A vaccine to combat the newer strains of COVID-19 will be available to New Zealanders from 7 March 2024. Pharmac has approved the transition to the updated COVID-19 vaccine for the XBB.1.5 strain to be used in New Zealand from 7 March 2024.

The XBB vaccine is more effective against more recent subvariants of COVID-19 in New Zealand."

The XBB vaccine will be funded for these eligible groups:

- everyone aged 30 years and over
- people aged 16-29 who are pregnant
- people aged 12-29 at higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19.

If you're eligible, you can get a vaccination if it's been at least six months since your last COVID-19 vaccine or if you have never had one before. It's recommended that you wait at least six months since your last COVID-19 infection.

The XBB vaccine is especially recommended for those who are more likely to get seriously unwell if they get COVID-19.

This includes:

- people aged 65 years and older
- Māori and Pacific people aged 50 and older
- residents of aged care facilities
- severely immunocompromised people aged 12 years and older
- people aged 12 years and over who have a medical condition that increases the risk of severe illness from COVID-19.

If you call our clinic phone out of hours, your call is always answered by a registered nurse who will assess your needs, offer advice or, if required, pass the call to our on-call clinician. It can take several minutes to answer the phone so please be patient and hold, and follow the voice prompts carefully. If you are seen by the on-call clinician there is a \$25 after-hours call out fee on top of the consultation fee.

## Salmon and Salad Rice Bowl

Salmon and fresh herbs sit on top of simple cooked rice, with a delicious Vietnamese dipping sauce for seasoning.

#### **Ingredients**

2 salmon fillets, around 200g each

salt, to season

1 tbsp vegetable oil

6 cups cooked jasmine rice, warm

1 Lebanese cucumber, julienned

1 small carrot, julienned

2 cups shredded iceberg lettuce

3 cups mixed fresh herbs, such as coriander, mint, Vietnamese mint or Thai basil

½ cup fried Asian shallots (available from Asian grocers)

2 tbsp fried garlic (available from Asian grocers)

NUOC CHAM

75g caster sugar

75ml fish sauce

50ml white vinegar

2 garlic cloves, minced

2 bird's eye chillies, seeds removed, minced

Method

## Step 1

For the nuoc cham, combine the ingredients in a bowl with 100ml water and stir to dissolve the sugar. Stand for 15 minutes and stir again.

## Step 2

Cut each of the salmon fillets in half lengthways to create 4 thin fillets about 2.5cm wide. Season with salt. Heat a large frying pan over medium-high heat and add the oil. Fry the fillets skin-side down for about 3 minutes, until the skin is crisp. Flip and cook for about another minute until the salmon is only just cooked through.

## Step 3

Divide the rice between 4 bowls and place the cucumber, carrot, lettuce and herbs on top. Add the salmon fillet and scatter with the fried shallots and fried garlic. Serve with the nuoc cham.

# Stir Fry Beef and Asparagus (or Green Beans)

#### **Ingredients**

200g topside or rump steak, thinly sliced

3 tbsp vegetable oil

1 large bunch (or 2 small bunches) of asparagus, sliced on a steep diagonal or use green beans

½ brown onion, thickly sliced

2 cloves garlic, roughly chopped

1cm ginger, peeled and sliced into very thin matchsticks

1 tbsp Shaoxing wine

1 tbsp soy sauce

1 tbsp oyster sauce

1 tsp sesame oil pinch sugar

1 tsp cornflour mixed with j cup cold water

#### **MEAT MARINADE**

1 tsp soy sauce

1 tsp Shaoxing wine good pinch of salt

1/4 tsp baking soda

1 tsp cornflour

Method

## Step 1

Combine the meat with the marinade ingredients. Set aside for 10 minutes.

## Step 2

Heat a wok over high heat and add the vegetable oil. Add the asparagus or beans and toss until slightly softened. Remove from the wok, leaving the oil.

## Step 3

Add the beef and spread it out in a single layer over the base of the wok. Fry for about 3 minutes without stirring, until the beef is well-browned on one side. Add the onion, garlic and ginger, toss the beef and fry for a further minute.

