

New Recycling Legislation

Led by the Ministry of Environment, under the Transforming Recycling legislation, most councils around New Zealand are now standardising the way their recycling is collected, which came into effect on Thursday February 1 2024, this includes kerbside glass recycling.

Hurunui District Council has until 2027 to align itself with this legislation change.

For Hanmer Springs this means no change to the current arrangements, with household glass bottles being recycled using a Council kerbside box on collection day – providing all lids are removed.

Excess and larger volumes of glass can be dropped off to Hanmer Springs transfer station during opening hours and must not be placed in the recycling bags.

Through the recycling bags, only the following items are accepted and need to be loose and the recycling bag securely tied.

- Newspapers, magazines, brochures, catalogues, leaflets, pamphlets, office paper and telephone directories.
- Clean, flattened cardboard including boxes and greetings cards.
- Clean food and drink tins and cans make sure not to squash them.
- Clean plastic bottles, trays and containers larger than a yogurt pot and smaller than 4 litres, these are
 - Number 1 plastics soft drink, juice and water bottles with no lids.
 - Number 2 plastics milk bottles, bathroom and laundry product bottles with no lids.
 - Number 5 plastics yoghurt, margarine and ice cream tubs with no lids.

Hurunui District Council is one of three councils exempt from this change until 2027.

Please continue to take your glass to the transfer stations, unless you live in Hanmer Springs where kerbside glass recycling does happen.

ALLEGED LAX DISCIPLINE.

[By Telegraph.—Special to The Post.] CHRISTCHURCH, This Day.

Some trouble has arisen at the prison camp at Hanmer. It is stated that the discipline is exceedingly lax, and some of the prisoners have got out of hand. The foresters engaged in the tree-planting are supposed to assist the warders in maintaining discipline, but they seem to have been disinclined to do this. It is reported that some of the prisoners have attended public gatherings, and that they have been photographed in public places, in company with warders. The position is regarded as rather serious. It is expected that Mr. W. C. Kensington, Under-Secretary for Lands, will arrive from Wellington to-morrow, and will go to Hammer, and that Mr. H. W. Bishop, S.M., will also visit the plantation to-morrow to hold an enquiry.

"As far as my information goes, and I have made enquiries," said the Minister for Justice (Hon. Dr. Findlay) to a Post reporter, "the statements in the telegram are fanciful and exaggerated. Some trouble has arisen in connection with the conduct of one of the warders, and there is some conflict as to the actual facts. I have asked Mr. Bishop, S.M. at Christchurch, to proceed to Hanmer and make a short enquiry and furnish me with a report."



The black-fronted tern nesting season has all but wrapped up on the Clarence and Acheron rivers.

Only a few parent birds remain, bringing food to begging fledglings which are building up energy and muscle strength ready to take off.

The last couple of weeks were spent recording final fledgling counts and watching many adults and fledglings take to the sky and disappear over Jack's Pass to find a warmer, food rich location to spend their wintering period in.

A total of 101 fledglings were counted along the Clarence and Acheron river colonies with 178 estimated to have fledged. Considering the rocky start the terns had to their breeding season, this is a pleasing result.

Colonies that did well were situated on islands that maintained a wide, flowing river channel surrounding the whole island even during the lowest river flow rates we've seen in a while! This shows the importance of having enhanced islands or naturally good islands to support future breeding pairs that return to nest on the Clarence and Acheron rivers.

An abundance of introduced predators to the area, including feral cats, stoats, ferrets, hedgehogs, and others kept J & S Mears contracting busy during trap checks. Any predators caught along the river's edge prevents them making it onto colonies and significantly helps the success of chicks surviving to then fledge.

Chick shelters also provided a valuable resource for the chicks to use in order to escape extreme temperatures and environmental conditions, along with providing them a safety shelter when danger is present.

With continued efforts to further the success of this species' breeding season, hopefully we will see a continued increase of birds returning to this historic breeding site for generations to come.

But Fowler faces stiff competition from last year's Hanmer Springs Pro-Am champion Guy Wall and former champion, Brad Burns.

The tournament was supported by local businesses including main sponsor Hanmer Springs Thermal Pools & Spa.

Shane Adcock, Marketing Manager of Hanmer Springs Thermal Pools & Spa says the Seniors Championship is a boost for the region.

Do We Want Our Kids Vaping

It was recently brought to the attention of the Pinkie that a food and shopping outlet in Hanmer Springs which has recently changed hands has a large display of Vapes and Vaping equipment for sale and subsequently we have anecdotal evidence that some of the product is being sold without age and ID checks.

