Outside of work I love my garden and am most content in a pair of gum boots. I am always happy to put on a pair of skis or tramping boots, or go for a bike ride."







A midweek favourite Steak with store-bought crispy chilli oil and simple sides



Ingredients

- Chilli crisp steak
- 2 x 300g beef scotch fillet steaks (see note below)
- 2 tsp vegetable oil, for cooking
- s tsp cooking salt
- S tsp freshly cracked black pepper
- Lao Gan Ma crispy chilli oil (see image below)

SIDE DISHES

- 8 baby potatoes
- 25g unsalted butter, melted
- pinch of roughly chopped parsley leaves to garnish, optional
- 1 bunch of asparagus, woody ends snapped off

Note

If time permits, season your steak with salt and pepper, place on a rack set over a tray or plate, and leave it uncovered in the fridge overnight. Aside from improving the flavour, this will dry out the surface, giving your steak a superior crust when it cooks.



Method

• Step 1

Take the steak out of the fridge. (See note below about salting overnight.) Pat the surface dry with a paper towel then leave the steak on the counter for 1 hour to remove the chill. This will help it cook more evenly.

• Step 2

Put the potatoes in a large saucepan and cover with 5cm of water. Add 1 teaspoon of salt. Bring to a boil over high heat, reduce the heat to medium-high, and cook for 12-15 minutes or until the potatoes are soft all the way through. Drain in a colander, transfer to a bowl, and crush them lightly with a fork so they burst open slightly. Drizzle with butter, sprinkle with salt, pepper and parsley, if using, then gently toss and keep warm until you're ready to serve.

Step 3

Preheat a dry cast-iron frying pan on high heat until it is smoking hot (look for wisps of smoke). Do not put oil in the pan or use a non-stick pan (you'll destroy it).

Step 4

Meanwhile, drizzle the oil on the steak and rub it all over, then sprinkle with salt and pepper.

Step 5

Place the steaks in the pan and cook the first side for 2S minutes or until a deep golden-brown crust forms. Turn and cook the other side for 2 minutes or until the steak's internal temperature reaches 51C (medium-rare) – see note for other levels of doneness.

Step 6

Remove the steaks from the pan and rest for 5 minutes on a rack over a plate (this prevents the bottom from becoming "sweaty"). The internal temperature will rise to 56C. Cut the steaks into thick slices.

Step 7

While the steaks are resting, add the asparagus to the still-hot pan over high heat. Toss for 2 to 3 minutes or until tender-crisp. The residual oil, salt and pepper will season the asparagus.

Step 8

To serve, divide the steak slices among two plates and place the potatoes and asparagus alongside. Dollop as much chilli crisp as you want across the steak. Then dig in!

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Rainbow Possum Control Notice





2024 RAINBOW AERIAL POSSUM CONTROL OPERATION

Vector Free Marlborough (VFM) wishes to advise the public of its intention to aerially apply the toxin Sodium fluoroacetate (1080) to the Rainbow area for the purpose of controlling possums. The Rainbow operation is being carried out on behalf of OSPRI as part of its TBfree New Zealand programme, which aims to eradicate bovine tuberculosis from wildlife vectors that pose a risk to farmed cattle and deer.

Description of Area

The permission area for the 2024 Rainbow possum control operation takes in land in the upper Wairau catchment, from the vicinity of Lake Sedgemere downstream to Bull Paddock Flat approximately 5km east of St Arnaud Village. The eastern boundary mostly follows the St Arnaud Range and the edge of Nelson Lakes National Park. In the west the boundary mostly follows the Raglan Range and abuts Molesworth Station

Public Access & Recreational Facilities

Rainbow road, Wairau – Hanmer Springs Hydro road, Rainbow ski field road, Bull Paddock creek track, Ronan's stream track, Hamilton river route, Lee's creek track and hut, Connor's creek route and hut, Paske route and hut, Begley route and hut, Dip Flat RNZAF training camp, and Coldwater camping ground are all within the treatment area. Public access to these facilities will be restricted while the aerial application of toxic bait takes place and afterwards until they have been inspected and cleared of most toxic baits. Toxin warning signs will be in place at all track entrances immediately prior to the application of toxic bait. Advisory signage will also be installed at key sites prior to non-toxic prefeed application.

