




A number of possible new locations are being considered by the Community Board. A decision will be made in the near future.

Myth Busting!

Question:

Are the big tall trees around the Hanmer Springs Thermal Reserve Redwoods?

Answer: No.

So what are they? They are **Sequoiadendron giganteum** or Wellingtonia.



Sequoiadendron giganteum or Wellingtonia.



Sequoia sempervirens, or Redwood.

Sequoiadendron giganteum, commonly known as the Wellingtonia, classified in the family Cupressaceae. Wellingtonia specimens are the largest (as in bulk) trees on Earth. They are native to the groves on the western slopes of the Sierra Nevada mountain range of California. These withstand a lot more wind than the Sequoia, which is fortunate, as we have plenty of wind here (and there is plenty in Wellington too).

What is a Redwood then?

It is Sequoia sempervirens and is the sole living species of the genus Sequoia in the cypress family Cupressaceae. Common names include coastal redwood and California redwood. As the common name says these trees grow along the coast of California and are the tallest known tree in the world.

Plants are often given may different common names which leads to confusion over what they actually are.

So do we have any Redwoods in Hanmer?

Yes, there is a grove of them on the Woodland Walk and some young ones in the Heritage Forest.

Note the different foliage between the two trees.

Daffodil Day

On Friday 29th August we held a mufti day and gold coin donation for Daffodil Day. We made over \$100 to give to the Cancer Society. Everybody wore lots of yellow.

Conservation Week.

September 1st-7th is Conservation Week. Chris Hughey came a few weeks earlier to talk to the senior school about his conservation work and how he got started in conservation when he was younger. He spoke about setting up Te Tihi O Rauhea Hanmer Springs Conservation Group and his ongoing work with wetland restoration, planting, weed control and trapping in Hanmer Springs. He has also managed to get a parcel of land on Conical Hill to be planted in kānuka in the future.

Tori talked about the Hanmer Springs trapping programme and brought in a trap to show how it worked, the predators targeted, and the native wildlife we are trying to protect. She also brought in some tracking tunnels and ink pads, which classes put out overnight, in the school grounds. The next day all the tracking cards had footprints and the pupils identified which predators had left their footprints on the cards. Hedgehog footprints were clearly identified and the school now has a trap (locked away from little people) on its grounds. Bridie and Mrs R are in charge of checking this trap.

The trapping programme started about 5 years ago and runs in Hanmer Springs with the help of 15 dedicated volunteer trappers. Kirsty James and Tori Rowley volunteer to manage it. Kirsty does possuming and wasp control in the area too. Bridie and her mum work as volunteer trappers and Bridie shared with the pupils some of her trapping knowledge.





Bridie showed classes how to set the trap and showed them the stinky bait that she puts in the traps. Classes went out and put a tracking tunnel out in the memorial garden to see what footprints there are in there in the morning. The day after we put a trap in the memorial garden to see if we could catch anything. The next day we checked the trap and there was nothing in there.

My pizza eventually arrives, just before the door opens and the bell rings quietly as the young lady slips disconsolately back in and shakes her head when we ask if she has found them. Her brother tells her nothing, nor does her mother, they are going to make her suffer, but a Scandinavian girl can see what they are doing, so she calls her over and tells her. She looks at her brother and he offers her a confirming nod. Her face literally bursts with delight and she doesn't know who to greet or thank first. She runs for her mother as though her blessing is now necessary to complete the picture. But her mother barks at her and she shoots back to the restaurant where she offers us all a drink, but her mother comes out and scowls at everyone and says no, stupid girl. We are all tarred with the Yanqui brush.

The young lady shakes our hands individually. She shall never forget us for our kindness.

It really hurt paying for those people's pizzas.

There is no real improvement in my condition the next day, so I make my way up to the square again. It is a disappointment to see the girl from the restaurant in the street and despite a friendly greeting, she fails to recognize me and carries on without acknowledgement. I am going to the Internet to look up my medication because on the packet it says to have one per day but in a travel guide it says to have eight. I am taking five hundred micrograms but I am reluctant to take too many drugs when I am feeling this shitty and weird (experience speaking) but it seems like everything I read about dosage is different.

