



Potato Rosti

This potato rosti might be the perfect roast chicken accompaniment. It's easy, quick and is cooked entirely in one pan on the stove.

Ingredients

- 5 large potatoes
- ½ tsp salt, plus extra to season
- 2 tbsp butter

Method

- 1. Peel the potatoes and grate coarsely (you don't need to squeeze out any moisture). Combine with salt in a large bowl and toss to combine.
 - 2. Heat a 26cm frying pan over low-medium heat and add half the butter, swirling to coat the whole pan. Scatter the potato lightly into the pan but don't press it down. Cook for about 12 minutes, until the bottom is crisp and browned, then use a spatula to gather the edges into a round "cake" and firmly press down the top.
 - 3. Turn the rosti out onto a large plate and return the pan to the heat. Add the remaining butter and slide the rosti back into the pan with the uncooked potato facing down, pushing it down again into a firm cake. Cook for a further 10 minutes until well-browned and cooked through. Turn the rosti out, season with a little more salt, and serve.

Garlic butter roast chicken

This roast chicken might be the easiest Sunday roast of all. Ready in an hour, the garlic brown butter combines with the roasting juices for a simple sauce. Serve with some salad greens (or green peas) and a potato rosti like the one on the left and it's a full meal.

Ingredients

- 1.6kg free-range chicken
- 1 tbsp dark soy sauce
- salt, to season
- 50g salted butter
- 10 cloves garlic, peeled and bruised
- j cup loosely packed parsley sprigs, to serve
- 1 lemon, cut into wedges, to serve

Method

- 1. Heat your oven to 220C (200C fan-forced). With a pair of kitchen scissors, cut the <u>backbone out of</u> <u>the chicken</u> (you can keep it to make stock) and press down on the breast to flatten.
 - 2. Place skin up on a roasting tray, rub the skin with soy sauce and season with salt. Roast in the oven for 50 minutes. If your oven has a grill, turn on for the final 20 minutes of roasting to brown the skin. Remove the chicken to a serving plate, pour over any roasting juices and rest for 10 minutes.
 - 3. While the chicken is resting, place the butter and garlic in a small saucepan over low-medium heat. Heat for around 5-8 minutes, swirling occasionally, until the butter and garlic have a nutty brown colour. Pour over the chicken, scatter with parsley sprigs and serve with lemon wedges.

 Tip: Rubbing dark soy sauce into the skin whether a couple of days before or at the last

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Leading environmental groups deeply concerned at proposed defunding of DOC

15 September 2023

The chief executives of Forest & Bird, WWF-New Zealand and the Environmental Defence Society (EDS) are deeply concerned following confirmation last night that National intends to cut the Department of Conservation's (DOC's) budget by 6.5%. This could mean less predator and pest control, the imminent extinction of treasured native species, and impossible pressures on the organisation that manages one-third of our country.

"We understand that the proposed reduction of 6.5% is on the already reduced quantum for next year of \$710 million and would result in a \$46 million cut. This is defunding an agency that is already severely stretched to manage one-third of Aotearoa," said Gary Taylor, CEO of EDS.

"Defunding DOC to that extent would be catastrophic for our natural world and we simply won't stand for it," said Mr Taylor.

The CEO of WWF-New Zealand Dr Kayla Kingdon-Bebb highlighted the irony of National announcing a proposal to cut conservation funding during a debate in Queenstown, in which the party sought to emphasise the importance of tourism in New Zealand's economic recovery.

"Visitors to Aotearoa come here for the beauty of our natural landscapes, to experience our wild places and unique biodiversity. New Zealand's tourism industry depends on the health of our natural environment. Defunding DOC would not only be disastrous for nature, but also for the communities that rely on tourism for their livelihoods. "I can think of no more expedient way to shoot ourselves in the foot," said Dr Kingdon-Bebb.

Forest & Bird's CEO Nicola Toki said the idea of defunding our natural environment in the middle of biodiversity and climate crises was irresponsible leadership.

"We know that investing in nature-based solutions, by increasing protection of wetlands and rivers and controlling browsing pests reduces the impacts of climate events and improves our ability to reduce emissions.

