 1

Heat oil in a large stockpot over medium-high. Add the sausage and brown until cooked through, about 7 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, transfer to a plate lined with a paper towel.

Step 2

Add the tomato paste and cumin to the pot. Cook, stirring, until dark golden, about 2 minutes. Add the carrots, celery, onion and garlic. Cook, stirring, until the vegetables have softened, about 5 minutes. Stir in the beans, 8 cups water, salt, thyme, rosemary and bay leaf. Turn the heat up to high and bring to a boil. Then reduce heat to low and simmer gently until the beans are tender, about 2 hours, adding more water if needed to make sure the beans remain submerged.

Step 3

When beans are tender, return the sausage to the pot. Simmer for 5 minutes. Stir in the vinegar and pepper. Taste and adjust seasoning. Ladle into warm bowls and serve

Pizza Margherita

Here is the archetype of a thin-crust pizza pie, a pizza margherita adorned simply in the colors of the Italian flag: green from basil, white from mozzarella, red from tomato sauce. The ingredients offer in their proportions what appears to be a kind of austerity — not even 3 ounces of cheese! But the result is home-cooked pizza to beat the band, exactly the sort of recipe to start a career in home pizza-making, and to

return to again and again.

INGREDIENTS

30 cm round of pizza dough, stretched
3tablespoons tomato sauce (see note)
Extra-virgin olive oil
75 grams fresh mozzarella
4 to 5 basil leaves, roughly torn

PREPARATION

Step 1

Place a pizza stone or tiles on the middle rack of your oven and turn heat to its highest setting. Let it heat for at least an hour.

Step 2

Put the sauce in the center of the stretched dough and use the back of a spoon to spread it evenly across the surface, stopping approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ inch from the edges. Step 3

Drizzle a little olive oil over the pie. Break the cheese into large pieces and place these gently on the sauce. Scatter basil leaves over the top.

Step 4

Using a pizza peel, pick up the pie and slide it onto the heated stone or tiles in the oven. Bake until the crust is golden brown and the cheese is bubbling, approximately 4 to 8 minutes

Tip

In a food processor, whiz together whole, drained canned tomatoes, a splash of olive oil and a sprinkle of salt. Keep leftover sauce refrigerated.

Hot Air.

Morena, a few personal thoughts and observations.

I am sure many of us were amused by the article in The Pinkie about the potential for electric airplanes. Of course, battery technology has come a long way from the first electric cars built in 1896. Fords even produced electric cars in 1914. But the concept of an electric plane does seem technically challenging. But a solar plane has flown around the world and a solar car regularly cruises Christchurch suburbs.

But on a more serious note, Kowhai Park. Wow, what an innovative project. Air NZ along with European Airbus Industries, Christchurch Airport and Hiringa Energy are building a huge energy park for the production of Hydrogen. The hydrogen will be used by Transport, Planes, industry, refrigeration and more. Air NZ Hydrogen Planes should begin flying, (in test mode) next year and passenger flights to Europe should be flying by 2035.

Hydrogen Energy Hubs are under construction in Rolleston, Christchurch and Dunedin and in all the major cities and towns on the North Island. Buses are being built/converted in Rolleston as we speak. NZ is partnering companies in Japan and Germany to further the technology. Emirates Team New Zealand has hydrogen powered boats and motors. Land Rover has 700km range utes powered by Hydrogen. Toyota and Hyundai all produce hydrogen cars and for the ultimate in status and luxury check out the Australia designed and made Warrego 65 and 90 Utes.

While NZ is reeling under the climate chaos caused by humankind it is gratifying to know that NZ technology is at the cutting edge of innovation.

Great to see a few electric cars around the village and the free Meridian charging station in the village is a bonus. We bought our EV 2 months ago and love it. 0-100 in less than 7 seconds is pretty spectacular. And the cost of charging with Solar is cheap. Living a long way away from Christchurch return trips to Chch in EV's do require some planning but as the number of charging stations increases, and speeds up, the EV revolution will continue. 150 kw/hr stations available mean you can charge nearly as quickly as filling with a tank of petrol.

In times of challenge and adversity leaders and creativity rise to the top. If I were at the beginning of my career and education I would most certainly be looking at new clean technologies. And I would advise our tamariki to do the same.


