# Council future proofs RAPID numbers System

Hurunui District Council is building on the gains made by the Rural Addressing Project by futureproofing rural address numbering for all new rural properties, principal buildings and accessways.

At Tuesday's Strategy and Community Committee meeting, councillors passed a resolution that all new rural properties, principal buildings and all new accessways are provided with correct RAPID numbers at the owner's cost and are installed by Council through fees and charges.

"Our district relies heavily on our emergency services and Council plays a critical role to ensure they are able to get to where they are needed as directly as possible," said Hurunui District Mayor Marie Black.

The Rural Addressing Project was initiated by Council in response to a deputation by Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) in 2020 to the Strategy and Policy Committee meeting to highlight barriers for emergency services in locating rural addresses that don't have correct and well displayed numbering.

Council Planner Scott Rose said since the project began, over 600 Rural Address Property Identification (RAPID) number plates had been purchased, over 70 on-site audits had been completed on over 70 dairy farms in the Amuri Basin, and two rights of way had been named.

FENZ preferred properties to be physically numbered as GPS triangulation was not as effective in rural areas, Rose said. With many dairy farms and vineyards in the Hurunui having multiple dwellings on one location, "part of our work is doing on-site audits and ensuring properties are labelled correctly".

Council will continue to work with existing properties to assist landowners in obtaining and displaying the correct RAPID numbers for their properties. # Council submission to Environment Select Committee

Hurunui District Council has sent a strong message to Parliament's Environment Select Committee on the importance of protecting the voices of local communities and the character of special areas like Mt Lyford and Hanmer Springs when it considers new legislation proposed to replace the current Resource Management Act.

Council's Strategy and Community Committee on Tuesday voted to ratify the submissions made by Hurunui Council on 16 February 2023 to the Natural and Built Environment Bill and the Spatial Planning Bill.

Hurunui's submission supported the Canterbury Mayoral Forum submission and provided further comment reflecting the views of Hurunui Council.

Hurunui District Mayor Marie Black acknowledged the work of Council planners in preparing the submission.

"One of the recommendations we put forward is to extend the timeframe for the first combined NBE plan for the Canterbury region beyond the proposed four years to six years, so that meaningful engagement with our local communities and statutory partners including *mana whenua* is ensured. We believe community engagement is vital to the success of the plan," said Mayor Marie.

"We are also concerned about protecting character areas like Mt Lyford and Hanmer Springs, which are subject to design standards that we would like to see maintained to ensure the character of these unique areas."

The Environment Select Committee will prepare a report on the bills to go before Parliament, with the report due on 6 June 2023.









# MOLESWORTH POSSUM CONTROL OPERATION

Vector Free Marlborough (VFM) wishes to advise the public of its intention to aerially apply the toxin Sodium fluoroacetate (1080) to parts of Molesworth Station and the adjacent Muller Station for the purpose of controlling possums. The Molesworth possum control operation is being carried out on behalf of OSPRI as part of its TBfree New Zealand programme, which aims to eradicate bovine tuberculosis from wildlife vectors that pose a risk to farmed cattle and deer.

#### **Description of Control Area**

The control area takes in a substantial tract of Molesworth Station and part of the adjacent Muller Station. The control area is more or less bounded by the Acheron Road in the east, Tophouse Road/Wairau Hanmer Springs Hydro Road in the west, including the head of the Wairau River, the Clarence River in the south and the Raglan Range to the north. A number of waterways flow through the project area, with the most notable of these being the Clarence and Wairau rivers.

The permission area for the Molesworth operations take in approximately 104,000 hectares of publicly owned land, administered by various agencies including the Department of Conservation, Land Information New Zealand and several local authorities. A detailed map may be obtained from VFM as per contact details below.

#### **Commencement Date**

The 2023 Molesworth operations will be carried out in two stages:

## Bush Gully - Tarndale

Control in the approximately 96,000 hectare Bush Gully - Tarndale block is scheduled to commence from **1 May 2023**, with the aerial application of non-toxic cereal pre-feed pellets. **Note:** Most pre feed will be dyed green, however in some areas non-dyed (straw coloured) pre-feed will be used. This will be followed approximately 7-10 days later by the aerial application of bait containing biodegradable Sodium fluoroacetate (1080) also dyed green. In addition to aerial methods, supplemental ground control, using handlaid 1080 pellets may be undertaken around sensitive areas and other places unsuitable for aerial methods.

