The discovery of the hot springs in the area was credited to William Jones in early 1859. In 1864, a bridge over the Waiau Uwha River was constructed by Mr Handisides of Nelson at a cost of NZ£2,000, based on a design by John Blackett. Unfortunately, the bridge was blown over by a Nor'west wind after just ten years.

In 1879, John Turnbull Thomson surveyed the land for the township, which encompassed a total area of 2,500 acres (1,000 ha), with 300 acres (120 ha) dedicated to the township itself. However, the hot springs were not included within this area. At that time, the springs remained in their natural state, with only steps and a changing shed provided. In June 1882, Edward George Wright, the member for Ashburton, raised the issue of developing the township in the New Zealand House of Representatives. The Minister of Lands, William Rolleston, emphasized the importance of public access to the springs. Surveyor Walter Kitson was tasked with laying out the site of the hot springs, which included an accommodation house. Construction of a bath house began in January 1884.

The fifty-year jubilee of Hanmer Springs was celebrated in 1933, marking its status as a government resort since 1883. However, it was later revealed in the centenary book that the jubilee had been held a year too early. The government's significant investment in Hanmer Springs without a bridge crossing the Waiau Uwha River sparked considerable controversy. John Blackett designed a new bridge, and John Anderson from Christchurch won the contract to erect it, establishing a foundry at the site. This second bridge, which opened in 1887, continues to provide access to Hanmer Springs today and is recognized as a Category I heritage item since 1983. The opening celebrations conducted by Anderson's sons at the site were so festive that the area is still referred to as Champagne Flat.





A Deep Dive On What Your Car May Be Costing Your Household

Obviously The Age Of Your Car, Its Make, The Topography It Often Travels Over, The Quality Of The Driver And The Quality Of The Car Will All Have Some Effect Here, But Given That, A Few Suggestions

- 1. The suggested average annual distance a New Zealand car travels is apparently 14,000 km.
- 2. One mile = 1.609434 km (say, 1.61 km).
- 3. The overall car costs as regards reimbursement based on IRD records for the 2023 year are suggested at:

	Total Overall Costs Including Ownership	Running Costs not Including Ownership
Petrol or Diesel	95 cents	34 cents
Petrol Hybrid	95 cents	20 cents
Electric	95 cents	11 cents

- 4. The IRD/Government reimbursement rates make no allowances for the vehicles current market value, that is:
 - (a) For a new car, the total overall reimbursement is 95 cents/km, which may well be low in real terms.
 - (b) For an older car, the total overall reimbursement is still 95 cents/km, but may be high in real terms.
- 5. The car reimbursement is GST inclusive, but no GST can be claimed because much of the cost is depreciation, which involves no GST.
- 6. The car reimbursement received is normally not taxable.
- 7. It is interesting that in 2023 the suggested split of ownership and running expenses per kilometre is:

Ownership Expenses	61 cents	(64.21%)
Running Expenses	<u>34 cents</u>	<u>(35.79%)</u>
	<u>95 cents</u>	<u>(100.00%)</u>

In other words, the ownership costs are just under (2/3) of the total costs and the running costs are just over (1/3) of the total costs – an interesting split.

8. Let's take an actual case of a Toyota Camry – a 2019 model that has done 50,400 km and had a willing seller/willing buyer purchase/sale value of \$48,000. Let's then say that this vehicle was then used by the owner as a 100% business vehicle and he did 14,000 km a year for the next five years – that is, travelled 70,000 km and was reimbursed by his employer at, say, \$1.00/km (spread over the next five years the reimbursement rate is almost certain to increase so the IRD figure is probably on the light side) – consequently, the increase to \$1.00/km.



What does his reimbursement amount to - 70,000 km at \$1.00/km

\$70,000

What do his true costs look like?

(a) Running expenses (70,000 km at, say, 38 cents/km)	\$26,600	
(b) What is the value of the vehicle after the 70,000 km - a total of 120,400 on the clock and is now nine years old - research would suggest a value of perhaps \$18,000 – consequently a depreciation cost of (\$48,000 less \$18,000)	\$30,000	
(c) He also put in \$48,000 of his own capital to purchase the vehicle in the first place, which effectively is		
income foregone at, say, \$48,000 at 5.5% x 5	\$13,200	
		<u>\$69,800</u>
Estimated Economic Surplus		\$200

Different people would use different input data here, but in a broad sense the ownership and running costs totalling \$1.00/km at the present time look reasonable, but things like fuel costs and servicing costs will push this figure up every year.

9. If you look at a typical New Zealand family where both spouses are working full-time, then they will in many cases have two cars and the average kilometres in each vehicle could easily be 10,000 km depending where they live.

