If you can't find your medication, please ring the Health Centre and press Option 1.

The Cervical Screening Self-test

HPV (Human papillomavirus) self-testing is now available.

HPV testing will become the primary cervical screening test in Aotearoa New Zealand from 12th September 2023. From this date, free cervical screening services will be available for key groups as part of the move to the new HPV test.

Free screening will be available from 12 September 2023 for:

- women and people with a cervix 30 years and over who are unscreened (have never had a screening test) or under-screened (haven't had a test in the past 5 years)
- anyone requiring follow up
- Māori and Pacific
- anyone who is a community service card holder

Slow-roasted lamb shoulder with almonds

How does a substantial Middle Eastern-inspired banquet sound? Start with this lamb dish and add a fennel and orange salad, some garlic-flavoured yoghurt and either couscous or rice and you'll have a very delicious meal indeed for a group of eight. When planning, remember that you'll need to start it the day before and then factor in a full day's cooking.

Ingredients

- 10 garlic cloves, peeled
- 1 tsp cumin seeds
- 1 tsp sea salt
- 2 pinches saffron threads
- 1S tbsp sweet paprika
- 1 tsp ground ginger
- j tsp ground turmeric
- pinch cayenne pepper
- 3 tbsp unsalted butter, softened
- 2 small bone-in shoulders of lamb (about 1kg each), or 1 larger shoulder (2kg)
- 2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- juice of 1 lemon
- extra virgin olive oil, to serve
- S cup of toasted slivered almonds
- S cup flat-leaf parsley (leaves only)

Method

- 1. Using a mortar and pestle, crush the garlic cloves, cumin seeds, sea salt, saffron, paprika, ginger, turmeric and cayenne, then add the butter to make a thick, creamy marinade. Rub the marinade into the lamb and refrigerate overnight.
 - 2. Remove the lamb from the refrigerator 2 hours before cooking.
 - 3. Preheat oven to 130°C. Place lamb shoulders in a roasting tin large enough to fit both and drizzle with 2 tbsp olive oil. Add 125ml water. Fold the edges of two sheets of foil together to make a tent over the lamb, seal tightly then cook for 2S-3 hours.
 - 4. Reduce the heat to 110°C and cook for 4 hours more (if using a single large shoulder, keep oven at 130°C for a similar cooking time). When the meat is ready, you will be able to tease it from the bone with a fork. Remove from the oven and allow to rest for 20 minutes, opening up the foil a fraction, then shred the meat off the bone.
 - 5. Place meat on a platter, or divide among plates, and serve with lemon juice and extra virgin olive oil with the slivered almonds and parsley scattered over the top, as well as a really good grind of fresh pepper. Serve with orange and fennel salad.

zucchini and smoked fish pie

Fish pie is the ultimate comforting midweek dinner. This slightly lighter version swaps the traditional potato or pastry topping for zucchini rounds. The filling can easily be adapted to use whatever you have leftover over in the fridge, from a medley of roasted vegetables to shredded roast chicken from Sunday's roast. I like to serve this with a baby gem salad, something cooling and crunchy to cut through the richness.

Ingredients

- 30g butter
- 30g plain flour
- 500ml milk, lukewarm
- 1 bay leaf
- salt and white pepper
- 1 tbsp grainy mustard
- zest and juice of 1 lemon
- 350g smoked fish, flaked
- 2 boiled eggs, chopped
- 150g frozen peas, thawed
- 1 medium zucchini
- 1 tbsp olive oil

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C (fan-forced). Melt the butter in a large pan over medium heat and add the flour. Using a wooden spoon, beat to a smooth paste (a roux). Take off the heat.
 - 2. Start adding the milk to the roux by beating in about 2 tablespoons at a time, until you have incorporated about a quarter of the milk. Switch to a whisk and gradually incorporate the remaining milk.
 - 3. Return the pan to medium heat, add the bay leaf and simmer for 10 minutes. Whisk frequently to prevent the sauce from burning on the bottom of the pan. If the sauce becomes too thick (it should have the consistency of custard or a thick tomato sauce), whisk in a little more milk.
 - 4. Remove the bay leaf, season with salt and white pepper (black pepper is fine if you don't mind the speckles), and stir in a heaped tablespoon of grainy mustard and the lemon zest.
 - 5. Stir the smoked fish, boiled eggs and peas through the mixture. Spoon the filling into a medium pie dish (or other ovenproof dish).
 - 6. Slice the zucchini thinly (about 2mm thick) using a mandolin. Arrange the slices over the pie filling in overlapping circles from the centre outwards.
 - 7. Brush the top with the olive oil and bake for 20 minutes, or until the zucchini slices are golden brown and the mixture is bubbling. Serve with lemon juice.