Commencement Date

Subject to favourable weather, control is planned to commence from mid-April 2024, with the aerial application of non-toxic, cereal pre-feed pellets. This will be followed approximately 7-10 days later by the aerial application of bait containing biodegradable sodium fluoroacetate (1080).

All work is weather dependent, and commencement may be later than indicated. In the event of an extended delay, further notices will be placed to advise the public.

Bait Description

Aerial control using 1080:

- Pre-feed Non-toxic cereal-based pellet, approximately 16 mm long, cinnamon-lured, and non-dyed (sandy coloured).
- Toxic bait Cereal-based pellet, approximately 16 mm long, cinnamon-lured, and dyed green with a toxic loading of 0.15% Sodium fluoroacetate (1080).

The aerial operation will use helicopters equipped with Global Positioning System (GPS) hardware and calibrated buckets to ensure accurate placement.

Precautions

The pesticide is poisonous to humans and domestic animals. The public are reminded of the danger that toxic baits and possum carcasses pose, particularly to children and dogs.

- DO NOT TOUCH OR EAT BAITS
- Children must be kept under strict supervision in the control area
- Dogs must be kept under strict control at all times and not have access to, or be taken into,

the control area, as they are particularly susceptible to harm from contact with toxic baits and poisoned carcasses. The risk that poisoned carcasses pose to dogs may extend downstream of the control area.

- Toxin warning signs will be installed at main public entry points and the public are reminded that it is an offence to remove this warning signage. Please follow the instructions on the signs.
- Game animals should not be sold or taken for eating from within or adjacent to this area until it is declared clear of pesticides.

Hanmer Springs School Pinkie Report Term 1 Week 10.

Pitt Island Holiday by Waitapu Hepi.

Tuesday 12th March. My Mum, Sisters Raukura and Te Atawhai, and I flew to the Chatham Islands for a three week holiday. We flew from Christchurch airport to Tuuta airport (Chatham Islands). We stayed at my Uncle Jymy And Aunty Tashs' with our cousins Honor and Saylor. The next day we woke up at 6am to catch a fishing boat to Pitt Island. Mum's cousins Tyrone and Travis were the Skipper and Deckhand. Mum was the only person to get sick on the ride over. She hates boats. My Grandad came and picked us all up and took us to his house to collect the stores we had shipped over before us. All the roads on Pitt are cut from clay, there is no tarseal or gravel so when it rains it gets very muddy and slippery.



On Wednesday afternoon we got dropped off at Glory Bay with my Aunty Pepi, her partner Jamie, my Aunty Rennae, her partner Luke and my cousins Haylie and Morgan. Glory Bay is named after a 100 ton Sealing Brig that wrecked in 1827. Surviving crew saved what they could including one of the ship's boats. The captain and a small crew sailed and rowed 1280 km from Glory Bay to Kororareka (Russell) in the Bay of Islands for help. In the early 1860's The Glory Cottage was built for shepherds. The Cottage is still standing and is now a Historic Site looked after by D.O.C. and available as a camping hut used by locals. Me, my sisters, and cousins slept in the attic while Mum slept in a tent. Everyday my Aunties would go for a dive while we fished off the rocks.

On Sunday 17th my Grandad, his partner Tash, her daughter Manaia, Uncles Hamish, Bernard, Billy, Tim and Ethan, Aunty Tommi, Kane and Mikayla, Granny, and half the Island population came to Glory for a BBQ. We killed a beef on day one and caught eels off the Waipaua Bridge. We fished with hand lines from the wharf and rode in the ute boot. I found a cattle skull and tried to bring it home. Mum said no. We spent our last week attending Pitt Island School. I stayed at Grandads and my sisters stayed with Uncle Billy and Aunty Nic (our Teacher/Principal). Pitt Island School has a current role of 7 pupils and their school day runs from 9am to 2:30pm.



On Easter Monday we were supposed to fly from Pitt to Chathams but the weather was so foggy we could not get a plane. Tuesday morning the weather cleared up in time for us to catch the flight to Chathams and we were the last passengers to check in for our Air Chathams flight back to Christchurch where my dad was waiting for us. It was boring some of the time but I also would want to go back...





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
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