Let's say their car values are both worth \$10,000 – that is a combined value of \$20,000 and a combined annual mileage of 20,000 km. What are their annual costs:

(a) Ownership costs based on point 7 would be 61 cents/km, which would represent 12,200 - 1 this, I feel, would be too high for our suggested car values of 20,000 - 1 feel an ownership cost of 40 cents/km or 8,000 in total is more realistic in this case.

(b) The running expenses though at 34 cents/km look realistic, which would represent \$6,800 (20,000 km at 34 cents/km).

(c) A combined overall annual cost for the two cars of \$14,800.

(d) If the two cars have a combined value much in excess of \$20,000, then the overall ownership costs would move up towards the 61 cents/km.

(e) We have not tried to allow for the electric car and hybrid effects which will complicate the picture somewhat.

- 10. What's the point here the point is that the typical New Zealand two income family has an annual overall car ownership and running cost of perhaps \$14,800/year, with this figure in many cases perhaps being higher.
- If you take the view that there are close to 2,000,000 households in New Zealand, then this \$14,800/year represents \$29,600,000,000 \$29.6 billion (\$NZ) a year. Not all households would have two cars but some would have a single household car value in excess of \$20,000.

What is the take home message here:

- (a) An overall ownership and running cost of \$1.00/km looks realistic for the moment but will increase by at least the inflation rate each year.
- (b) This total vehicle cost for NZ households at \$29.6 billion a year is an enormous drag on their household budget and what is more, looks ongoing and unavoidable.

On tour with Richard



My time in Northern Thailand is drawing to a close and by the time you read this I will hopefully be back in Vietnam. I really had no intention of coming here but new visa regulations in Vietnam meant I had to leave the country to get a new stamp in my passport. So having only hazy memories of being here almost exactly 50 years ago, I decided I should get out and do something to make it worthwhile.

In my last missive I rued the the fact I had been unable to find good Thai food and I can happily report that I have indeed found it where you would least expect it, at Hugo's Irish Sports Bar (Guiness on tap, even if they don't know how to pour it). Hidden in the back of the menu with pizzas and all manner of burgers and western crap is the very small Thai section which is indeed authentic Thai food and the chef even came out to shake my hand because he was much happier producing this sort of food.

My driver Kenny (who has learned that I want to see where they make things rather than where they sell them) has taken me to some out of the way places, like a king cobra farm and to the village of the Padaung people, they where the women wear the rings around their neck. (This was a bit sad as I felt the women had been reduced to a tourist attraction, but Kenny told me they did all right out of it.)

Having been to visit elephants I was quite glad when we drove past the 'PooPooPaper Elephant Park' as I wasn't quite sure what we might have on offer there.

We did visit what is known as the 'Carving

village' where everyone who lived there was a carver and as a finale he escorted me to the most amazing labyrinth of carving work I had ever seen. It covered the best part of an acre, seemingly every inch of it carved, some of it still-living trees. I met the head carver and asked if it was all his own work but he laughed and said that it was the work of fifty years and sixty carvers (most now dead) and that there were in total almost a quarter million carvings. His daughter told me they were all for sale but that was not the point of the place.

If you can imagine Clarence Valley Road with even tighter turns (they boast 763 hairpins) this was the 167 kilometre road to the country's northern most city of Pai. There was something of Kathmandu in the early seventies about it, in that place seemed to have attracted a lot of hippie types. Why this is the case is immediately obvious as the Thai government, in its wisdom, has legalised the dreaded wacky weed and in the main street every second bar offers no drinks, instead a menu of available ganja. They sport such names as Mellow Yellow, Heavenly High and the like. Kenny would not let me stop at any of them, after all I was older than his grandfather. Like the Kathmandu of fifty years ago every other shop offered up such treats as lemon meringue pie and gooey buns and other such sweet treats that seem to go with patronising the speakeasies.

A couple of observations about Thailand compared to Vietnam. Here they drive on the same side of the road as we do and they stop for red lights and stay on the correct side of the road. This is in no way comparable to Vietnam where whatever side of the road is largely irrelevant and it is cowardly to stop for red lights.

The other thing to report is that, like Vietnam, there is no shortage of single use plastic bags. The other evening I bought two biscuits. Each was individually wrapped in plastic with another plastic bag around the two together, and then a plastic carry bag to be sure. It seems that a person cannot get through the day without getting about thirty single use plastic bags. I mentioned it to a pharmacist who seemed a worldly type but she just smiled sweetly and handed me my purchases all individually housed in appropriate sized plastic bags and then stashed in another bigger plastic bag and then another which bore the pharmacy's name.

Railroad Track Widths

The United States standard railroad gauge (dist between rails) is 4 feet 8½ inches. That's an exceedingly odd number.