All work is weather dependent, and commencement may be later than indicated. In the event of an extended delay, further notices will be placed to advise the public.

# Yarra - Five Mile

Control in the approximately 8,000 hectare Yarra – Five Mile block is scheduled to commence from 1 September 2023. Public notices for this operation will be placed nearer the time. Control methods for this block will be the same as the Bush Gully & Tarndale block.

#### **Bait Description**

Aerial and ground control using 1080:

- Pre-feed Non-toxic cereal-based pellet, approximately 16mm long, cinnamon-lured, nondyed (straw coloured) and/or dyed green
- Toxic bait Cereal-based pellet, approximately 16mm long, cinnamon-lured and dyed green with a toxic loading of 0.15% Sodium fluoroacetate (1080).

Note - all prefeed and 1080 bait for aerial and ground application will contain deer repellent where consent conditions allow.

#### **Precautions**

The public are reminded of the danger that toxic baits and possum carcasses pose, particularly to children and dogs.

- Do not touch or eat baits
- Children must be kept under strict supervision in the control area.
- Dogs must be kept under strict control at all times and not have access to, or be taken into, the control area, as they are particularly susceptible to harm from contact with toxic baits and poisoned carcasses. The risk that poisoned carcasses pose to dogs may extend downstream of the control area.
- Toxin warning signs will be installed at main public entry points and the public are reminded that it is an offence to remove this warning signage. Please follow the instructions on the signs.
- Game animals should not be sold or taken for eating from within or adjacent to this area until it is declared clear of pesticides.

# Chocolate Fridge Cake

Sophisticated and intensely chocolatey with a hit of juicy raisins and crunchy biscuit pieces, serve this decadent chocolate fridge cake as a teatime treat Ingredients

- 1 mugful mixed dried fruit (about 225g)
- ½ mugful brandy or juice (about 110ml)
- 300g dark chocolate (70% cocoa solids)
- ½ pack butter (about 125g, salted or unsalted), plus extra for the tin
- 3 tbsp golden syrup
- 13 digestive biscuits (about 200g)
- 100g pack toasted flaked almonds or roasted hazelnuts, chopped (see tip, below)
   Method
- STEP 1Put the dried fruit in a small bowl and pour in just enough brandy or juice to cover. Microwave for 2 mins until steaming, then set aside.

**STEP 2**The non-messy way to chop chocolate is to smash it (still wrapped) onto your work surface, then unwrap it down to the foil and snap it (still in foil) into small bits using your fingers. Empty the chocolate into a microwaveable bowl. Add the butter and golden syrup, cover the bowl with cling film and microwave for 2 mins until melted. Set aside.

**STEP 3**Meanwhile, line a 20cm square tin with baking parchment, using a little butter to stick it in place. (You can also use foil but it's more fiddly to peel off later, or cling film if you don't mind wrinkles on the underside of your cake.)

**STEP 4**Take a third, large bowl. Use your fingers to break the biscuits into it. Stir in the nuts, soaked fruit and soaking liquid, then mix everything together. Pour the melted chocolate into the bowl with the biscuits, using a spatula or spoon to scrape out every last bit of chocolate. Mix together until everything is coated in chocolate.

**STEP 5** tip the chocolate mixture into the tin, pushing well into corners and flattening the top. Put in the fridge (no need to cover) for 4 hrs or overnight until set. To serve, remove from tin, peel away the parchment and cut into 16 squares (any crumbly bits that fall off make tasty samples for the cook). Will keep for up to 1 week in an airtight container in the fridge. Can be frozen for up to 1 month.

