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# Council adopts draft budget for 23/24

Rate Increase will be 7.49%

How rate payer money will be spent in the Hurunui District during the next financial year has been outlined in a draft budget which was adopted by Council this afternoon.

In an extraordinary meeting on Tuesday, Councillors agreed unanimously to adopt a draft budget for the 2023/2024 year which included a proposed rates increase of 7.49%.

Mayor Marie Black said this figure reflects the hard work of Councillors to keep this number as low as possible, amidst a nationwide situation of inflation and rising interest rates.

She said it's about finding the solution for certainty that the figure proposed reflects what the community can afford.

"We have a responsibility to ourselves and our people to find that balance."

Deputy Mayor Vince Daly said it's about weathering the storm.

"It's a guessing game with interest rates, we've done well to keep it at 7.49%."

South Ward Councillor Robbie Bruerton said in the meeting that he is confident in the scrutiny that has gone into arriving at this point, and supports the draft budget.

"I look forward to hearing the community's feedback." Council will be going out for community engagement next month, after the Draft Annual Plan 2023/24 is adopted by Council in early May.

The Local Government Act requires all local authorities to have an adopted Annual Plan by 30 June 2023, with the adoption of the budget being a key process in its development.

# Chicken Filo Pie

A delicious, yet lighter chicken pie topped with filo pastry. Filo cooks quickly, so keep an eye on it in the oven so that it doesn't over-brown

# Ingredients

- 1 tbsp sunflower oil
- 3 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (around 500g/1lb 2oz), cut into roughly 2cm/¾in chunks
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 300g/10½oz chestnut mushrooms, halved or quartered if large
- 4 tsp <u>plain flour</u>
- 1 tsp garlic powder or 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 tsp dried tarragon or parsley
- 400ml/14fl oz chicken stock, made with 1 stock cube
- 4 tbsp reduced fat crème fraîche
- 2 x sheets filo pastry (around 85g/3oz)
- freshly ground black pepper

### Method

- 1. Place a baking tray in the oven and preheat the oven to 220C/200C Fan/Gas 7.
- 2. Brush a large, deep non-stick frying pan with a little of the oil and place over a high heat. Add the chicken pieces, season with freshly ground black pepper and stir-fry for 3 minutes over a high heat, or until lightly coloured on all sides. Transfer to a plate.
- Return the pan to the heat, brush with a little more oil (make sure to use a heatproof silicone pastry brush). Fry the onion and mushrooms over a high heat for about 5 minutes, or until lightly browned.
- 4. Sprinkle over the flour, garlic and tarragon or parsley and stir well. Gradually add the stock, just a little at a time, stirring constantly until the sauce is thickened.
- 5. Stir in the crème fraîche and return the chicken to the pan. Adjust the seasoning to taste and spoon into a warmed 1 litre/1¾ pint pie dish Cut each pastry sheet into three wide strips and brush lightly with the remaining sunflower oil. Scrunch each sheet loosely and place layered on top of the pie filling. Bake on the baking tray in the centre of the oven for 10–12 minutes, or until the pastry is goldenbrown and the filling is bubbling. Serve.

# Slow cooker curried vegetable laksa

This creamy, curried laksa is packed with soft noodles and vegetables, and you can have it on the table in less than 4 hours with only 15 minutes of hands-on time.

# Ingredients

- 1 bunch spring onions, white parts finely chopped and green parts finely sliced
- 1½ tbsp curry powder or use laksa paste
- 1 cup vegetable stock
   400g tin coconut milk, light or full-fat
- 1 butternut squash 'bulb' (just the rounded end), peeled, seeds removed and cut into chunky crescent wedges
- 150g/5½oz snow or sugar snap peas
- 225g/8oz frozen peas
- 300g/10½oz fresh egg noodles or medium straight-to-wok noodles
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

# Method

- 1. Place the white parts of the spring onions, curry powder or laksa paste, stock and coconut milk in the slow cooker pot. Half fill the coconut milk tin with water and pour this in too. Add the squash wedges to the coconut broth. Cover with the lid and cook on low for 2½ hours.
- Stir in the snow peas and peas. Drop the noodles on top, cover with the lid again and cook for 30–45 minutes until everything is piping hot. The snow peas should still be crunchy.
- 3. Stir in most of the green parts of the spring onions and season with salt and pepper. Divide the laksa between four bowls using tongs and a ladle and scatter any remaining spring onion greens over the top.