Blueberry Ginger Clafoutis

One of the most wonderful ways to celebrate fresh fruit, clafoutis originated in the Limousin region of France. Here, a small part of the batter is baked in the baking dish, then the berries, ginger and the rest of the batter is layered on top to prevent the blueberries from sinking and burning. For maximum lemon flavour, zest the lemon over the batter in Step 3. You can substitute any type of fresh fruit — berries, grapes, or cherries; just remember to adjust the amount of sugar you add accordingly. Cherry is a real favourite but remember to remove the pits

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter, softened, for greasing the pan
- 2 cups/480 millilitres whole milk, at room temperature
- 3 large eggs
- 1 cup/200 grams plus 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 1 cup/128 grams all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons fresh lemon zest
- teaspoon ground green cardamom
- ¹/₈ teaspoon fine sea salt
- 2 cups/280 grams fresh or frozen blueberries
- ¹/₄ cup/55 grams crystallized ginger, chopped small lcing sugar, for finishing (optional)

PREPARATION

Step 1 Place a rack at the upper level and a second in the middle of the oven. Heat oven to 350 degrees.

Step 2 Grease a 9-inch ceramic or glass baking dish or deep-dish pie plate (at least 1¹/₂ quart capacity) well with butter.

Step 3 In a large mixing bowl, whisk the milk, eggs, 1 cup sugar, flour, zest, cardamom and salt until smooth and combined, the sugar is dissolved, and there are no visible flecks of flour.

Step 4 Pour enough batter into the greased baking dish to cover the base by about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch. Place the baking dish on the top rack of the oven and cook until the batter is just about set – it should jiggle slightly in the centre – about 15 to 17 minutes.

Step 5 Remove the baking dish from the oven. Arrange the blueberries and the ginger on top in a single layer. Sprinkle the remaining 2 tablespoons sugar over the fruit. Pour the remaining batter over the fruit, return the dish to the oven, and bake on the middle rack until the batter is completely cooked, about 60 to 65 minutes. The edges should be slightly firm and golden brown, and the centre slightly jiggly. A knife inserted in the middle should come out clean. Remove from the oven and let cool for 5 minutes.

Step 6 Dust the top of the clafoutis with confectioners' sugar to taste and serve warm or at room temperature.



What a strange name for a car...

Alldays & Onions was a British engineering and manufacturing company that produced a variety of products, including bicycles, motorcycles, and automobiles. Alldays & Onions was founded in 1889 by Charles Onions and his brother-in-law, Edwin Allsop.

Initially, the company manufactured bicycles in Birmingham, England. They soon expanded their product range to include motorcycles, tricycles, and quadricycles. In the early 1900s, Alldays & Onions entered the automobile market. They produced their first motorcar, a three-wheeled vehicle, in 1902. The company continued to develop and manufacture automobiles, including both three and four-wheeled models.

One of their notable models was the Alldays Electric Car, introduced in 1905. It was an early electric vehicle that featured a range of around 60 miles on a single charge. The company also produced petrol-powered cars, often incorporating innovative features for the time. During World War I, Alldays & Onions shifted its focus to support the war effort. They produced munitions and aircraft components for the British military.

In the 1920s, Alldays & Onions struggled to compete with larger and more established automobile manufacturers. They experienced financial setbacks, and in 1927, the company went into voluntary liquidation. Although Alldays & Onions ceased automobile production, they continued as a general engineering firm, producing a range of products such as machinery, tools, and components for various industries.

Overall, Alldays & Onions had a relatively short-lived presence in the automobile industry, but they made notable contributions during their existence. Their electric and petrol-powered cars showcased early advancements in automotive technology. And to think it was one of their vehicles to first cross the short lived original Hanmer Bridge.

Down at the Menz Shed, Lester Truman goes by the name of Mr Google. "We don't need Google, we just ask Lester," quips member Mike Shaxon. Truman carries more blueprints in his head than the internet, Mike says, and is always quick to invent new ways of solving problems to help his community. When the Menz Shed was approached to come up with a wasp capture solution, Lester came back with a quick fix that is affordable and practical. "You take an ordinary 1.5L soft-drink bottle, cut it in half, invert the top into the bottom to create a funnel, put sugar water into the bottom – and wait for the wasps to visit," Lester explains. The Menz Shed create the wooden frames to hang the bottles in trees.

"If someone comes to us, whether a school, community group or sports club, and asks us if we can make something — if we can do it, then yes we will," says Shaxon. Throughout the Hanmer Springs community is evidence of the Menz Shed's contribution to their community. A shield for St John's CPR challenge, a flagpole for the golf club, birdfeeders for the Hanmer Springs Conservation Trust, outdoor furniture — they've done it all.


