Making New Zealand - Christmas

"Making New Zealand" was published in 1940. It is a pictorial record of New Zealand's first hundred years. It was commissioned the New Zealand Government and was produced by the Centennial Branch of the Department of Internal Affairs under the direction of the National Historical Committee.


There were 30 volumes printed with each volume dealing with a different aspect of New Zealand's first 100 years. Volume 25 is titled, "Recreation", and writes about the ways we relaxed; conversation, reading, musical evenings, tea and cards, school and church, weddings and christenings, Christmas, picnics, the community hall, the flickering screen, amateur stage etc

Christmas

It was a far cry from the Christmas snow of the old land to the bright December sunshine of the new; but the pioneers brought with them the festal spirit of Yuletide. Midsummer it may be in this southern land, but all the old ceremonies—the roast turkey, plum pudding, and sprigs of holly -sanctioned by long usage appeared from the beginning at the colonial Christmas dinner. It was a time for a general holiday. An old colonist from a bush settlement in Canterbury says that families used to combine to celebrate Christmas in grand style. The women would be preparing for a fortnight beforehand, baking bread and cakes and puddings, making butter, and getting game ready—wild ducks and kakas and wood pigeons—for nobody ate mutton at Christmas! As the houses were too small to accommodate all who came, it was usual to lay the table under the trees outside. The older folk would recall past days in the old land; sometimes there was a touch of sadness when the oldest one of all would rise to toast absent friends. But the youngsters were more interested in the future and brushed aside memories of the past.


In the afternoon games would be played. Quoits were always popular: in the bush settlements they used horse-shoes and maul rings for throwing. A cricket match was always played -and the sides were Married V Single. The rules of the game were never taken very seriously and no one worried how many players were on each side. But everyone batted and the score was faithfully kept. Well before sunset the table would be laid again with cold meats and bon-bons, while down the centre the Christmas cakes would be placed. The custom was for each family to bring a cake, usually iced and decorated. After tea a dance would take place, sometimes in the open, sometimes in a neighbouring barn. Last of all supper would be served near to midnight, and the guests would retire to temporary beds made up in every room in the house. For many of the early settlers Christmas was the one holiday of the year, and it was not unusual to keep the merriment going until New Year's Day.

Easy Traditional Christmas Cake (that can pass as pudding too)



Ingredients

- 3 cups sultanas or golden raisins
- 1 1/2 cups raisins roughly chopped
- 1 3/4 cups dates pitted, finely chopped
- 1 cup dried currants sometimes called
 Zante currants
- 5 candied orange slices finely chopped (my preference, mixed dried citrus peel is more traditional, see notes)
- 2/3 cup candied cherries chopped; I like red, you can use red, green or a mix
- 1/4 cup chopped candied pineapple
- 1/2 cup chopped candied apricots
- 1/2 cup rum or brandy, dry sherry or other alcohol, see notes
- 1 cup unsalted butter softened
- 1 cup brown sugar firmly packed
- 5 eggs
- 2 cups all-purpose flour plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp ground cloves
- 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg
- 3 Tbsp rum or other alcohol, extra

Instructions

 Combine all the dried fruits with the brandy in a large bowl. Mix very well, then cover and set aside at least overnight. You can soak the fruit for up to a week, stirring and recovering each day.


3 cups sultanas, 1 1/2 cups raisins, 1 3/4 cups dates, 1 cup dried currants, 5 candied orange slices, 2/3 cup candied cherries, 1/4 cup chopped candied pineapple, 1/2 cup chopped candied apricots, 1/2 cup rum

- Preheat your oven. For a regular oven, preheat to 265°F/130°C. For combi steam, set to the same temperature using Combi Steam setting, and no more than 30% steam (low steam). Line the base and sides of a deep 9-inch (22cm) round cake pan with a triple thickness of parchment paper, extending the sides up about 2 inches past the top of the pan.
- Put the butter and brown sugar into the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, or use a large bowl and a hand beater. Mix until well combined but not fluffy.
 1 cup unsalted butter, 1 cup brown sugar
- Add the eggs to the butter mixture, one at a time, beating to combine after each addition. The mixture is going to look lumpy and curdled, that's normal.
 5 eggs
- Sift the dry ingredients into the butter and egg mix and mix to combine. Tip in the soaked fruit and any remaining liquid, and mix well. I prefer to do this part by hand with a wooden spoon, as the mixer blade has a tendency to squash the fruit.