"On top of that we have the dubious honour of having the highest proportion of threatened species per capita in the world. Given our love for our native wildlife, it's short-sighted and wrong-footed to be reducing the budget of the agency that is tasked with protecting our taonga species. "DOC's budget is about the same as the Christchurch City Council's, but it has to look after a third of Aotearoa," Ms Toki said.

The three environmental NGOs are asking National's finance spokesperson to please explain this policy, the analysis that lies behind it, and whether the consequences for New Zealand's threatened species and ecosystems have been assessed. They say they would be equally concerned at any party's plans to reduce conservation funding.

Where do the parties stand?



Protecting water sources and drinking water quality

More than 80% of New Zealanders consider the state of our water to be their main environmental concern. With climate change, existing impacts will be amplified. So how proactive will the next Government be at protecting water sources? All parties responded to the survey question on water source protection with varying amounts of commitment to the specific question around nitrogen contamination. The disparate nature of the parties' responses suggests very different understandings of what is driving the country's drinking water and wider water quality problems.

There are complex connections and interactions between land use, sewage, waste and drinking water infrastructure, the roles and responsibilities of public agencies, and existing policies. Without well-designed regulation, and clear roles and accountability for authorities, we will continue to see degradation of water sources and public health crises in communities.

Political party policies on nitrogen fertiliser and source water protection

In recent decades, manufactured nitrogen fertilisers have become the dominant source of nitrogen in NZ agricultural production. The use of manufactured (or "synthetic") nitrogen fertilisers in NZ has increased more than 600% since 1990.2 Along with an increase in irrigation, this fertiliser use has enabled the intensification of farming, including large increases in the numbers of dairy cows. For example, the number of dairy cows has increased ten-fold in Canterbury and 16-fold in Southland since 1990.3 This expansion has put huge pressure on waterways, including drinking water sources. The urine of dairy cows is a primary source of nitrogen pollution of water.4 It has contributed to breaches of national drinking water standards for nitrate (a form of nitrogen) in water supplies for some communities.

Our (PHCC) first question to the political parties asked: "Will your party implement regulations such as 'sinking lid' caps on the use of nitrogen fertiliser and revised **National Environment Standards for human drinking** water sources to clearly delineate source water protection zones?"

We (PHCC) then asked:

"Please expand on what further policies your party will introduce to protect the sources of NZ's drinking water". The responses from the parties are summarised in the the following

ACT

Summary of response

Supports a regulatory authority that sets science-based drinking water standards and verifies compliance of those standards by local drinking water infrastructure entities

Fertilizer

Not answered

Source Water Protection

Protection of local aquifers, etc. are best dealt with at local level to comply with drinking water standards.

Te Pati Maori

Summary of response

Since 2020, have been campaigning to phase out nitrogen fertilisers.

Introduced a Member's Bill that would prohibit the extraction of freshwater for selling in packaged form.

Fertilizer

Phase out in five years and support farmers to transition to regenerative, organic and value-add agricultural practices

Source Water Protection

Prevent extraction of freshwater for bottling.

Additional

Top priority is to honour Māori customary, proprietary, and decision-making rights. As kaitiaki, the protection and restoration of drinking water must be led by tangata whenua.

Green

Summary of response

Need to strengthen the regulation of nitrogen in waterways and work to restore waterways by preventing highly polluting land uses and controlling freshwater pests. Give effect to Tino Rangatiratanga by supporting hapū and iwi to give effect to Te Mana o te Wai.

LABOUR

Summary of Response

Making substantial progress on implementing the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management, delivered in 2020.

Fertiliser use has dropped by 5% per annum in the past 2 years as a result of the per annum fertiliser cap they introduced in 2020, and new software tools.

Source Water Protection

Regional councils are to deliver their regional plans consistent with the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management by the end of 2024.

Additional

Full policies to come before the election.

Comment

What stood out was the disparate nature of the parties' responses, with quite different characterisations of what is driving the country's drinking water and water quality problems.

