Ready in a Flash Chicken and Corn Hash!

This dinner hash fry-up uses miso for a hit of umami in the butter sauce, tossed through chicken bits, golden corn and capsicum. Service over rice to make bowls, or stuff into tortillas for an easy crowd pleasing dinner!

Ingredients

MISO BUTTER

- 1¹/₂ tbsp shiro miso (white miso)
- 30g unsalted butter, softened

SEASONED CHICKEN

- 500g skinless, boneless chicken thighs cut into 3cm pieces
- ¹/₂ tsp cooking salt
- 1 tsp paprika
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- ¹/₈ tsp black pepper

HASH FRY-UP

- 1¹/₂ tbsp olive oil
- 1/2 red capsicum, deseeded, diced into 1cm
- cubes
- 2 garlic cloves, finely minced
- 3 cups (375g) frozen corn, thawed and drained
- ¹/₂ tsp black pepper
- 2 tbsp cooking sake

TO SERVE

- ³⁄₄ cup finely sliced spring onion
- white rice or tortillas

Method

MISO BUTTER

• Mix miso and butter in a small bowl until smooth and set aside.

FOR THE CHICKEN

 Toss chicken with seasonings in a bowl. Heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan (30cm) over high heat. Cook chicken until lightly browned, about 3 minutes.

FOR THE HASH FRY-UP

 Add the capsicum and garlic, cook for 1 minute. Add the corn and pepper, then cook for 3 minutes. Add the cooking sake and stir for 30 seconds or until evaporated. Turn the stove off then stir through the miso butter until melted.

TO SERVE

• Toss the spring onion through, then serve over rice or wrapped in tortillas

Note:

Cooking sake, an essential in Japanese cooking, is an alcohol made from rice which is made for cooking. It adds complexity and depth of flavour to dishes. Find it in large supermarkets in the Asian aisle and in Asian grocers.

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

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HANMER IT

Richard Tapper - A Hanmer Springs Man

Richard grew up in Jollies Pass Road and like most families at that time, they did not own a car. The Road Services bus provided a vital connection to the outside world and Richard describes its daily arrival in the village, then goes on to describe going to Christchurch on the bus with his Mum.

The bus went to Christchurch every morning at 7.30 every morning and I think arrived back at 7.30 in the evening. My Mother worked there in the office in the afternoon booking tickets.

When the bus came in from Christchurch at 7.30, there were always quite a number of people there to meet it. There were always 20 or 30 people there. There would be people from the hospital. There would be the people there who got the mail because the mail came in in the evening, went to the post office and was actually sorted at 7.30 in the evening.

There was Ned who worked at the hospital who talked to himself a lot and met the bus every evening. There was a collection of characters who would be there to collect things. It was an event every evening when the bus came in. The afternoon papers would be on the bus and quite often patients for the hospital. In those days Hanmer supported a taxi and the taxi was always there to meet it, often taking people home with shopping or taking people to the hospital because quite often when you came up on the bus in the evening there would be people who were on their way to the hospital. Very often as alcoholic patients.

I can remember quite often coming up on the bus, (although I didn't understand it so much a child) there would be people who came up on the bus and the bus always stopped at Waikari tea rooms for 15 minutes for a break and there'd be people off the bus and straight over the road to the Star and Garter Hotel. The bus driver used to have the job of also trying to keep his passengers in order and finally delivered to the hospital. I think a lot of them got delivered drunk because the bus used to stop at the rail head in Culverden as well. They would also duck over the road to the Culverden Pub. People were always labelled as 'patients' and they were not looked down on but they weren't a part of the village. Although there were quite a lot of them who decided to stay on in Hanmer and lived on in Hanmer who did stay and become part of the community but they were always known as an ex patient. There was a certain stigma.

It took three hours to get there. It went via Hawarden and in those days the road wasn't sealed all the way to Christchurch. The road into Hanmer was sealed up to about where the service station is, then it was a shingle road most of the way to Culverden so it took quite a while. The bus used to go around through Hawarden and through Kaiapoi.

It was three hours so the bus would get into town at ten thirty and it would leave at 4.30 to come back to Hanmer. So there was enough time to run around and get the shopping done. I just remember we seemed to always go to Hays, and Beaths and the DIC and Ballantynes and all those big department stores, which were more important and most of which are gone now.

There always seemed to be time to visit people in the city as well. We never used to stay, it was always down and back in one day. Especially at Christmas time, I know it used to drive my mother mad but my Father never used to want to go. Until he was much older. Then he always wanted my mother to take him to Christchurch which she never wanted to do as he had a habit of stopping everywhere and talking to everyone.

It is with great sadness that I report the passing of my friend, Richard Tapper. Richard passed away on Saturday 13 April 2024, after a relatively short illness.

Richard will be greatly missed by our community.

WHY?

The focus of this outage is to install a temporary 60 metre long 'interrupter cable.' The cable will enable Transpower to work on their transmission lines at the Waiau Ferry Bridge without needing a multi-day outage to the area.

To minimise further planned outages in Hanmer Springs, we will also be carrying out additional work in the area, including pole replacements and general maintenance activities.

reading. * Parade Marshall calls parade to attention.