# Lemon Meringue Fridge Cake

This tangy dessert looks impressive but takes very little effort – most of the ingredients are ready-made, so it is simply a matter of construction Ingredients

- · drizzle of sunflower oil for greasing
- 1 ½ packs (about 300g) buttery biscuits
   2 lemons, 1 zested and juiced, 1 sliced to serve
- 400g mascarpone
- 400ml double cream
- 25g icing sugar
- 100g lemon curd
- 10 mini meringue

# Method

• STEP 1 Grease and line a 900g loaf tin with baking parchment. Line the base with a row of biscuits. In a bowl, whisk the lemon zest and juice, mascarpone, cream, sugar and 50g lemon curd until thick and holding its shape. Transfer roughly 1 /4 of the mixture to a bowl and chill in the fridge for later.

**STEP 2**Layer the mascarpone and biscuits into the tin, and add the remaining lemon curd in spoonfuls between the layers. Break some biscuits to fill any gaps. You should have about four layers of biscuits, finishing with a layer of cream. Wrap the tin in cling film and chill for at least 8 hrs, or up to 48 hrs.

**STEP 3**When you're ready to serve, unwrap the tin and turn the pudding out onto a platter or board. Peel off the parchment. Crush 4 of the mini meringues to a rubble texture and stir through the reserved mascarpone mix. Spread across the top of the pudding, then press the remaining mini meringues and lemon slices on top. Leftovers will keep for one day.






















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
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
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
# **Hanmer Springs School**

In Piwakawaka class the Year 1 students have been busy learning to read and write using a Structured Literacy approach. We start in Stage 1 by learning 8 sounds - m, s, f, a, p, t, c and i. Once we have learnt to recognise these sounds then we learn the skills to put the sounds together and to take them apart to be able to read and write. We start by spelling CVC words, reading them and writing them. We read books that have words which only contain these sounds and we write dictated sentences using only these sounds. We move on to Stage 2 and learn b, h, n, o, d, g, I and v. Again we learn to recognise the sounds and then read books which have the Stage 1 and 2 sounds in them and write dictated sentences using these 16 sounds.



Moving on to Stage 3 we learn y, r, e, qu and z. By this stage we have good reading skills and we can sound out the words we are reading and we can write sentences using these sounds. Each day we practise our handwriting so we can form our letters correctly. We enjoy reading the different books about the characters Pip and Tim and their cat Tip. As we go through the year we move up more stages to learn more sounds.



We spend lots of time learning our sounds. We use 'Heggerty' to help us learn about syllables and rhyme where we practise blending, isolating, segmenting, adding, deleting and changing sounds. We learn to spell words using a programme called 'The Code' and we use 'Casey Caterpillar' to help us with our handwriting and letter formation.

Svante Arrhenius was, by nature, an optimist. He believed that science should—and could—be accessible to all. In 1891, he got his first teaching job, at an experimental university in Stockholm called the Högskola. That same year, he founded the Stockholm Physics Society, which met every other Saturday evening. For a fee of one Swedish crown, anyone could join. Among the society's earliest members was a Högskola student named Sofia Rudbeck, who was described by a contemporary as both "an excellent chemist" and "a ravishing beauty." Arrhenius began writing her poetry, and soon the two wed. Physics Society meetings consisted of lectures on the latest scientific developments, many delivered by Arrhenius himself, followed by discussions that often lasted well into the night. The topics ranged widely, from aeronautics to volcanology. The society devoted several sessions to considering the instruments that would be needed by Salomon August Andrée, another early member of the group, who had decided to try to reach the North Pole via balloon. (Whatever the quality of his instruments, Andrée's voyage would result in his death and the death of his two companions.)

A question that particularly interested the Physics Society was the origin of the ice ages. All over Sweden lay signs of the glaciers that had, for vast stretches of time, buried the country: rocks with parallel scrapings; strange, sinuous piles of gravel; huge boulders that had been transported far from their source. But what had caused the great ice sheets to descend, carrying all before them? And then what had caused them to retreat, allowing the rivers to flow once again and the forests to return? In 1893, the society debated various theories that had been proposed, including one linking the ice ages to slight variations in the Earth's orbit. The following year, Arrhenius came up with a different—and, he thought, better—idea: carbon dioxide.