Labour, the Greens and Te Pāti Māori identified land use and agriculture as upstream pressures on water quality. In contrast, National and ACT focused on downstream regulatory tools to manage water quality problems. National only discussed water services, avoiding comment on nitrogen fertiliser or other land activities. ACT focused on drinking water standards as the primary regulatory lever for improved quality drinking water).

Governance and decision-making were a strong focus for four out of the five parties. The Greens and Te Pāti Māori identified the need for tangata whenua to lead decision making in their rohe. National and ACT both stressed local decision making, (presumably by councils). Based on ACT's public comments outside our survey, it seems likely that they do not support tangata whenua leadership on water. National's position is less clear on this, and Labour has been publicly supportive of co-governance models.

Responses indicate a limited understanding of interactions between authorities involved in the protection of water. The Greens highlighted the need for the national drinking water regulator, Taumata Arowai, to be involved in regional decision-making. No other party mentioned the drinking water regulator explicitly, though ACT did mention drinking water standards which Taumata Arowai is responsible for. No party mentioned Havelock North's outbreak or its inquiry that found regional councils had been remiss in their duties to protect drinking water sources.

What is striking, particularly from the two main parties, is the lack of a cohesive, confident vision for moving to more sustainable, healthy land use. Primary risks to drinking water sources are agricultural pollution and over-extraction of water for irrigation. Furthermore, Cyclone Gabrielle very recently demonstrated how poor land use can impact water services following heavy rainfall events (e.g. silt and forestry slash damaging infrastructure). National did not mention land use or farming practices at all. While Labour did, it appeared focused on incremental rather than transformational changes. The Greens noted a need for a fair allocation of water use and that they do not support large-scale irrigation schemes (a driver of intensified land use). Te Pāti Māori was the only party to identify the need to support farmers as they redesign their farming systems to have less impact.

No party mentioned climate change, which is projected to amplify existing issues with water quality and resilience of water infrastructure.

Protecting the quality of water for the health of communities and the natural environment requires an understanding of the interactions between land use, infrastructure, climate change, and governance by central and regional agencies. Too narrow a focus from the incoming Government will mean more risk for communities from water-borne disease and hazardous contaminants in water.





All dressed up with somewhere to go!

Based on Rosalie Ham's best selling novel, The Dressmaker is the story of femme fatale Tilly Dunnage who returns to her small home town to right the wrongs of the past. A stylish drama with comic undertones about love, revenge and haute couture.

The Dressmaker features a story where the underdog succeeds while promoting Aussie dry wit. Myrtle 'Tilly' Dunnage (Kate Winslet) returns home to rural Australia after spending time abroad developing her fashion designing skills. As a child she was sent to a boarding school in Melbourne by Sergeant Farrat (Hugo Weaving) for she was accused of murdering a boy who bullied her. Her mother, Molly (Judy Davis) initially doesn't recognise her and isn't convinced she's her daughter. She eventually accepts her in her house and Tilly transforms it into a fashion factory where she makes clothes for the women of the town. In the meantime, she becomes romantically involved with Teddy McSwiney (Liam Hemsworth) whom she has known since they were children. The town still hasn't forgiven her for apparently killing the boy and believe she is cursed. Tilly will virtually stop at nothing to exact revenge on those who did her

The Dressmaker's compelling story features a wide range of interesting quintessentially Australian characters. A lot of the dialogue is witty and adds much to the Aussie humour on show. Davis garners most of the laughs in a performance which demonstrates her sensational acting ability. Winslet perfects the Aussie accent and many of the scenes she shares with her screen mother are hilarious. Weaving also has his turn in the spotlight with a wonderful performance as the cross-dressing police officer. Hemsworth plays it straight in comparison to his co-stars and reliably fulfills his role as the love interest. Credit must go to the stunning costume designs with the haute couture style befitting the movie title. With the story being reminiscent of a Clint Eastwood western where the main character comes to town, mingles with the locals then affects their lives one way or another, the music score by David Hirschfelder has some resemblance to a western. It's an exciting score that perfectly sets up the moods of the characters and the theme of the plot. The cinematography by Donald McAlpine also enhances the look of the film, ensuring that the rural town maintains its 'western' appearance. The overall quality of the film ensures that most viewers will be entertained.









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