## Step 4

Return the asparagus or beans to the wok and add the wine, soy sauce, oyster sauce, sesame oil and sugar. If the wok is too dry, add a few tablespoons of water, then add as much of the cornflour mixture as you need to produce a silky sauce. Serve with steamed rice.

# Road sign damage expensive and dangerous.

Road and trail sign vandalism in the Hurunui District is hitting the pockets of rate payers.

In the past few months there has been a spate of damage to Give Way, Stop, Railway warning signs and speed limit signs on the district's roads, as well as trail marker signs on the St James Cycle Trail.

Hurunui Police Sergeant Rob Irvine said that road **s**igns are generally targeted by larger vehicles such as four-wheel-drives and big sedans like Commodores and Falcons, which are also used as 'skid cars.' Anecdotally he has heard the offenders are young people.

"It appears people are doing it for kicks and don't realise the potential consequences of their actions if the signs cannot be read or seen, or have been removed."

He said the public can report this behaviour to the police by dialling 111 or \*555 if it is happening at the time or \*105, with details of licence plate, model of vehicle, time and location.

Reports of sign damage by firearms has been seen and reported on the St James Cycle Trail, and on signs closer to Hanmer Springs.

"This is a whole different safety aspect," said Sergeant Irvine.

He urged the use of the Rural Lookout app, an easy-touse method for reporting crime which is instant and accurate.

"It gives us a good picture of where the crimes are happening because it has geo-location."

Mark Inglis, St James Cycle Trail Manager, has been saddened by the bullets that have gone through the signs he and his trail network team has worked hard to design and install. The frustrating damage includes fences and gates where the offenders can gain access.

He listed Acheron Road, Tophouse Road, Edwards Road, and Mailings Pass as targeted areas, as mostly the damage is in drivable areas.

"The real worry is that people are parallel to the track when they're firing generally at night, which is also illegal on public conservation land." He said a well-used trail is a safe trail, and urges recreational use to continue.

Inglis does attempt to repair the damaged signs as best he can for the graffiti-damaged and knocked over signs, but bullet holes are not so easy to fix.

"The cost is \$70-\$1000 to replace a sign, and that is cost to the very limited trail maintenance funds and it's money that's not being used to maintain the trails."

Inglis urged people to contact him if they see damage in the St James Conservation area, through the St James Cycle Trail Facebook page, or contacting the Department of Conservation.

Hurunui District Council's Operations Manager - Roading Charlie Hutt said it is the responsibility of councils to replace damaged signs, but it's a cost they'd rather not have to spend from the rates they receive each year.

"We strive to provide the best services to our communities throughout the district, and it's frustrating when we have to spend money on this as a result of people's bad behaviour, instead of on key infrastructure and essential community needs."



## HANMER NOTES

(The Press—early 1900s) By An Occasional Visitor

Having recently had a sharp attack of influenza, and been ordered by my medical officer to take a trip to Hanmer to thoroughly shake off the effects, I journeyed northward on Monday last in anything but prepossessing weather. I noticed a marked improvement since my last visit, inasmuch as the train now starts at a more respectable hour, viz., 8.50, and much of that annoying delay in taking off and dropping off trucks at the varying wayside stations has been stopped.

Arriving at Culverden one was ready for the appetising dinner waiting at the Culverden Hotel, now managed by Mr Anderson. In looking over the building I noticed it has now been thoroughly painted and renovated. The sanitary arrangements were perfect, a septic tank arrangement being in operation. On reach the Waiau Ferry another surprise appeared in the new and substantial hotel (built 1905 which dates



this article to that time. Ed.) which stood on the site of the old hostelry, so well known to travellers on this road and where a cup of hot tea, or something stronger, is always welcome after the rattling coach ride.

Hanmer was reached at 4.30 p.m., after

a journey of seven hours, which is a great improvement on the time taken a year or so ago.

