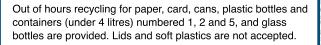





A "Menu" for Teenagers by Pita Alexander

Continued from previous issue

- 31. How much life assurance might be worthwhile putting in place. Probably at least say 50% of the value of your house mortgage debt. A ten year level term pure term cover would be a good starting point.
- 32. How much personal health insurance cover would be worth looking at. Perhaps a middle of the road policy for family and taken out at the commencement of your first job. Costing perhaps \$1,200 per year for the two of you but this annual cost would increase gradually.
- 33. You should have a will from say 24 years of age and update it every few years with your solicitor.
- 34. Will you need an Accountant early on, perhaps not, but seek accounting and legal advice early on with anything important. There is no halfway house with top advice.
- 35. Your house needs to be insured up to its market value for a potential rebuild and then reviewed at least every two years.
- 36. Don't be afraid to have an excess on your insurance arrangements perhaps: (1) \$500 on your car (2) \$1,000 on your house and (3) \$2,000 on your personal health policy.
- 37. If you can make extra loan principal repayments on your house mortgage without penalty then do so.
- 38. If you are running out of funds around the 26th of each month, then you need to pause and reset. Couples who function like this don't really function. Sometimes dropping your standard of living a little has a place. You must somehow or other live within 90% of your disposable income throughout that period from 24 years old to 95 years old.
- 39. There is nothing wrong with living off your capital in your retirement years. That is, you may have saved \$500,000 and need to spend it to live on. If that means that you end up with less to leave to your children,

- then too bad. A reverse mortgage may have a place but borrow as little as possible and as late on as possible.
- 40. Your house loan will be a 30 year mortgage such that your monthly payments are a mixture of interest payments and loan principal repayments (see 30 previous issue). At \$550,000 the monthly payments are \$2,953. At \$450,000 the monthly payments are \$2,416.
- 41. Don't invest in anything that you don't 100% understand.
- 42. How many NZ retirees can live within the National Superannuation there is no firm data on this but I suspect no more than 5% 10% of NZ retirees.
- 43. A good garden can really pay its way well but it seems to be less important than it was 40 years ago but partly because in NZ today a household needs both partners in 40 hour week work.
- 44. Don't rely upon government helping you in any really meaningful way. They are struggling to balance their own cash flow work on being on your own financially all the way.
- 45. How much of a financial buffer do you need. A matter of opinion but I would feel say \$3,000 for each adult that is \$6,000 per family. You must be able to get at this figure within ten days.







Here are some of our haiku poems:







Last Legs

Continued from previous issue ...

Back in Salta I am beginning to feel like a local. The reason I am staying for the Gauchos fiesta is because it sounds like a great subject for a photographic essay. I have these notions when I travel and so often abandon them at home. I can't decipher Ignacio's fill-in on the fiesta's background, in either language, but from what I am able glean it is a celebration of General Guemes' gaucho army winning a major battle over the Spanish. The General gets shot in the back six weeks before the final victory and then Salta gets retaken by the good guys. Portraits show a man bearded in the style of the seventeenth and eighteenth century wearing a piercing look, not to mention a very fancy uniform.

Have you ever noticed that in most homes they only seem to possess photographs of serious looking people. One can be jolly in snaps but has to be serious when it came to posterity.

There is a very large statue of General Guemes astride the fiery stallion, hand to his brow shading his eyes from the sun as he surveys the city from his superior hillside vantage.

On the eve of the fiesta Ignacio suggests I should go to the *fogones* which I take to be something like a big barbecue since I once owned a restaurant in Spain with that name. I knew it to mean fireplace or cooking hearth.

Sadly, the barbecue attendees are all roped off in their little estancia and other non-specific rural groups, and can only be viewed from behind the barriers as they gnaw on sides of beef and drink quite a lot of red wine and stand around being convivial with each other like a zoo exhibition of homo gaucho. They remind me of a farmers' outing in New Zealand and I catch a waft of arrogance across the rope, a sniff of money in there somewhere, mixing it with the workers, as if this might be the weekend when everyone fraternizes and pretends to be equal. Some have the look of handsome Argentinians, of a type more likely seen at polo tourneys than football matches.