I decide to stick to one, but I'm feeling awful. I need two rests just getting up one flight of stairs at the Hotel la Torre. I foolishly overlook reading the side effects, the *contradiciones* for those pills. After all they had been prescribed in New Zealand. It says something about paresthesias on the Internet but who knows what that is and I can't find it in my Spanish dictionary.

The guys next door are still locked in their room smoking dope.

The servant cooks me a good breakfast with eggs and hot bread and fruit and strong black coffee and I wish I could say it makes me feel better but it doesn't. La Senora says her husband will take me on a tour of Tupiza and surrounds today. I should stay here at least another two days before I head up to the Salar de Uyuni. As much as they would love to show me around for nothing I will need to help defray the costs and help cover Archimedio's petrol and if I give her the money she will send him to fill up the jeep and buy food for lunch, because of course they will provide a picnic. I pay up, I do

want to go for a conducted tour, the idea of a journey with Archimedio has possibilities. It might be something different.

Sadly, we are thwarted because the university students

have decided to roadblock the city and not let any vehicles either in or out as a protest about what all students want, control of the university, the keys to the asylum. They are intractable and obstinate about rite of passage but wily old Archimedio was born in these parts and we drive back

and double around through the middle of the dump and up a goat track into the hills beyond. It is not really a road and I hang on tight because there is a very large drop. In one area there is a tight turn and a part of the track has washed away. Archimedio calls for me to help him dump some rocks in the gap and doesn't look kindly when I beg off for health reasons. His method of crossing the washout is to make a rush at his boulders and for a moment I think we are going over but we deflect and make it through. After about ten minutes we reach the top of a pass and descend down the other side and rejoin the main road at a walled cemetery, safely on the other side of the road block

We go to visit the Valle de Los Machos which is a valley full of penis shaped rock formations. Definitely, some high caliber knobbery. (Later when I emailed my photos from here to the odd ex-wife, they said they liked the look of the place.)

Through the Gates of Hell and into another valley and on to the Canyon of the Incas, a long narrow fissure in the rocks that Archimedio said went on for six kilometres with barely enough room for a man to pass. Several horses are tethered at the entrance way as proof of this, they cannot get through. Good enough for me, I decided not to venture in.

This is a very important part of the Inca Trail, I am told, but then I learned in Argentina that a lot of goat tracks, roads or pathways going in any old direction fall into this category.

I ask Archimedio what Tupiza means and he tells me it comes from the Chicha words *tuc* and *picas*, and when I ask what that means, he shrugs his shoulders. It's a dead language he says, nobody knows what it means. It is not very important is it?

For our picnic lunch he chooses a rickety wooden table right next to an oil drum overflowing with garbage and festooned by insects. It is the designated picnic site, but I insist we go down and spread out our ponchos on the edge of the river and enjoy where we are. A cold wind drives down the river bed and because sand gets in our empanadas we move back to where we started and Archimedio does a wonderful job of resisting the temptation to say, I told you so. But the old bastard is smug. He is forgiven because of the caliber of the lunch. La Senora has wrapped empanadas of different fillings in a red and white napkin, still warm in their wicker basket, crusty bread, sheep's cheese and tomatoes and lots of tiny mandarins, not to mention a couple a couple of Tupiza beers which froth up when we remove the caps. Archimedio has a very small bottle of red wine which he seems unwilling to share, not that I want any. Alcohol is the last thing I need. I am pretty slow and Archimedio says I have got the soroche bad, what am I going to be like when I get to La Paz. Don't try and go to the Salar de Uyuni he counsels, don't let them try and talk you into it at the hotel. If you get really sick you are a long way from anywhere. At least in La Paz you can go to hospital or get down to Arica on the Chilean coast in one day. I appreciate his advice because I know that better

judgement should prevail. I also know it rarely does.

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Pepe's is a dine-in or take-out sandwich type bar where you'll get fast service with easy parking.

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Some people want it to happen, some wish it to happen, others make it happen.

Hanmer Forest parkrun takes place every Saturday at 8:00am.


Hanmer Forest parkrun is a fun, free event organised by volunteers for the benefit of everyone.
