This iconic salad celebrates its 100th anniversary in 2024. The versions we enjoy today are quite different from the original. Bacon, anchovies, and often boiled eggs are welcome additions, in my opinion, but the croutons, a generous helping of parmesan, and whole cos lettuce leaves of the original are well worth retaining.

Ingredients

- 4 eggs (optional)
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, peeled and bruised
- 100g speck, rind removed and cut into thick lardons
- 250g (3 cups) sourdough bread, cut into 3cm cubes
- 2 heads baby cos lettuce, large dark outer leaves discarded
- 1 cup freshly grated parmesan cheese, grated with a peeler freshly ground black pepper, to season

CAESAR DRESSING

- 1 egg yolk
- 1 tsp Dijon mustard
- 4 anchovies, plus extra for the salad if you like
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp worcestersiiii
- 60ml vegetable oil 40ml olive oil

Method

Step 1

Prick a small hole in the base of your eggs (if using) and boil them for 7 minutes (see note). Transfer immediately to iced water to cool completely, then peel.

Step 2

Heat the oven to 180C fan-forced (200C conventional). Heat a medium ovenproof frying pan over medium heat, add the oil and the bruised garlic cloves and fry the speck until browned but still soft. Remove the speck from the pan with a slotted spoon, leaving the oil in the pan. Toss the bread cubes in the oil in the pan, season with salt and place the pan in the oven. Bake for 15 minutes, stirring halfway through, until the croutons are golden brown and crisp all over. Remove from the oven and cool.

Step 3

Combine the egg yolk, mustard and anchovies in a large mortar, crushing them together to form a paste. Then add the lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce, followed by the vegetable oil, drizzling in a little oil at a time and continuing to mix with the pestle so the dressing emulsifies. When you have added all the vegetable oil, repeat with the olive oil. The ingredients should emulsify to a creamy dressing rather than splitting. If you prefer, you can whisk the ingredients together in a bowl rather than using a mortar and pestle.

Step 4

Wash and thoroughly dry the lettuce leaves, cutting leaves lengthways if they are too large. Toss the lettuce with the dressing and s of the parmesan, s of the croutons and s of the speck. Halve the boiled eggs. Transfer to a serving plate/bowl and add the remaining parmesan, croutons and speck, halved eggs and extra anchovies if you like. Grind over black pepper and serve.

Prawn and glass noodle salad

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp dried shrimp
- 1 coriander root (stems and leaves)
- 2 garlic cloves
- 1 red bird's eye chilli
- 1 tbsp palm sugar, roughly chopped, or 2 tsp white sugar
- 2 tbsp fish sauce

juice of 1 lemon or 2 limes

100g raw prawn meat, butterflied

40g dried mung bean vermicelli noodles (bean thread or glass noodles)

1/2 small brown onion, finely sliced

1 stalk celery, peeled and finely sliced

1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved

1/4 cup roasted peanuts, crushed

Method

Step 1

Cover the dried shrimp with about 1 cup of boiling water and stand for 15 minutes, then drain.

Step 2

Roughly chop the coriander, separating the leaves from the stems and root. Place the stems and root in a mortar with the garlic and chilli and pound to a coarse paste. Add the sugar, fish sauce and lemon or lime juice and mix to create a coarse dressing.

Step 3

Bring a small saucepan of water to a simmer and add the fresh prawns. Simmer for about 3 minutes, until just cooked through, then remove from the water. Add the dried noodles to the water and simmer for about 5 minutes, until softened, then drain well. Rinse quickly under running water, then drain again. (You can cut the noodles into shorter lengths if you prefer.)

Step 4

Combine the noodles and prawns in a mixing bowl with the onion, celery and tomato. Add the dressing and toss to combine. Toss the coriander leaves through and transfer to a serving plate. Scatter with the peanuts to serve.

What Is Morris Dancing

There is a fascinating history behind this unique tradition.

Morris dancing is a celebration, a display of dance and music performed at seasonal festivals and holidays to banish the dark of winter, celebrate the warmth and fertility of summer, and bring in autumn's golden harvest.

A more technical definition is that Morris dance is a form of English folk dance usually accompanied by music. It's based on rhythmic stepping and the execution of choreographed figures by a group of dancers. Morris men and women usually wear bell pads on their shins and dance with sticks, swords and handkerchiefs.

Contrary to popular belief, there is normally no man named 'Maurice' dancing. The name is most likely derived from the French word *morisque* meaning 'a dance, the dance' then *morisch* in Flemish which eventually became 'Morris' in English. Even in Elizabethan times, this form of dancing was considered ancient with famous actors performing the 'jig'.

The Music

Historically, the instruments used to accompany the Morris Dancing originated in the South Midlands in the form of the pipe and tabor and the whistle and the dub. In the 1840s, the fiddle was introduced, becoming the main instrument.

In the 1880s, the melodeon and anglo-concertina became widely used. These instruments were ideal to provide the perfect rhythmic backdrop for the style of dancing. In addition to these instruments, some bands also use the mouth organ, penny whistle and even the banjo. The kind of music used for Morris dancing really depends on the village where it is taking place as many different regions have different takes on the traditional tunes.