At the foot of the path, next to the base of the General's statue there is a screen showing black and white movies and I stop to look. The sound blares harshly across the park. There is a drama which ends in five minutes of fiery and impassioned magniloquence which sorely tests the limits of my Spanish, but it all comes to an irreversible climax when the major protagonist strides gallantly to his execution by firing squad, where he naturally eschews the blindfold. Then, suddenly, a new film appears, there on the balcony of the Casa Rosada is Evita, crying out, and she makes a rousing ten minute speech, tearing at the patriotic heartstrings.

Then the dead man reappears and begins the loop of his losing argument all over again. It will all end badly and I already know General Guemes got shot in the back so this must be someone else because he gets shot in the

front. I did ask someone his name, but either I didn't understand the answer or I already forgot it. I watch it through again because I want an Evita encore. It's a shame her real image is forever clouded by Madonna. Evita speaks with great force and it is a political rhetoric of the type that sees the downtrodden masses win their battles over the bourgeois oppressors. *Descamisadas* with the powerful stresses on its vowels is such a wonderful word, the shirtless ones. But I still stay and watch it a third time, trying to put myself in the place of the people she is speaking to. Even today, this lady polls well among the populace and her name is often mentioned with a touch of reverence. You get drawn by the magnetism of her manner of speaking.

The next day is the day of the grand parade with more than a few high ranking politicians and fruit-salad-chested military men basking in the glory of someone else's ancient victory and being seen to similarly show themselves in the company of the people of the land, of the pampas and the mountains, the rich and the poor; but from behind a secure line of soldiers and police. Or not so secure as it turns out.

On the way, walking down the Avenida General Guemes, I find a large bronze statue of a man standing at a crossroads with his hands in his pockets. It is the first time I ever saw a memorial to a man who kept his hands in his pockets. I don't think he is being lauded for valour, more likely an intellectual pursuit with his balding head and pronounced widows' peak. People have scratched their names on his trousers but they can't reach the top half so it is left inviolate.

At the main staging point I find there are barriers flanked with soldiers and police and it is already crowded, which will likely restrict my photography, but I have a press card in my wallet and I show it to a police woman and tell her, here I am, from the foreign media. She is very polite and shows me where to go further along the line and I arrive there and have my card scrutinized and the boss is called to look at my card and I also give him a business card and tell him I representing the Australian and New Zealand media and he shakes my hand and shows me to a seat at the front of the official stand not far from the governor with his blue silk sash and it is explained that this is the Press section down the front so I can step out amongst the parade and get some excellent photographs. The parade will be magnificent he assures me. The governor is surrounded by sycophants whom I can see are fawning even from this distance and they are laughing nervously as though they are not sure if this is a joke from the Governor. I am surprised by the polite and efficient manner in which I am treated and it makes me feel guilty, the press pass is a little something I whipped up on the computer at home and then had laminated at Warehouse Stationery. The card gets me so many places, but I always expect to be exposed as the fraud that I am.

We have two local ski fields within a stones throw of Hanmer Springs!

The Hanmer Springs Ski Area offers club field skiing at its best. The ski area is located just "over the back" of Hanmer Springs, on the northern flank of Mount Saint Patrick (1413m). The ski area has a vertical range of 310 metres and provides 52 hectares of inbound terrain. The Amuri Ski Club, founded in 1957, runs Hanmer Springs Ski Area. Anyone can ski or board at Hanmer Springs Ski Area, however, there are many benefits for being a member of the Amuri Ski Club, including discounted lift passes and discounted on-mountain accommodation.



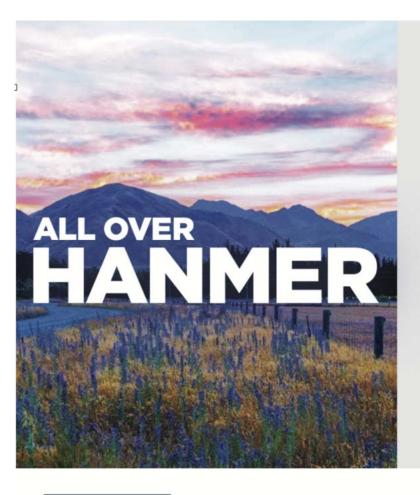