That raises the question, do we really want this in our town. Since they are new to town, perhaps the operators are not aware that Hanmer Springs is a smoke and vape-free zone, a move promulgated by the Hurunui District Council acting in collaboration with the Cancer Society, the Canterbury District Health Board and the Hanmer Springs Community Board several years ago, a policy which was updated two and a half years ago.

"Vape-free areas of consideration align with the current smoke-free areas in the district." This includes all Council playgrounds, parks and reserves (which includes the Domain), a ten metre radius around libraries, community facilities, Council properties, any events run by the Council and also includes the entire CBD area of Hanmer Springs. At the time the policy was reviewed in October 2021, this was labelled by Council as a 'soft' approach.

The Pinkie has several times complained about lack of signage on this subject in the CBD, with no tangible result. Perhaps the operators of this business should be made aware of the fact and given a chance to cooperate with this policy. The Pinkie has consulted the Council, the police and the Ministry of Health on the subject.

Unfortunately, the new Government's policies and promises with regard to smoking and vaping have thrown a spanner in the previous government's efforts to attain a smoke-free society and at the same time seem to have thrown confusion in the Health Department's ranks and those we spoke to either quoted outdated legislation or admitted they were waiting for further developments.

We were told the laws with regard to vaping had been changed on January 24.

As a part of this community we feel a responsibility to educate and hopefully prevent our children from vaping and thus becoming addicted to nicotine. E-cigarettes contain nicotine, a drug that's highly addictive. You don't have to vape every day to get addicted. Nicotine makes anxiety and depression worse. It also affects memory, concentration, self-control, and attention, especially in developing brains. Auckland University says that children as young as 8 years of age have been treated for nicotine withdrawal symptoms. The fact of the matter, and here I speak from experience, when you are a teenager you are vulnerable to taking up anything that might make you look more adult. From my own experience I took up cigarettes at the age of 14 in order to look cool. Some thirty-five years, hundreds of attempts and

thousands of dollars later I finally managed to quit the habit, but in many aspects it was too late as I now suffer from emphysema and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease as result of my addiction to nicotine. I was personally appalled to hear Mr Seymour on the TV News on Thursday night, comparing nicotine to putting too much cream in your coffee. Please!

So, as it stands in Hanmer at the moment we have a retailer who is displaying and selling Vapes. Neither selling nor displaying the product is actually illegal, nor is the Council policy on a smoke free zone legally binding, it is more of a voluntary process.

As it stands a retailer needs a permit and must not sell the product to anyone aged under 18 and there are restrictions about the type of vape which can be sold. We checked the new regulations and they in themselves are confusing and seem to deal mainly with reusable batteries and available flavours. There is no mention of the harm they are doing and the fact that 'help' lines have noted a huge increase in requests for information on how to kick nicotine addiction caused by vapes.

At the moment, in terms of our town, we need to make some decisions. Do we want our kids addicted to nicotine or any drug for that matter. The big question is what to do about it. The police told us they have no instructions or guidelines in dealing with the problem unless a complaint if made through the Ministry of Health and they gave us the link below as a means of lodging a complaint. When we checked with the Council they referred us back to the police and when we contacted the Ministry of Health they sent us to an Internet page on which to lodge a complaint.

Perhaps it is time for a 'hard' approach.

We would like to hear views from the public on the subject. We would also beg, again, for signage around the CBD in Hanmer letting people know of the smoke and vape-free policy in our town.

On a personal note, if I can save one teenager from the lung diseases I now own, I count it as a positive move. More on this subject next week.



WHAT IS HAPPENING AROUND THE WORLD RIGHT NOW THAT WE AT LEAST NEED TO BE AWARE OF

- 1) The Russia/Ukraine 'special military operation', as Mr Putin calls it, started on 24 February 2022, just on 24 months ago, but it really started on 20 February 2014.
- 2) The Russia/Ukraine war has cost an enormous loss of life, but for the longer term, there are some pluses:
 - a) Europe now realises that it can never trust Russia again to supply oil, gas or anything important.
 - b) The war has strengthened NATO the following countries have joined NATO, or are about to: North Macedonia (2020); Finland (2023); Sweden (2024). NATO was formed in 1949 with 12 members it now has 31 members. This expansion of NATO sexactly what Mr Putin did not want.
 - c) The move towards renewable energy has been accelerated, which is major progress.
 - d) The European Union (27 countries) and the USA have strengthened their relationship considerably.
- 3) The USA Government debt is now \$34 trillion (USD) this number reads \$34,000,000,000,000 (12 zeroes).
- 4) The world's governments sometimes provide grants/subsidies to certain industries, and when Government pulls back even a little, it creates all sorts of problems - this is happening right now with electric vehicles and solar power in the USA.
- 5) Shoplifting in various countries stores are being closed many retailers have let staff go and this is part of the problem.
- 6) Consumer spending drives around 66% of the US economy and right now people are still spending, partly from the cash they received from Government over the COVID-19 period.
- 7) The Red Sea carries around 12% of the global shipping trade the shipping channel is