2 cups all-purpose flour, 1 tsp baking powder, 1 tsp ground cinnamon, 1/2 tsp ground cloves, 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg

- Scrape the cake mixture into your prepared pan and smooth out the surface. Bake until it's deep brown and form to the touch; 3 1/2 hours in a conventional oven or 2 hours 45 minutes in combi steam.
- Brush the top of the hot cake with extra brandy, then cover and set aside to cool overnight in the pan. Turn out, brush with more brandy if you want to, then wrap well and store the cake in a cool, dark place for up to 2 months. It's at its best a few weeks after baking, so try to give it that long if you can.

Letter to the Hanmer Springs Village News

The fire at Bridge Hill has spooked me. It is because the village of Hanmer Springs is a sitting duck for a similar wild fire

Of course this has been known by the relevant agencies for a while but what is being done about it – apart from realising the truth??

We talk up our lovely village and how it is expanding but is it good expansion and is the expansion assisting in fire proofing ourselves more? I see no evidence of this.

Why are we especially prone to a wild fire? Here are some reasons:

- Our climate and the future of more climatic conditions suitable for fires.
- The village is surrounding by forest including rapidly expanding douglas fir wildings. The wildings are marching up Mt Isobel and throttling our native kanuka, broad leafs and beech trees (take a walk up the Mt Isobel track from Pawson's Road or visit the Nature Trail.) What's more the forests are north and west of the village which is great for dry nor westers. The production forests have roads/ firebreaks but not the wildings.
- Subdivisions adjacent to either planted or spreading forest like Conical Hill, upper Chatterton and the new River Springs subdivision which borders a dense row of willows.
- Lack of water and lack of water holes. The Waiau River is not close to the village and is fast flowing. The local rivers now dry up. There are no large designated water tanks or

ponds for the purpose of firefighting – apart from maybe the Chisholm and Woodland ponds.

- There are no firebreaks being made or appearing to be planned for in the district scheme. We are a 'one way in' village, full of dead end cul de sacs and limited west/east roading intersections. All will hamper fire fighting.
- Allowing fire prone activities near the forest and village.
 Two spring to my mind. If it goes ahead the flyride on Conical Hill (the machinery and metal friction) and DOC allowing freedom camping at the Pawsons Rd entrance.
 Most fires start with human activity especially of the camping kind. Thank goodness the forestry companies do not allow mechanised activities by the public.
- The central village is known for its exotic oaks and redwoods. Fine but please prune and crown them so they don't get so heavy and big. The avenue trees have been maintained, time to do the others.

It is timely for the Hurunui District Council, ECAN and other relevant authorities to plan more around the future of fires. All planning in our village should consider and be decided around this issue. In the meantime do what can be done by removing obvious fire starters like the freedom camp, create fire breaks and more water storage.

I know this is not new but please let's see some physical action.

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

Work has started on an accessible, sensory play area at Brooke Dawson Park in Hanmer Springs, with a similar play area for Chisholm Reserve scheduled to get underway.

The accessible and interactive sensory play areas are in response to feedback from the community for a playground that would engage children in a fun and stimulating way with elements that are accessible for children with disabilities, Hurunui District Council Chief Strategy and Community officer Judith Batchelor says.

Stage 1 works at Brooke Dawson Park feature the accessible play area, featuring a 'free-fall', natural playground with bounce bark and natural wood adventure equipment that will be located next to the sensory playground.

Stage 2 will the installation of sensory play equipment adjacent to the accessible area. Delivery of the three final components for this is expected before Christmas.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$67,601.60 and has been budgeted for in the Long Term Plan, with funding coming from the sale of Council-owned property at 44 Jollies Pass Road.

