POOLS NEWS

The Pinkie met up with Graeme Abbot last week for a catch up on all things Hanmer Springs Thermal Pools and Spa. Good news is that over the summer the complex is seen a growth of just over 4% on the previous year.

"Figures are promising," Graeme told us, "And we are just short of our pre-Covid turn-outs.

"All we need to achieve that is have the return of our foreign tourists and their numbers are rising, with every indication that they are coming back.

"We are also beginning to see a boost from some of the cruise ship bus excursions coming back."

Over the Christmas holiday period they put through 4,100 people in one day with a total of 78,000 people since Boxing Day (until 24th January).

The new slides have proven very popular with an average of 5400 rides a day.

The Tea Kiosk is also doing very well with excellent figures over the summer period. They did 400 pizzas on day alone. It is a matter of being able to produce them quickly enough to meet the demand and they are working on streamlining their processes in order to speed up their service.

With regard to summer hours and 9 pm closing, Graeme told us, "We have the best bunch of staff we have had in ages and we will definitely be staying open until 9 pm until Easter and maybe beyond."

Fly Ride

The hearing of objections to the granting of approval to the Fly Ride has been set down for March 18. The hearing is going to be heard in Hanmer Springs and is set down to last the whole week. Approval was granted some time ago but the group calling themselves 'Friends of Conical Hill' put in an objection. The hearing had been set down for last November, but was delayed due to the a bereavement in the family of a Commissioner.

Soldiers Block

The start of work on the Soldiers Block renovation and rebuild is getting closer. The Council call for expressions of interest in the project received eight responses from contractors. This has now been reduced to three who have received documentation for tenders.

It is hoped that construction work will start within two or three months. At this stage Weta Workshops are still very keen to be involved in the project.






WELLNESS APP: Follow these steps in the APP to specify a place to have your medication delivered e.g. Hanmer Healthworks / Culverden Tearooms, instead of a pharmacy or the Health Centre.

After selecting your medication in the app, Select your pick up method of Rural Collection & Delivery **Option**



Now confirm your pickup method by typing in the place for it to be delivered to, e.g. Hanmer Healthworks. Press CONTINUE for the fee & processing time. Press **CONTINUE** again and **Confirm your request** looks good and press Confirm & Send Request.



The final step **CONFIRMS** your script request is sent. Now press **CLOSE**.

If you call our clinic phone out of hours, your call is always answered by a registered nurse who will assess your needs, offer advice or, if required, pass the call to our on-call clinician. It can take several minutes to answer the phone so please be patient and hold, and follow the voice prompts carefully. If you are seen by the on-call clinician there is a \$25 after-hours call out fee on top of the consultation fee.

Soba noodles in chilled chicken broth

This is a super-easy soup to make, especially as you can use store-bought chicken broth. Leave the stock in the freezer until very cold – the colder, the better on a hot day. You can use cooked buckwheat instead of the soba noodles; and could also replace the prawns with chunks of cooked chicken with the skin removed.

Ingredients

- 1.6L homemade or good-quality shop-bought chicken stock
- 15g ginger, thinly sliced
- 60ml rice wine vinegar, plus extra to serve
- 40ml soy sauce, plus extra to serve
- 400g soba noodles
- 30ml sesame oil
- 8 king prawns, peeled and cooked
- ½ nashi pear or bosc pear, peeled, cored and julienned just before serving to avoid discolouring
- 70g cucumber, halved, deseeded and julienned
- 2 hard-boiled eggs, peeled and halved
- 10g spring onion, white part only, finely chopped
- 20g toasted sesame seeds
- · wasabi paste

Method

Step 1

Combine stock and ginger in a heavy-based saucepan and bring to the boil over medium heat. Remove from the heat and add rice wine vinegar and soy sauce. Allow to cool before pouring into a freezer-safe bowl and placing into the freezer to chill for an hour.

Step 2

Bring a large, heavy-based saucepan of water to the boil, add the noodles and cook for 3 minutes or until just cooked through. Drain and refresh multiple times in cold water until the noodles are cold. Drain well, then toss with sesame oil to prevent them from sticking together. Refrigerate until well chilled.