Very cold weather is being experienced just now. Snow fell in constant quantities during Sunday, with the result that the township is surrounded with snow clad hills. From a scenic or spectacular standpoint the outlook is beautiful in the extreme. From an occasional visitor's point of view,

however, the snow looks well at a distance, but he would prefer a sample of more spring-like weather. So far as accommodation goes, I find there are some eight public caterers, viz., The Spa (not the Sanatorium, please), The Lodge, Mrs Lahmert, Jollies Pass Hotel, Mrs Ashton, Miss Fawcett, J W Fawcett and Mr Farrow. Having made enquiries as to the number that could be accommodated, I find that it amounts to about two hundred and fifty, but at a pinch, as has happened at Christmas and Easter, considerably more, because shakedowns and tents are then brought into requisition. Some of the more prominent residents fear that Hanmer as a health resort has been considerably damaged, owing to a rumour having got abroad that the township was not in a sanitary condition. Certainly, during the last two years many of its former patrons have not put in an appearance, but the rumour is utterly false. Another rumour that has gained a foothold is that the waters of the springs have lost their medicinal value since the gas has been taken from the wells and used for lighting purposes in the Spa buildings. Mr J B Gould, the Manager of the Spa, laughs this idea to scorn. He informs me that some time ago a gentleman who takes a prominent interest in the welfare of Hanmer, procured samples of the waters of the springs, and at his own expense had them analysed by Professor Black, with the result that they were to have been not in any way deteriorated. Another gentleman, who is hot on the subject, forcibly expressed his opinions to me, to the effect that whether there was any truth to the rumour or not, the practice of tapping the springs for gas was utter nonsense and ought to be at once stopped. The small cost of an acetylene gas plant compared to the harm it was doing in the public estimation was infinitesimal. He was also of the opinion that unless something was done some of the business people who had sunk capital, with a view of providing accommodation, would have to seek fresh pastures.

On making further enquiries, I find that there is a well-defined antagonism existing between the various accommodation house proprietors and the Spa. They complain of the Government coming into competition with private, and contend that them institution was inaugurated as a sanatorium for the benefit of those who

were sick and those unable to pay more than a moderate amount for their keep. The name sanatorium is now *non est* and the more aristocratic name of the Spa has taken its place.


I have heard on good authority that a person who was sick was, after a short stay, requested to move her quarters and we live in a land ruled by a Liberal and so-called philanthropic Government. The question is also asked, is the institution a paying concern or simply a white elephant, and in some respects I am led to believe the latter suggestion. I am informed that it cost the country considerably more than a thousand pounds last year over receipts, and this it must be remembered after everyone is taxed to the highest for baths, games and amusements. The motor bus service from Culverden which was advocated at the meeting Wednesday night is a project that has been on the tapis for some time, but the government can't or won't inaugurate the service. The suggestion was first mooted by one of the candidates who stood for the Avon constituency 31/2 years ago. At the time he was laughed at and his harrowing account of the effects of the coach journey on a person in delicate health was looked upon as a piece of political bluff. But now the residents are in earnest and they intend to do or die.

The question of a light railway has been dangled before the district for a considerable time, but anyone in his senses must see that such expenditure (£2 to £300,000) is altogether out of the question. With upkeep and expenditure it would be a white elephant. With several up-to-date motor buses and the waters courses bridged, the service would be sufficient for many years to come.

Another standing grievance which the residents have against the Government, whose persistent apathy in booming the place is proverbial, is the long expected water supply, which has been a promise for a considerable time past, but which appears to be as far off a reality as ever.






#### WaiSwim!







Polyethylene terephthalate - Fizzy drink bottles and frozen ready meal packages.



**HDPE** 



High-density polyethylene - Milk and washing-up liquid bottles





Polyvinyl chloride - Food trays, cling film, bottles for squash, mineral water and shampoo.



**LDPE** 



Low density polyethylene - Carrier bags and bin liners.





Polypropylene - Margarine tubs, microwaveable meal trays.





Polystyrene - Yoghurt pots, foam meat or fish trays, hamburger boxes and egg cartons, vending cups, plastic cutlery, protective packaging for electronic goods and toys.



Other



Any other plastics that do not fall into any of the above categories. For example melamine, often used in plastic plates and cups.