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














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
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# **Hanmer Springs School**


# An Autumn Day by Ada

Lest we forget



What's the matter here? Why has so little progress been made on climate change, even as the dangers have become ever more apparent?

According to one school of thought, the problem has to do with incentives. There's a great deal of money to be made selling fossil fuels—just in the first quarter of 2022, twenty-five of the world's largest oil-and-gas producers announced profits of close to a hundred billion dollars—and still more money to be made by burning fossil fuels to make stuff to sell, from sunglasses to steel girders. Meanwhile, the costs of climate change can be fobbed off on someone else. To use the technical term, they are a "negative externality." In the words of the Stern Review, a report commissioned by the British government in 2005, climate change "is the greatest and widest-ranging market failure ever seen."

By this account, the obvious solution is to realign the incentives—to internalise the externalities. If the cost of the damage caused by a ton of CO2 was borne by the business (or individual) responsible for emitting that ton, then the business (or individual) would be motivated to cut back. "A carbon tax offers the most cost-effective lever to reduce carbon emissions at the scale and speed that is necessary," a 2019 statement signed by thirty-five hundred economists, including twenty-eight Nobel Prize winners, declared.

Such a tax would move "the invisible hand of the marketplace to steer economic actors towards a low-carbon future."

According to a second school of thought, the trouble runs a whole lot deeper. Our political system is dominated by corporate money in general and fossil-fuel money in particular. (Last year, the oil-and-gas industry reportedly spent a hundred and twenty million dollars lobbying Washington, and it probably spent a great deal more via front groups.) It's therefore naïve to imagine that policies that cut into fossil-fuel profits will be enacted. And even if they were, they wouldn't solve the essential problem, which is that the "invisible hand" always grasps for more. If it's not more oil, it will be more lithium to build batteries, and if it's not more lithium it will be more cobalt, mined from the bottom of the sea.

"When it comes to global warming, we know that the real problem is not just fossil fuels—it is the logic of endless growth that is built into our economic system," Jason Hickel, an economic anthropologist at the Autonomous University of Barcelona, has written. Climate change can't be dealt with using the tools of capitalism, because it is a product of capitalism. It can be dealt with only by throwing off capitalism in favour of something else—a system aimed not at growth but at "degrowth."

"The difficult truth is that, to prevent climate and ecological catastrophe, we need to level down" is how the British environmental writer George Monbiot recently put it.

A third line of thought—perhaps too bleak and unpopular to be called a school—is that, if big change is hard, bigger change is even harder. How are we going to build a whole new economic system if we can't even enact a carbon tax?



# An interactive approach to Council's projects

There is always a project or three on the go in the Hurunui District, and now everyone can know about them.

Hurunui District Council has created a Project Map, which is updated monthly so people throughout the District can see what's happening now and in the future.

Chief Operations Officer Dan Harris said this is a very approachable way to illustrate how and where rate money is spent around Hurunui, and as some of the projects on the map are part of the Long Term Plan document, it creates a real-life lens.

From roads and footpaths, in the reserves, at the transfer stations, at the social housing units, to stormwater, wastewater and drinking water, all these projects can be seen on the interactive map.

"We encourage everyone in the District to have a look at the map, so next time you see a pipe being installed, a hole being dug or road works taking place in or around your communities, you'll know what's happening," said Harris.

Budgeting information is an additional feature, which means full visibility of where some of the rate money goes.

"We do ask our communities from time to time for feedback on proposed budgets, Long Term Plans and Annual Plans, and this Project Map will help put it into context."

He was also keenly interested in photography and video production and had a great collection of old cameras.

Like the editor, who was a personal friend, John was a dedicated Apple Mac man and his camera was always a Nikon. John said he never talked people into using Mac machines because if everybody had one he would be out of a job. Let's hope they have a computer system in heaven that needs sorting out.



Symbol	Acronym	Full name and uses
	PET	Polyethylene terephthalate - Fizzy drink bottles and frozen ready meal packages.
23	HDPE	High-density polyethylene - Milk and washing-up liquid bottles
4	PVC	Polyvinyl chloride - Food trays, cling film, bottles for squash, mineral water and shampoo.
	LDPE	Low density polyethylene - Carrier bags and bin liners.
25)	PP	Polypropylene - Margarine tubs, microwave- able meal trays.
	PS	Polystyrene - Yoghurt pots, foam meat or fish trays, hamburger boxes and egg cartons, vending cups, plastic cutlery, protective packaging for electronic goods and toys.
	Other	Any other plastics that do not fall into any of the above categories. For example melamine often used in plastic plates and cups.