Step 3

Divide noodles among 4 bowls, ladle over the chilled broth, then garnish with prawns, pear, cucumber, hard-boiled egg and spring onion before scattering with toasted sesame seeds. Serve with extra rice wine vinegar, soy sauce and wasabi so that everyone can season to taste.





Steak and avocado salad with fried garlic vinaigrette

Fried garlic takes a simple vinaigrette to another level, infusing the oil with its toasty flavour. It's the keystone that locks together juicy steak, creamy avocado and fresh crisp salad leaves. This is one of my favourite salads of all time.

Ingredients

- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 3 anchovies, finely chopped
- 4 cloves garlic, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 tsp dijon mustard
- 1 tbsp lemon juice
- 1 tbsp white wine vinegar
- a good pinch of sugar
- salt, for seasoning
- 2 x 300g sirloin steaks
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 small yellow capsicum, very finely sliced
- 1 avocado, sliced
- 1 small red onion, very finely sliced
- 6 cups mixed baby spinach and rocket leaves
 - 1 cup snow-pea shoots (optional)
 - 1 tbsp finely chopped parsley

Method

Heat a medium frying pan over medium heat and add the oil, then the anchovies and garlic. Cook for about 3 minutes, stirring regularly until the garlic is browned and crisp and the anchovies have nearly disappeared. Pour the entire contents of the pan into a heatproof bowl and whisk in the mustard,

lemon juice, white wine vinegar and sugar and set aside to cool to room temperature.

Return the pan to high heat. When the small amount of oil still remaining in the pan starts to smoke, season the steaks well and fry the steaks until cooked to your liking. Rest in a warm place until ready to serve.

Toss the tomatoes, capsicum, avocado, onion, salad leaves and, if using, snowpea shoots together. Thickly slice the steak and arrange on top of the salad. Combine any meat juices with the dressing, add the parsley and whisk to combine. Pour the dressing over the salad to serve.







The Long Hot Summers of the Past


How many times on these hot days do we hear the comment that it is just like the long hot summers of the past. Whether this is true or just a distortion of the memory we don't know. If you are young, older people are always telling you things were better or cheaper in the old days.

In the 1950s when I was growing up in Hanmer there was no cold water swimming pool, only the hot pools in the hospital grounds. Not even the school had a swimming pool so we all learned to swim and had our school swimming lessons in the men's pool.

When the mercury climbed up over the 80°F the only relief would be found down at the river, usually the Waiau. Transport was often a problem as not many families owned motor cars so as children those of us who owned bicycles could ride down to the Hanmer Bridge and follow the track down to where it joined the Waiau. This was a favourite place to swim, just where the warmer water of the Hanmer filtered into the river and every year after the spring floods we hoped for a decent pool there.


Most years the Donaldson brothers would get down to the Hanmer River, and often the Rogerson as well and dig out a deep hole which would last until the first fresh in the river. The front of these would be






dammed up with big rocks, work that was usually done in a community working bee or by the bigger kids.

In those days the Railway Road Services bus used to leave Hanmer at 7.30 am and of course, we knew all the drivers, so guite often the whole family would get on the bus and get dropped off at the Hanmer Bridge with strict instructions for the driver to pick us up again at 7.30 pm on the return journey. We clambered on to the bus laden with picnic rugs, thermos flasks, picnic hampers and sensible hats and set up headquarters in the trees just near the confluence. Another favourite spot was Marble Island and the bus would drop us off, opposite the Marble Quarry, where there was a track carved through the broom and the blackberries down to the river. This was a favourite family picnic spot, complete with a sandy beach and a safe back water for the little kids to paddle and very often there would be organised outings of half a dozen or more families with the ladies coordinating who brought what for the picnic lunches with bacon and egg pies, left over Christmas ham, potato salads and cold chicken and the men would have their quart bottles of Wards Ale cooling in the river. One or two families with cars would ferry everyone back and forward to the river. Ron Fitzgibbon had a 1928 Chevrolet and we once counted 18 children in it. Some hot evenings at the river it seemed like half the town was there.




