





Pita's Column

Lessons for Life for younger people

- 1. Listen to Mum and Dad around the kitchen table. Learn from their pain, their mistakes and their experience.
- 2. You will learn a lot more from listening than talking listening is a real skill.

The CYJO Band Hanmer Springs Camp is a great bonding time for the band as the students may not know each other but they come together, with their passion of jazz, and make amazing music as a tight-knit band.

The CYJO village concert is a first-class performance and we'll be expecting the same this year. The performance is free of charge and will be on Friday 3 October at 12 noon, on the village green. Save the date!




I'm John Faulkner, a dairy farmer from Culverden, living on the banks of the Waiau Uwha River.

Photinia Leaf Spot Disease

Over the last twelve months I have noticed an increase in Photinia Leaf Spot around the village. It will eventually kill the shrub due to the constant lack of foliage; and the plant being depleted of nutrients.

The fungus that causes photinia leaf spot is called Entomosporium mespili.

To eradicate, or at least control, you must:

Firstly, remove all the dead leaves from under the shrub/ hedge as this is where the spores sit. DO NOT compost these. They must be disposed of into the rubbish or burnt Secondly, cover the area in mulch to help control any pores left on the soil.

Thirdly, the plant must be sprayed with a fungicide every 10-14 days throughout spring and again in the autumn.

Thrip damage to Viburnum

Thrips suck all the goodness out of the leaves causing them to die and fall. The new growth comes away in the spring but the thrip will get that, causing the plant to be depleted of nutrients, and over time it will die.

As with the photinia, leaves must be removed from under the plant and disposed of completely. The plants can be sprayed regularly with an insecticide to control thrip and mixed with spraying oil at the rate for the time of the year. Another way to help with the prevention is to apply Soil Insect Killer to the base of the plant late winter early spring right out to the drip line and beyond as the thrip overwinter in the soil.





Note: Any tools used in cutting these infected plants must be cleaned with meths after use to prevent infection to other plants.

Last Legs

Tupiza is a reasonably clean town in a really dusty environment, even in mid winter and there seems to be a lot of sweeping going on. I walk very slowly up a couple of blocks and then head left uphill on a real cobblestone street, to where I am told I will find a central plaza along with restaurants and internet cafes. Progress is sluggish because I am running on about five percent energy levels, but I make it to a square which is quintessentially Latin American with a large church and an alcaldia (town hall) and a statue of someone grand on a horse in the middle, probably Simon Bolivar but I don't bother to check, a park and some trees, and a few old people sitting around talking about the good old days, the women in their traditional sombreros cholitos or bombins, aka bowler hats. Their legs are well wrapped in knitted woollen leg warmers and they wear several layers of petticoats beneath their skirts and woollen cardies and mantas that range from muted checks to shocking pink. Bolivia features more bright pink than your average Gay Mardi

Almost every woman you meet in the country has their hair parted in the centre, a custom which was once compulsory under the reign of a certain Spanish Viceroy Toledo. Old habits die hard in Bolivia.

I have a beer in a café, not that this does anything toward clearing my head and the lady tells me what I am suffering from is called *Soroche*. Like everyone else she predicts it will only last a day or two and she plies me with mate de coca – coca leaf tea.

The worst thing is the pins and needles, they are acutely painful and there doesn't seem to be any relief from them. She brings me another large coca tea with the leaves still floating in it. It is a little ironic that she waggles her finger at me for drinking beer and gives me coca as the healthy alternative. It seems to help.

The day before I left Salta I started taking the medication, acetazolamide, given me by my doctor and it should be working by now. It is supposed to counteract the altitude and I have been at these elevations before with no side effects. It must be age I tell myself. I am getting decrepit. After doing battle with a broken keyboard in an internet parlour I send off a bunch of emails with @ in place of a, and / instead of I. Once they cr@ck the code it wi// be e@sy.

I decide on an easy first evening, an early dinner and then to bed with Satellite TV at Hotel La Torre, Satellite TV is the usual South American football (about half the channels) extremely dramatic Latino soap operas (a quarter) and the rest allocated to dubbed movies, CNN, the BBC (if you're lucky) and one other sport channel, again, if you're lucky. I have found it difficult to follow the All Blacks on satellite tv in some of the more remote places in Asia. I can always watch a DVD on my laptop and these hotels are reasonably up to date. So I go to bed with John Lennon vs the US which I find in the foyer. Hotel La Torre has a comfortable informality helped by the fact La Senora feels free to do her nails at reception and she looks not at me, but her handiwork when she speaks. I promise her I will look at the tour options to Salar de Uyuni all in good time.

Walking down from the plaza I decide on a pizza for my first night's dinner in Bolivia. Hardly the ethnic experience I came seeking, but it feels safe and it is warm and cosy with wood paneled walls and a plump Bolivian girl whose radiant smile is only troubled when she has to deal with a group of six students from Wisconsin or somewhere midde-American. They are honking at her with their mid western accents like a flock of demented geese. As I watch her I can see a natural smile instantly change to fear and she jumps in fright when they snap their fingers at her. She is seriously stressing because the place is packed and they are all impatient gringos and she has only her little brother to help her. Despite the fact he is no more than about nine, he is a pro, he sweeps in and takes over. I have a menu and a beer in front of me in double quick time, delivered with great gravity and all the flourish of a Roman piazza. I try to read the menu but my vision is fuzzy so I just point. He does have the good manners to tell me there will be a half hour wait. He also takes over dealing with the Yangui table and tries being implacable, but it seems they have been waiting a long time for their dinner and are not about to be placated with anything but food. They are a pain in the arse and have everyone else in the restaurant squirming in embarrassment at being foreigners. El Chicito bows to them with gravity and gracious subservience. If you would like your pizzas now I can bring them, he says seriously, or if you wish to wait five minutes more they will be cooked. But their command of Spanish is not enough to grasp any of the subtleties beyond the cinco minutos. So they all say 'cinco minutos', like it is a threat.

Their pizzas arrive but of course they are not good enough and they complain loudly, eat two thirds of the pizza, swab up the rest of their beers and juices and walk out without paying. But it gets worse. The plump girl bursts out of the kitchen when she sees they are gone. We feel guilty on behalf of all foreigners. Why didn't we call her. We have let them go. Then she picks on me and says I am a Yangui and these are my friends. Could not have said that worse, so of course I loudly protest that I am not a Yankee, nor did I ever meet those people, or even want to meet them and how dare she. She retires to the kitchen to tell her mother and you can hear this does not get a good reception - there is an audible cry of outrage and a sharp slap and the young lady heads through the restaurant pulling on her pink coat, tears streaming down her smarting face, dispatched to find those people who had made such a fool of her -- and don't come back without the money is the unmistakable cry from the kitchen.

We all want to run away, none of us want to be in the middle of this scene, but as one, we are behind the young girl so we pick up their bill, everyone contributing and we have more than the required amount. The young brother continues to serve meals and decap beers and pour drinks, all with the severity of an undertaker. My pizza eventually arrives, just before the door opens and the bell rings quietly as the young lady slips disconsolately back in and shakes her head when we ask if she has found them.