- 32 km wide. To go around the Cape of Good Hope (South Africa) adds around 6,500 km, and, in many cases, an extra approximately USD \$1 million fuel cost per ship. The Panama Canal also has a problem at the moment due to drought and low water levels the locks need a lot of water to allow the bigger ships to get through.
- 8) Around 80% 85% of the New Zealand banking industry is controlled by Australia and has been for some years. At the present time, it is hard for many New Zealand businesses to operate sustainably at interest rates of 8% 9% these businesses need inflation at 2% 3%, and interest rates at 5% 6%.
- 9) The New Zealand unemployment rate has held down surprisingly well over the last few years, but the long-term average from 1986 to 2023 (37 years) has been 5.5%, which today would represent around 165,000 unemployed. If interest rates and inflation keep coming down, we must expect the unemployment rate to rise the New Zealand Treasury have estimated a peak over the next few years of 5.2%, which would be 157,000 people. There will be some New Zealand wide screaming about this, but this is normally how a capitalistic financial system works.
- 10) What are the absolute key worldwide issues at the present time:
 - a) US interest rates simply because the US dollar is the world's key currency and the great majority of the world's loans are benchmarked against this currency.
 - b) China the second largest economy in the world imports 32% of New Zealand's total exports - its growth has stalled at the moment but the world needs it operating normally.
 - c) Completely replacing oil is looking more and more to be a difficult and expensive operation - we are going to need oil for quite some years yet.

- should have a target of having a financial surplus each year, of no less than 1% of its gross domestic product at present, 1% would be \$4 billion. Since 1900, the world has had to cope with a major worldwide problem (called a 'Black Swan event') every 11.5 years the time period of this pattern may get shorter our Government and Treasury have not allowed for this in their present five year plan they are fully focused on balancing the country's income and expenses at the moment a 1% surplus is not in sight.
- 12) The New Zealand Government needs more income at present, around 66% of New Zealand people are paying the individual tax take, and around 33% are living beyond their income and are absorbing around 49% of the social welfare budget of \$38.803 billion this 49% would represent around \$19.28 billion.
- 13) Why is it so important to get the New Zealand inflation rate down to 2% - 3% because the so called 'annual general adjustment' that Government makes at 1 April each year will determine how much the welfare payments, including National Superannuation, will increase for the next 12 months. What, though, is not so obvious is that if inflation stays at, say, 4.7% (the present figure), then each employer (including Government) will want to increase their employees' wages by more than that percentage. This increase needs to allow for Income Tax - say, for example, that an employer has an employee on a gross income of \$66,000, which is close to the present New Zealand median income, and the Government come out with an annual general adjustment figure of, say, 4.7% - what does the employer need to increase his employee's wages by to leave them in the same relative position:

Based on a gross income of \$66,000, the employee's after tax income is currently: \$53,150.

The employer increases the employee's

gross wages by 8% to \$71,280

Less: Income Tax (on \$71,280) \$14,442

Inflation loss (on \$71,280) \$ 3,350

\$17,792

Employee's real term net tax paid position

\$53,488

So what has really happened here:

- a) Government makes an annual general adjustment of 4.7%.
- b) The employer increases the employee's gross income by 8.0%.
- c) The employee's net position when you allow for PAYE and the inflation cost of 4.7% is almost unchanged at \$53,488.
- d) The employer has to increase his employee's wages by 8% to offset the inflation cost of 4.7% and increased tax cost. The real issue here is that many New Zealand employers could not cope with an across the board wage increase of 8% this is why the inflation rate needs to be between 2% 3%. Any wage increase always has to be quite a bit above the inflation rate operating at the same time.
- tend to drift north due to heat, conflict, food and employment, but many countries right now are really starting to push back against accepting immigrants/refugees. This whole issue is getting very serious, but real climate migration will involve much higher numbers than we are presently seeing.
- 15) Sound, strong financial management is now back in vogue, as it should always have been. 