Letter from China; Brave New World

Greetings from Hangzhou, pop 10,000,000, hosting the 2023 Asia Games. The city is geared up and looking splendid. 50 plus stadiums built or refurbished and a huge firework and light show for the opening ceremony is on the menu tonight. On the 12th floor with uninterrupted views, we should be in a prime spot. Gladly the 30 degree days have temporarily abated.

Here Hangzhou is the home of Alibaba, the retail giant of Asia. The founder, Jack Ma went to our university. Hangzhou is also seen to be the innovative high-tech centre of China. Here Alipay, a part of the Ali group is dominant. With Alipay you choose your food in restaurants, pay for anything and everything, order taxis using Didi the Uber equivalent, buy train, theatre, sports tickets and book hotels and more. It is an awesome system and it even has a translation service.

Credit cards and Pay Wave appear to not exist here, or are well hidden. Cash too is a rarity. There was the odd place in Beijing. Alipay is all you need and is part of life.

But whilst I am in awe of the technological breakthrough, a one stop shop, it is dependent upon internet and

battery on your phone. Language is difficult here, and English rarely spoken on Campus and even rarer off campus. So, without your phone life can be very, very hard

In today's busy world many do not have time to help and work with you on ordering dinner. In a restaurant the other night with flaky internet from NZ, we found it almost impossible to scroll through the menu on the phone, the descriptions in Chinese and the photos impossibly small. We could not cope and walked out as the help and understanding was non existent. Around the corner another restaurant was the complete opposite and we enjoyed a stunning meat free meal. Not eating meat is difficult, I am not sure I could cope if we had allergies.

Experiencing life as a minority is humbling. So far, we have not seen any other Kiwi's, Māori, Pakeha or indeed any Europeans. People point and stare and regularly photograph. When we tell them we are from "She sheeland" we are greeted like long lost friends. The Chines love New Zealand and its people, beauty and countryside. They are well aware that we are trade partners and our products are highly valued.

Working here is an opportunity of a life time and an amazing experience.

MOLESWORTH (YARRA - FIVE MILE) POSSUM CONTROL OPERATION

Vector Free Marlborough (VFM) wishes to advise the public of its intention to aerially apply the toxin Sodium fluoroacetate (1080) in the Yarra – Five Mile area of Molesworth Station for the purpose of controlling possums. The Molesworth possum control operation is being carried out on behalf of OSPRI as part of its TBfree New Zealand programme, which aims to eradicate bovine tuberculosis from wildlife vectors that pose a risk to farmed cattle and deer.

Description of Control Area

The Yarra – Five Mile control area lies between the Boddington Range in the west and the Acheron River in the east and extends from the Acheron Accommodation House in the south, to Pudding Hill in the north. The most notable waterways flowing through the control area are the Five Mile Stream and Yarra River.

The Yarra – Five Mile control area is part of the permission area for the 2023 Molesworth operation, which takes in approximately 104,000 hectares of publicly owned land, administered by various agencies including the Department of Conservation, Land Information New Zealand and several local authorities. A detailed map may be obtained from VFM as per contact details below.

Commencement Date

The 2023 Molesworth operations is being carried out in two stages:

Bush Gully - Tarndale

Control in the approximately 96,000 hectare Bush Gully - Tarndale block was completed in August 2023.

Yarra - Five Mile

Control in the approximately 8,000 hectare Yarra — Five Mile block is scheduled to commence from **1 October 2023**, with the aerial application of non-toxic cereal pre-feed pellets. This will be followed approximately 7-10 days later by the aerial application of bait containing biodegradable Sodium fluoroacetate (1080).

All work is weather dependant, and commencement may be later than indicated. In the event of an extended delay, further notices will be placed to advise the public.