Carbon dioxide, he knew, had curious heat-trapping properties. In the atmosphere, it allowed visible light to pass through, but it absorbed the longer-wave radiation that the Earth was constantly emitting to space. What if, Arrhenius

speculated, the amount of CO2 in the air had varied? Could that explain the glaciers' ebb and flow?

The math involved in testing this theory went far beyond what was possible at the time. Arrhenius didn't have a calculator, let alone a computer. He lacked crucial information about which wavelengths, exactly, CO2 absorbs. The climate system, meanwhile, is immensely complicated, with feedback loops nestled within feedback loops.

Arrhenius, who would later win a Nobel Prize for an unrelated discovery, plunged ahead anyway. On Christmas Eve, 1894, he began constructing a climate model—the world's first. He assembled temperature data from around the globe and made ingenious use of a set of measurements that had been taken a decade earlier by an American astronomer, Samuel Pierpont Langley. (Langley had invented a device—a bolometer—for gauging infrared radiation, and had used it to determine the temperature of the moon.)

Arrhenius performed thousands of computations—perhaps tens of thousands— and often laboured over this task for fourteen hours a day. He was still calculating away as his marriage fell apart. In September of 1895, Rudbeck moved out. In November, without having seen Arrhenius again, she gave birth to their son. The following month, Arrhenius finished his work. "I should certainly not have

undertaken these tedious calculations if an extraordinary interest had not been connected with them," he wrote.

Arrhenius believed that he had unravelled the mystery of the ice ages, a riddle that had "hitherto proved most difficult to interpret." He was at least partly right: ice ages are the product of a complex interplay of forces, including wobbles in the Earth's orbit and changes in atmospheric CO2

His model turned out to have another use as well. All across Europe and North America, coal was being shovelled into furnaces that were bellowing out carbon dioxide. By thickening the atmospheric blanket that warmed the Earth, humans must, Arrhenius reasoned, be altering the climate. He calculated that, if the amount of carbon dioxide in the air were to double, then global temperatures would rise between three and four degrees Celsius. A few quadrillion computations later, vastly more advanced climate models predict that doubling CO2 will push temperatures up between 2.5 and four degrees Celsius, meaning that Arrhenius's pen-and-paper estimate was, to an uncanny degree, on target.

Arrhenius thought that the future he had conjured would be delightful. "Our descendants," he predicted, will live happier lives "under a warmer sky."

The prospect was, in any event, distant; doubling atmospheric CO2 would, he reckoned, take humanity three thousand years.

It's easy now to poke fun at Arrhenius for his sunniness. The doubling threshold could be reached within decades, and the results are apt to be disastrous. But who among us is any different? Here we all are, watching things fall apart. And yet, deep down, we don't believe it.


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
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# Government's lack of meaningful change on water leaves Mayor Black disappointed

The government's minor tweaks to the Three Waters Reform have largely disappointed Hurunui District's Mayor Marie Black, which she claimed have highlighted the fact the Reform for those in the Beehive is nothing more than a political issue.

"The Government has refused to make meaningful change and is ignoring community concerns over property rights and meaningful local voice."

Mayor Black said although there will now be potentially 10 entities instead of the original four, the governance structure remains unchanged, thereby still leaving communities two steps away from any real influence.

"It's the same plan, with a different name."

Like many mayors throughout New Zealand, Mayor

Black was looking forward to the opportunity for some
meaningful engagement with the government, but this
opportunity has been missed.

"Once again, the government thinks it knows better, rather than asking people what they want. We want locally led, locally informed and locally accountable solutions, not the one size fits none approach dictated from Wellington."

Mayor Black wanted to remind her community that three waters infrastructure supports local communities, farms and businesses. In the Hurunui District much of this infrastructure was multi-generational, with the forefathers of today's residents having physically placed the pipes in the ground.

She added that the government's proposal sees billions of dollars of these assets in districts just like Hurunui all around New Zealand, confiscated without compensation.

"It appears that unfortunately this vital infrastructure will continue to be used as a political football."

February and March have been quite busy particularly February in Hanmer Springs.


