





Letter from my travels.

In my last letter I mentioned I was going to have a quiet few days in Shanghai. Haha that was a mistake.

Shanghai is a Super City. 29,000,000 people. 6 times bigger than NZ. Plus millions of tourists both Chinese and international. In Hangzhou we saw no other Pakeha, in Shanghai it is the opposite. It is totally multicultural with every race, religion and type of national dress visible.

Our hotel, in the heart of the CBD, just a few hundred metres from The Bund and The Pearl Tower, fronts Nanjing Road. Quiet and peaceful, dimmed lighting, cool bars and restaurants and garden seating area. The calm before the storm.

As the front door opens allowing us to spill onto The Nanjing Road the peace is shattered. This Road is probably the busiest shopping street in the world. 5.5km of luxury retail. The pedestrian street resembles the cake tin roads after an All Blacks game. Thousands and thousands of pedestrians from 10am to 11pm. You can't walk in a straight line, you are constantly stop start with friendly jostling and good humour. Skilful whistling police guard our safety. It truly is organised chaos but it's exhilarating and adrenaline pumping.

The night sky is ablaze with colour, music and happiness. No drunken revellers, no aggressive males, just happy throngs. At 10pm the light shows are extinguished and there follows an orderly exodus to home and hotel.

In the Peace Hotel, and Art Deco monument of sheer history there is a basement Jazz Lounge and cocktail bar. Decadent luxury.

The Bund is the financial and economic centre of Shanghai and China. Huge tower blocks of the world banks, insurance companies and commerce jostle for finance, returns and entrepreneurship.

The river, the heart of this thumping city contains boats of every shape and size. Slow barges low on the water compete with cruise ships, floating restaurants, glorious neon sampans and imitation sharks with several hundred passengers revelling the night away.

The night sky and light shows viewed from the 29th floor roof top bar defies description. Lights of every colour in every direction are spectacular.

Our quiet few days came to an end all too quickly and we departed for our niece's wedding in Liverpool. Liverpool is very reminiscent of Shanghai as many of the old buildings in both cities share architects and construction genre from similar times.

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

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

Do You Recognise Yourself?

Before I became the Pinkie editor I spent more than thirty years in the restaurant business, both as a chef and as front-of-house.

While the customers were in the restaurant and being served we were almost always the soul of politeness, kindness and consideration, but after they had all gone, while the buff was being put on the wine glasses, the cutlery being polished and tables set ready for tomorrow, was when the customer's name was likely to be taken in vain.

Not every customer wins the hearts and minds of the staff, who are probably toiling on minimum wage. These few examples are from personal experience.

There are a few customers who can be categorised at the top of the list of people we would prefer to never see again.

The finger-clickers are universally hated - if you need the waiter's attention just look at him/her and slightly raise your hand or nod to them. You are likely to get the creme de menthe over the white silk suit treatment if you finger-click at them or wave your hand in an exaggerated manner.

hand in an exaggerated manner. The dithering orderers are a source of great frustration. I'll have the empanadas, no, I won't I'll have the oysters, were they fresh in today, how many do you get, only six, then, no, I'll have the terrine, was it made here or bought in.... Invariably when this course is placed in front of the dithering diner, they say, no, I didn't order that, I ordered the mussels. And every chef will tell you how much he loathes having to stop and cook something that the diner couldn't remember - and it sets the whole restaurant and every other diner back by 20 minutes or more.

The special order nuisances are often people you know.. The ones who say, could you ask the chef to cook my steak with mushroom sauce (which is not on the menu and thus not prepared for). Could I have the garlic prawns without garlic or oil. And if you want the chef to prepare something special just for you, think about the messenger getting shot, because it is a brave waiter who takes that order to an under-pressure chef.

As for the people who declare themselves to have various food allergies or intolerances which includes gluten-free, vegetarians and vegans - every restaurant is happy to cater for these diners if they let the staff know in advance. I remember one customer who ordered a

meal that was to be vegan, but was not allowed to contain, onion, garlic, tomato, lettuce or any leafy greens and no grains or pulses and this was when we were struggling to feed some hapless diners during a power cut. Also diners, take note, about 6% of the world's population is gluten intolerant - in a restaurant situation that rises to about 20% and fifty per cent among the neurotic attention seekers. Gluten-free is a giant pain in the arse because nobody knows what has gluten and what doesn't (including the diner).

Bill-splitters don't come in very high in the popularity stakes either. I can recall a table of twelve wanting to individualise the bill. Divided by 12 would have been fine, but no, it was 'I shared an entree so I only want to pay half' and 'I didn't like that wine so I didn't drink it and ... One of your restaurant staff is going to be tied up at the till for 30 minutes, and always, always, when it comes to the last person to pay they get stuck

with a giant bill because all the items that others didn't want to pay for, remain to be paid. This usually generates another 30 minutes of lost time and people leaving disgruntled.

The spreader-outers are also a pain in the arse, they cover the table in paperwork, laptop computers, colouring books and crayons for the kiddies and often their personal water bottle. When the waiter arrives there is nowhere to put anything except a precarious corner.

Unruly children and messy eaters are also a nightmare. Some people seem to believe that being in a restaurant is synonymous with withdrawing attempts at manners and parental control. In one restaurant it required about half an hour to clean and reset the table where a family of four dined. Their children delighted in grinding rice into the carpet. And they said we were their favourite restaurant.

The diners who had an argument with their spouse before the evening even began are a delight to serve because they frequently take out their aggravations on the waiter. After all, it is their job not to answer back and they provide a wonderful opportunity to put someone in their place, a convenient receptacle for a dump of invective.

Good waiters are renowned for service that is skilful but relaxed, and warm without being fussy. Above all, the way they look after people reflects the culture and philosophy of the restaurant they are in.

This is my annual pre-summer appeal on behalf of the hospitality staff of Hanmer A plea to treat them with respect. It's not an easy job.