Bait Description Aerial and ground control using 1080:

- Pre-feed Non-toxic cereal-based pellet, approximately 16mm long, cinnamon-lured and dyed green.
- Toxic bait Cereal-based pellet, approximately 16mm long, cinnamon-lured and dyed green with a toxic loading of 0.15% Sodium fluoroacetate (1080).
 Note all 1080 bait for aerial and ground application will contain deer repellent.
 Precautions

The public are reminded of the danger that toxic baits and possum carcasses pose, particularly to children and dogs.

- Do not touch or eat baits
- Children must be kept under strict supervision in the control area.
- Dogs must be kept under strict control at all times and not have access to, or be taken into the control area, as they are particularly susceptible to harm from contact with toxic baits and poisoned carcasses. The risk that poisoned carcasses pose to dogs may extend downstream of the control area.
- Toxin warning signs will be installed at main public entry points and the public are reminded that it is an offence to remove this warning signage. Please follow the instructions on the signs.
- Game animals should not be sold or taken for eating from within or adjacent to this area until it is declared clear of pesticides.

EV discount (aka the "ute tax")

The Clean Car Discount, introduced in 2021, offers a rebate on the sticker price of fully electric and plug-in hybrid cars. With fees applied to higher-emitting vehicles, the scheme was intended to be cost-neutral. However, the higher uptake of cleaner vehicles since the launch meant the discounts exceeded the fees by roughly \$200m.

Clean Car Standard

Lesser known than the discounts on EVs, the Clean Car Standard incentivises car companies to import loweremitting vehicles.

This year, the Government wants imported cars to produce, on average, no more than 145 grams of carbon dioxide per kilometre - and commercial vehicles no more than 218.3 grams, on average. The targets will get progressively lower each year.

Fees on agricultural emissions

The Zero Carbon Act requires the country's methane to fall somewhere between 24 and 47% by 2050 - a range climate scientists have modelled as being compatible with keeping warming to 1.5C. Under the law, nitrous oxide emissions must reach net-zero by mid-century.

Home insulation and heating

Public transport

Car and truck drivers produce roughly 13m tonnes of emissions on the roads each year, about one-sixth of the country's total footprint. Particularly if powered by electricity, public transport produces far fewer emissions than the equivalent journey by petrol or diesel car.

The Climate Change Commission has encouraged the Government to invest in making buses, trains and ferries more reliable and accessible, to encourage people to leave their cars at home.

Subsidies for business to swap boilers

The Energy Efficiency and Conservation Agency (EECA) contributes up to 50% of the extra cost for green tech. In last year's Budget, the fund received a \$1b boost and an extended remit.




All dressed up with somewhere to go!

Based on Rosalie Ham's best selling novel, The Dressmaker is the story of femme fatale Tilly Dunnage who returns to her small home town to right the wrongs of the past. A stylish drama with comic undertones about love, revenge and haute couture.

The Dressmaker features a story where the underdog succeeds while promoting Aussie dry wit. Myrtle 'Tilly' Dunnage (Kate Winslet) returns home to rural Australia after spending time abroad developing her fashion designing skills. The town still hasn't forgiven her for apparently killing the boy and believe she is cursed. Tilly will virtually stop at nothing to exact revenge on those who did her

The Dressmaker's compelling story features a wide range of interesting quintessentially Australian characters. A lot of the dialogue is witty and adds much to the Aussie humour on show. Davis garners most of the laughs in a performance which demonstrates her sensational acting ability. Winslet perfects the Aussie accent and many of the scenes she shares with her screen mother are hilarious. Weaving also has his turn in the spotlight with a wonderful performance as the cross-dressing police officer. Hemsworth plays it straight in comparison to his co-stars and reliably fulfills his role as the love interest. Credit must go to the stunning costume designs with the haute couture style befitting the movie title. With the story being reminiscent of a Clint Eastwood western where the main character comes to town, mingles with the locals then affects their lives one way or another, the music score by David Hirschfelder has some resemblance to a western. It's an exciting score that perfectly sets up the moods of the characters and the theme of the plot. The cinematography by Donald McAlpine also enhances the look of the film, ensuring that the rural town maintains its 'western' appearance. The overall quality of the film ensures that most viewers will be entertained.