Where Does It Come From

The earliest known and surviving English written mention of Morris dancing is dated to 1448, and records the payment of seven shillings to Morris dancers by the Goldsmiths' Company in London.

Further mentions of Morris dancing occur in the late 15th century, and there are also early records such as bishops! "Visitation Articles" mentioning sword dancing, guising and other dancing activities, as well as mumming plays.

While the earliest records tend to mention "Morys" in a court setting, and a little later in the Lord Mayors' Processions in London, it had assumed the nature of folk dance and song performed in the parishes by the mid 17th century.

The majority of contemporary Morris sides have been formed in the last 80 years or so. Each club will have a Squire who is responsible for the performance and the sides leadership, a Foreman or Captain who teaches the dances, and a Bagman who acts as its secretary. Clubs are autonomous so they can make their own decisions as to when, where and what to dance.

Sides generally practice during the winter months, and perform during the summer. All sides will welcome new members. If you wish to get involved, you can ask one of the dancers, contact one of the Morris Ring Sides near you.

As for that very English pastime making its way to Hanmer Springs, the credit for this must go to Doctor John Dumsday, for many years our popular village GP who brought it with him when he came to the Village.

Originally John arranged to bring groups to Hanmer to perform but over the years he formed Hanmer's own group. Judging from the performances we have seen on the Village Green and at the markets, there has been no shortage of local volunteers. This weeks event sees sides from the US and the UK making their way to our shores.





Fledglings take off

We are starting to see some rewarding results along the Clarence and Acheron rivers.

In December, a group of volunteers came out to help catch and band chicks at each colony with a small metal ring each with a unique identification code. This is part of this project's recruitment and population dispersal study.

Over 4 days we managed to band 31 chicks and safely release them back onto their colonies island.

We are now at the stage where many of these chicks have started to fledge and can be seen flying around their colonies with adult birds. Fledglings don't have the black cap adults do and can be heard giving off a high-pitched chirp as they fly around.

Currently, 59 fledglings have been counted across all monitored colonies.

Parents are still busy feeding other smaller chicks that haven't yet grown big enough to fly, whilst other birds are on their second or third nesting attempt on some islands.

With the constant sunshine and heat that this summer season has brought, chicks have been constantly using their chick shelter to seek shade, even the occasional adult has been resting underneath the shelter!

Whilst chicks have successfully hatched, they aren't safe until they can fly away from danger. Over the Christmas period, a couple of feral cats decided to access a large colony for their Christmas feast. Unfortunately, they became very full of fresh eggs and hatched chicks that were asleep during the night.

We hope that the river levels can remain high enough to protect the nesting birds and their chicks on other islands so that they too can successfully fledge this season.

During this month you might be able to see terns circling high above the Hanmer Springs village during sunsets as they look for extra food reflected in the sky.



What Is A Universal Basic Income

It is the Payment by a Government to Its Citizens, Similar to NZ Superannuation but Starting at a Much Younger Age

A Why Is It Being Looked at by Some Countries

- 1. Because it is Simple
- 2. It would replace the unemployment benefit
- 3. It would replace many other welfare benefits
- 4. How many welfare type benefits in NZ: 76
- It would reduce welfare bureaucracy considerably, re people, complexity, management and government time
- 6. The NZ Welfare budget is constantly increasing Presently it is around \$43 billion (including National Superannuation)
- 7. Presently, the cost for NZ would be too high but in time it will be more and more looked at.
- 8. The NZ: Tax system is simple
 National Superannuation is simple
 Welfare system is anything but simple

B. What Might the Key Structure Be for a Country like NZ

- 1. It could be say \$1000 per month (\$12,000 p/a)
- 2. It would like National Super be taxable
- 3. It could be paid to all NZ citizens from the age say of 20 years to 65 years.
- 4. It would cease when National Super starts, presently at 65 years of age
- 5. It would be paid fortnightly, again like Super

Note 1) The number of NZ people over 90 years of age is currently 34,850 (0.667%)

Note 2) Another way of looking at this data is to say that the under 15 years and over 65 years of 1,831,610 in number represents 35.07% of the total population dependant on the 15 to 65 age group of 3,3391,290. That is 1,831,610 are dependant on 3,391,290 - a dependancy ratio of 54%

Note 3) The over 65 group is presently costing the government \$20 billion a year in National Superannuation

D. What Would a Universal Basic Income Cost the NZ Government as described in Points A & B

Universal Basic Income at \$12,000 p/a for 3,718,030 NZ citizens (who are between 20 and 65 years of age \$44,616 billion

Less saving say:

- 1. Income tax at 20% \$8,923 billion
- 2. Reduction in annual welfare budget say \$23 billion
- 3. Reduction in Government costs and administration say \$5.0 billion

Notes (1) This would suggest the cost is too high for the Government to consider at this point in time.

- (2) If the NZ Government Annual Welfare Budget increases by say \$2 billion per year then in ten years time the figures would be worth looking at again
- (3) Within ten years there will be several of the world's countries involving this concept in their government's fiscal policies to some degree, I feel.