"The giant chimes, bongos and musical flowers at Brooke Dawson Park are designed to stimulate multiple senses with their tactile surfaces, bright colours and interesting sounds. These tools not only promote creativity but also support developmental skills and social connections through shared play," Batchelor says.

Similar sensory elements will be added to Chisholm Reserve, with an extra \$8,000 plus GST of contestable funding being approved by the Hanmer Springs Community Board for a shade sale to provide protection to children while using the play equipment. The three sensory elements, comprising Musical Flowers, a Play Panel and Chimes, along with a lime chip track, will cost \$20,000 and has been budgeted for in the Long Term Plan.

Christmas and New Year Hanmer Springs - Rubbish, Recycling and Transfer Station Information

Rubbish and Recycling Collections

Over Christmas and New Year, rubbish and recycling collections in Hanmer Springs are as normal on:

- · Monday 23 December and
- Monday 30 December

Collection times may vary to usual, so Council rubbish and recycling bags must be out by 8am as the Council will not return to collect bags put out after the crew has been.

Bundles of cardboard are not collected but can be recycled via any transfer station during opening hours.

Household glass bottles are collected in Hanmer Springs providing:

- They are left at the kerbside in a Council-issued recycling container.
- All lids are removed and disposed of
- The glass boxes are not overloaded.
- The glass boxes do not contain any other recycling or rubbish.

Remember to recycle correctly over the festive season and only put the following clean items in the recycling bag (bags containing items which are not accepted, or glass bottles will be stickered and left):

- · Paper and cardboard but no wrapping paper
- Food and drink tins and cans
- Plastic bottles, trays and containers numbered 1, 2 and 5 only (no smaller than 100ml or bigger than 4 litres and no lids).

Hanmer Springs Transfer Station

The transfer station will be closed on Wednesday 25 December and Wednesday 1 January, otherwise normal opening hours and times apply.

As the transfer station will be busier than normal, staggering visits, sorting rubbish and recycling and removing lids from glass bottles prior to arrival will help decrease waiting times.

When two Year 8 students teamed up in their Term 2 business studies course they created a profitable business venture in 12 weeks with all the proceeds going to the Hanmer Springs Food Forest.

In Term 2 the Karearea Class (Year 7 & 8) at Hanmer Springs School studied Business Studies.

Students formed small teams to research and create a business. The aim was to build a profitable business and donate the profits back into the Hanmer Springs Community. They had twelve weeks!

When Sharnie Inglis and Cooper Taylor teamed up Sharnie wanted to make baking to sell and Cooper wanted to sell his services walking dogs. Sharnie and Cooper had decided to support the Hanmer Springs Food Forest community project. The Food Forest has been running about 3 years and Graham Frith (Grum) kindly donates his time taking school children to the Food Forest to get them involved.

The profit Sharnie and Cooper made was greater than they had ever expected so, together with their teacher Gina Holland, they decided to get a beautiful wooden sign made for the Hanmer Springs Food Forest. They contacted Brett Renall from Woodpecker Signs in Lincoln. Brett gave them a special price to support the community project. Sharnie and Cooper then contacted Mike Shaxon from the Hanmer Menz Shed and asked if they would help install the sign.

The Hanmer Menz Shed did an amazing job installing the sign. The Menz Shed donated their time and materials and they have even added the sign to their annual maintenance list where the sign will be given a new coat of oil each year, to keep it looking good for years to come!

It is seven in the evening but the bar is empty and I have to rap on the counter to get someone's attention. I have the place to myself, that is until another foreigner arrives, a female traveler of that indeterminate age somewhere pushing forty. She sits straight on the stool next to me and dumps her key and a handbag on the bar then orders a quart bottle of beer before pushing her hand in my direction to shake. "Angie', she says.

I can't pick per accent. She is not a Yangui.

She is Belgian but with an English mother and she spent half her childhood in India because her mother was a hippie, she tells me.