THE LAST POST is played. During this, the flag is slowly brought down to half-mast. A minute's silence is held.



The following article, written by Michael Wright, appeared in *The Press* on Saturday 13 April 2024. The article has been reprinted here, in *The Pinkie*, with permission.

The note read, "You were warned. I'm going to break both your f...ing legs". Richard Tapper, the long-standing editor of the even longer-standing Hanmer Springs community newspaper The Pinkie, went immediately to the police Such a threat against the media could not be tolerated. But a few days later, Tapper cracked the case himself. At a bowls tournament in the village, he bumped into one of his best advertisers. "Did you get my message?" she asked. Tapper thought, "Oh shit."

"I took a photo of her running in one of the marathons we have here," he explained. "And she said, 'If you publish that photo I'll break both your f...ing legs.' And it's been a standing joke ever since."

Tapper never ran the picture, but Hanmer is a small town, so when the woman inevitably popped up in the background of a photo for another story (about local kids vaping), she made good on her 'threat'.

You can almost see the headline: 'Joke threat prompts police complaint'. It's the sort of thing that might run in The Pinkie, but if it does, Tapper, 76, won't write it.

After 17 years, poor health is forcing him to step down.

His farewell editorial ran on March 12. "I have enjoyed the seventeen years of producing The Pinkie," it read. "And I step away with some reluctance."

The Pinkie is one of the oldest publications of its kind: A hyper-local New Zealand community newspaper, published continuously for nearly a century.

The first edition appeared in 1930. A single sheet of news, printed on pink paper – The Pinkie. By the 1970s it had grown to cover both sides of the pink sheet, but was still more of a newsletter. (From the September 29, 1972, edition: The Waiau Rugby Football Club invites Hanmer players, friends and supporters to their annual ball on Oct 14 at Waiau Hall. Good supper & band. Tickets \$8, Double.)

Tapper came to it by chance. Born and raised in Hanmer Springs, he spent most of his adult life elsewhere, travelling with a peripatetic zeal. He has been to 108 countries. "I'm cheating," he said. "I went to the Soviet Union and I can now count that as six countries."

He got his start in journalism at the Christchurch Star in 1964 but quickly sold out to advertising.

"I went from making £6 a week to £12 a week."

Soon after he was in Sydney, "chasing a woman" (Tapper admitted to an indeterminate number of ex-wives), where he got into business with Llewellyn Thomas, son of Dylan. Not as famous as his poet father, but nearly as eloquent and just as fond of a drink.

Tapper remembered them being called to a lunchtime meeting with the egg marketing board.

"We'd already had a few wines," he said. "The chairman of the board put his hand down on the table and said, 'Give us a slogan young man' ... Llewellyn opened one eye and said, 'Second best lay in town'. We didn't get that job."

India, then Spain. He ran a restaurant in Mallorca for years. His last job before returning home in 2000 was as a deckhand on a sport fishing boat on Lord Howe Island.

Before The Pinkie, his only other foray back into journalism had been in Vietnam at the height of the war. He was working for US network ABC but said they didn't run anything he filed because it was too anti-war. He was banished to Phnom Penh, the Cambodian capital, where he made more of a mark. "I was back about four or five years ago and I had a look at the foreign correspondents club. My bullet holes are still in the ceiling."

Sorry?

"Yeah, it was a bit of a wild west town in those days. The foreign correspondents club was along the riverfront. You could sit there and watch the sun go down ... We had nothing much to do but shoot the sunset." When he bought The Pinkie from the Hanmer Spring Business Association it was a four-page publication. It's now five times that. It survived Covid, rival start-ups and the bête noir of all 21st century media – big tech.

"We were going along very nicely and then along came Facebook," Tapper said. "A lot of advertisers went over because it was free. So I had to do something.

"Up until then we used to sell it for \$2 a copy. So I made it free and then started the website."

For a free weekly based in a North Canterbury village (population 1140), The Pinkie has a formidable online presence. Every issue goes live on its sleek website on a Monday and is emailed to about 700 subscribers, many of them out-of-towners with holiday homes in Hanmer.

The only official distribution point for hard copies is the local supermarket, but The Press had no trouble finding the latest edition at nearby cafés and restaurants.

Perhaps half of its pages are filled with advertising, although Tapper is firm that The Pinkie's new owner must continue his policy of letting local charities and clubs run ads for free.

"The only [way] to succeed with a small publication like this is to be local and to be fiercely local," he said.

"And especially to look after the local organisations and make sure that they have a voice ... Our philosophy has always been if they don't charge for it, we don't charge them."

Then there is the report from the primary school, the quiz and the recipe of the week (Tapper will continue to provide the latter two). And, hopefully, ongoing robust coverage of local issues, like Hanmer's recent spate of power cuts. (Pinkie headline, March 5, 'Power Outages Have Become Ludicrous').

"I have had an editorial policy of writing what I think," Tapper said. "Without going too far overboard."

Tapper's final issue of The Pinkie ran on March26. Reece Gardner is the new editor.

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