"Goa?"

And the answer is yes, then when we get to talking about it, I find I knew her mother. It's a scary feeling half way round the world, when I decide to chat up a good looking woman in a bar, only to find out I knew her mother. Even if it was not intimately, it still instantly ages me, but it is not long before we are wrapped in reminiscences of the Indian subcontinent and we find the beers going down easily and there are a hundred names, so many people we both knew. Whatever happened to English Michael, and we assume that Johny Cairo must be dead by now because he was a junkie and where is Octavio the Brazilian and what about Mental and you would never guess who I ran into in Saigon, it was Rangi. And we are gone, back on the road in the good old days, the only difference being is that Angie saw it all through the eyes of a thirteen or fourteen year old girl and I was twenty years older, but I like the way she talks to me as though there is no age difference and it is quite a while since I had any female company and I am enjoying her warmth.

Angie has just arrived on a bus from Asuncion in Paraguay, a bum-numbing fourteen hours on a Paraguayan bus, so she wants to go for a walk and we take a stroll down toward the river and take a seat looking over the port and Angie pulls out a joint. I am not ready for this but since she has lit it, dragged on it and passed it to me, it would be very rude of me not to take a puff. Next thing I am wandering through the streets of some city on the pampas of Argentina, stoned out of my skippy, my sense of direction warped, with this lady on my arm. I want to know why she is in Santa Fe and she tells me she is on her way to Rosario, because that's where Che Guevarra was born and you couldn't be this close and not go.

Angie is starving and I must admit to the sudden onset of hunger so we set out in search of the Syrian Lebanese Social Club which one of the travel guides labels as 'excellent value as long as you can put up with the surly waiters'. It takes us half an hour before we finally track down the address. Two or three times we need to stop for a drink. When we do find the address, sadly the Arab quarter has gone, not a falafel in sight, no humus no tabbouleh , not even a garbanzo, all replaced by the ubiquitous golden arches of that hamburger joint plastered with signs saying 'Me encanta' - I'm loving it. Aaaaarrrgggghhh.

We turn back toward the jaded, faded Hotel Gran Espana and into a dining room which can only be described as the Latin equivalent of British Raj.

It is heartwarming to find the surly waiters are still in gainful employment. Praise be, they are here. The maitre'd is condescending at least, despite being spoken to in my best Spanish he thrusts an English menu out like an infringement notice. These are not menus with English translation underneath the Spanish, but dedicated English menus — which means we are unable to translate the translations.

Travelling around you meet a lot of interlingual menu howlers — who could forget the 'battered crap' among the fish options in Saigon or the 'speciality from our cook' in Paris — but the Gran Espana takes the proverbial cake.

People are already shushing us. By now my new friend is starting to get loud, really loud. We decide that 'Beat the Bird' and 'Rolled Over Bird' are probably chicken. The 'Sprouted Pig with Potato Puree Farts' sounds intriguing but I tell her my ego will not allow me to order the 'Little Cock' and immediately wish I hadn't because she shrieks so loudly you can see a straightening of backs around the dining room. Her mirth is redoubled when she decides the offering entitled 'Sprouted Lemons' might help her bust size. The maitre d' angrily tries to quell the hysterical laughter. The Scarlet Woman is by now more than slightly interested in one of the dessert offerings, 'Sambo with Big Nuts'. She begs me to enquire, but it turns out to be chocolate ice cream with crushed nuts. I ask about the "Lamb Cooked in Its Own Juices with Popes" but no amount of enquiry is able to tell me which particular pontiffs share the pot. The maitre d' is very pissed off because he thinks we are laughing at him. In the end I settle on the 'Berlin Lion with Cheese Blow' and ask them to hold the blow – it turns out be one of those gargantuan cuts of steak that I end up with every night in Argentina.

Hanmer Forest parkrun takes place every Saturday at 8:00am.


Hanmer Forest parkrun is a fun, free event organised by volunteers for the benefit of everyone.

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












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
